GREAT RACE HORSE IS LITERALLY WORTH MORE THAN WEIGHT IN GOLD

LONDON, Aug. 6.—That a great race horse is worth more than his weight in gold, and many times in silver, was made evident today when J. B. Joel, a South African millionaire sportsman, paid \$250,000 for Prince Palatine, winner of the Ascot Gold Cup this year. This price is a new record for race horses and thoroughbreds. Flying Fox many years ago brought 196,875.

Prince Palatine is by Persimmon out of an Isinglass mare. Persimmon was owned by the late King Edward.

Prince Palatine when in condition for racing weighs 1000 pounds. At a selling price of \$250,000 this would make Prince Palatine worth \$250 a pound. Gold is worth about \$200 a pound, and silver, according to the latest quotation, is worth not quite \$4 a pound. Cattle on the hoof at wholesale bring 9 and 10 cents a pound. So it will be seen that Prince Palatine is worth per pound more than a pound of gold, many pounds of silver and would be a very dear morsel to eat if served up at his present value in the French and German horsemeat market.

YAKIMA MAN DROWNED IN SIGHT OF FAMILY

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Aug. 6.—While swimming in the Yakima river near the Old Town cemetery Sunday afternoon, Robert O. Walker, a horse dealer, was drowned before the eyes of his wife and three little children, who had accompanied him on the day's outing.

The family had picnicked happily since morning on the banks of a sort of pond made by an arm of the river. They sat under the trees and ate their evening meal, and the father decided, before starting for home, to take a plunge in the water.

He put on a light swimming suit and, telling his three little ones to watch him, went into the river. He had made but a few strokes, however when he began to show signs of distress and called to his wife for aid. She attempted to wade out to where he was, but the water proved too deep. Procuring a broken branch from a tree, she made desperate efforts to reach her husband with that, hoping that he would be able to grasp it and keep above water. But his strength was too far gone.

GOVERNOR SULZER WILL PUT DEMOCRATS TO TEST

ALBANY, Aug. 6.—After next Monday Gov. Sulzer expects to know definitely where every democratic state committeeman and county chairman stands in the war he is making on Tammany Boss Murphy. Through his secretary, Chester C. Platt, the governor has issued a call to all state committeemen and county chairmen for a conference with him on that day for the purpose of promoting the candidacy of aspirants for the assembly pledged to support the Sulzer direct primaries bill. Mr. Platt said last night:

"This conference will be a most important one in view of the history of the past few weeks. For urging that the democratic party be true to its platform pledges the governor has been furiously assailed by the political bosses of both parties. Every effort has been made to blacken his reputation, and his enemies have gone to the point of threatening his impeachment.

"The governor desires to know the attitude of every state committeeman and county chairman with regard to these attacks. Committeemen and county chairmen who for any reason cannot be present at the conference are asked to send a proxy to represent them.

"A determined effort should be made in every assembly district in the state to elect an assemblyman who will stand by the governor. In the fight he is making to rid the state of grafters who are plundering it and to remove the principal cause of public graft, boss-ruled officials, who are

DRUNKEN AUTOIST MUST INHABIT PORTLAND JAIL

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6.—A weird trip through crowded streets, in a plunging automobile, brought W. R. Anderson, a young medical student and automobile demonstrator, to the doors of the rockpile yesterday, when he was sentenced for five days by Judge Stevenson. Execution was stayed by notice of appeal. The prison sentence came as the result of a showing that Anderson had been drinking, which, in automobile drivers, is a felony in many states.

First notice of Anderson's wild ride came from M. C. Dickinson, who trailed the reckless driver from Oak to Gilsan street, on Third street, and took his number.

"I shuddered and almost lost control of my car," said Mr. Dickinson, "when I saw him shave past a man, who, if he had not been quick as a cat, would have been a corpse. An plunging automobile, brought W. 30 miles an hour."

Detective Captain Baty also saw the narrow escape, and testified at the trial yesterday.

Scarcely had Mr. Dickinson made his report at the police station when H. P. Coffin, sitting on his porch on East Broadway, saw the automobile go past, wavering from side to side and traveling so fast that residents ran to their doors to watch it. He also reported to the police, and Patrolman Wendorf was sent to lie in wait at the garage where the car was shown by the register to belong.

Patrolman Ellis also was in court to prosecute a charge against Anderson of leaving his car standing in traffic but this case was not pressed.

C. V. DYMENT TO ASSIST IN JOURNALISTIC COURSE AT THE STATE UNIVERSITY

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6.—Colin V. Dymont, northwest editor of the Journal, has been notified of his appointment by the board of regents to be instructor in journalism at the University of Oregon. He is a graduate of the University of Toronto. He will be associated with Eric W. Allen professor in journalism.

SUBWAY MAY CONNECT ENGLAND AND FRANCE

LONDON.—The question of a channel tunnel connecting England and France which has been discussed for so many years is still as keenly supported and equally forcibly opposed by those in favor of the proposal and those who see in it the end of Great Britain as an island. M. Bartou, the French premier, is reported as being in favor of the scheme, stating that the majority of the reasons put forward by opponents of the scheme have gradually vanished owing to the steadily improving relations between France and Great Britain.

The question of the effect of such a tunnel on the two countries concerned would form an excellent subject for a debating society, so many are the points in favor of and against the undertaking. From a military point of view, such a tunnel could scarcely constitute a danger to either country, since nothing would be simpler than to close the entrance against all comers, should the necessity arise. From a commercial point of view, however, the advantages would, in all probability be proved to be many, and it is certainly a question whether a scheme which would do so much to facilitate intercourse between France and Great Britain, should not receive careful and official consideration, with a view to the question being settled one way or the other.

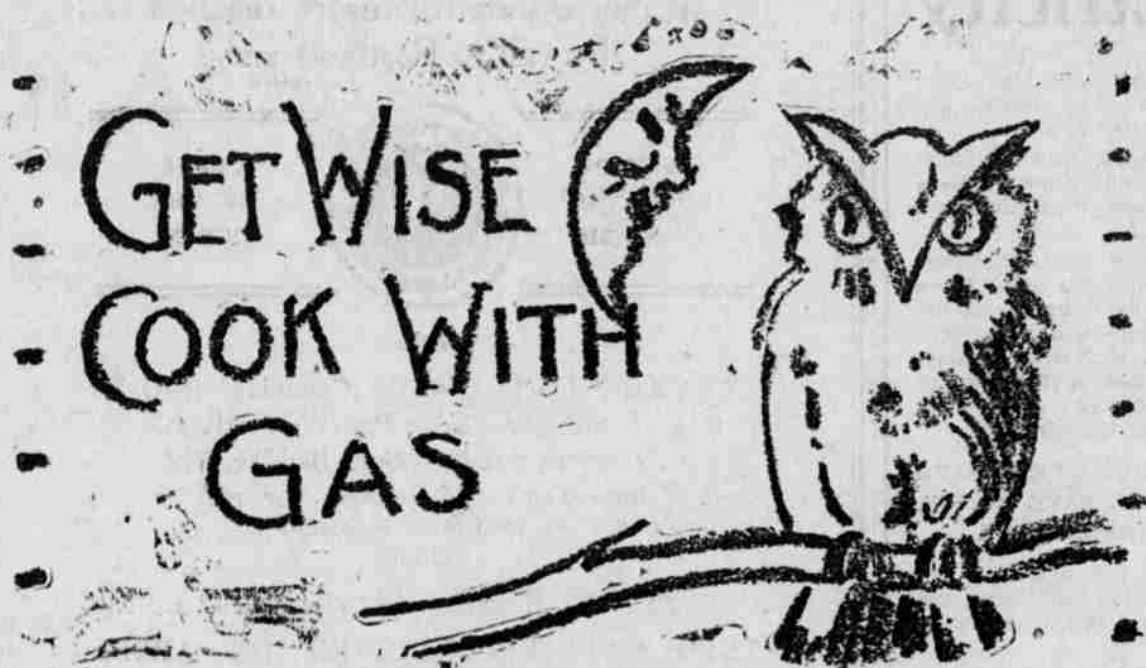
