TRIED RECIPES.

Fried Eggs With Tomatoes.

Put a cup of fine oil or lard into a little frying pan. Heat it lightly and then incline it slightly in order to bring all the oil to one side. Break a fresh egg even with the liquid and with a little skimmer roll it up to an oval form. Cook it until the outside part is well set, keeping the yolk liquid exactly as in the case of a poached egg. Cook thus all the fresh eggs one after another. Serve them in a slightly deep dish, turning over them a sauce of fresh tomatoes, garnish with fried croutons—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Potato Nest With Peas.

Six potatoes boiled, two eggs, one pint cup parsley to garnish. Mash and cream six boiled potatoes, being careful not to add too much cream. Line well greased muffin pans with the potato, leaving a nest in the center. Brush with beaten egg and bake until brown. Remove carefully to a platter and fill the center with creamed peas and carrots. Garnish with parsley and send at once to the table. This is very nice accompaniment to lamb chops.

Clams on Toast.

Take clams and steam them very slightly, after which remove from the shells, chop fine and with all their juice, which has been carefully preserved, put them in a pan with a little butter and stew for a few moments. Just before serving add a little red pepper and a dash of any hot sauce. Serve to each person a piece of toast and the clams poured over it.

Chicken Hollandaise.

Cooked chicken, one pint; chopped celery, one half cup; butter, two tablespoonsful; onion juice, one tablespoonful; chopped parsley, one tablespoonful; yolks of eggs, two; juice of one half lemon, paprika, one tablespoonful; salt; one cup of stock or water. Melt the butter in the frying dish. Add the celery and cool just a few moments. Add all the remaining seasonings with the carefully cooked meat of the chicken cut in small pieces. Stir all well together, and when well heated add the yolks of the eggs well beaten. Serve with water dress sandwiches made with thinly sliced bread, buttered—Chicago Inter Ocean.

Cheese Pudding.

Cheese pudding is an unusual dish that is much liked and very easy to make. Prepare three-quarters of a pound of breadcrumbs and mix with them one-half of a pound of cheese grated or cut into small pieces. Scald one cupful of milk, melt in it a piece of butter the size of an egg and pour over the cheese and bread. After the mixture has stood fifteen minutes beat four eggs very light with a quarter of a teaspoonful of salt, stir into

the pudding and our it into a buttered baking dish. Bake forty-five minutes in a quick oven.

RAILROADS HAUL WATER TO USE IN ENGINES

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 7.—Although temperatures in the Southwest averaged a few degrees lower today than yesterday, Kansas felt little relief, as in many parts of that state thermometers registered above 100 degrees. The heat centers in the state were Salina and Junction City, where the maximum temperatures were 108. At Independence, Kan., a new record for the year was established when the mercury climbed to 106. Topeka reported a temperature of 105. In some parts of Kansas railroad companies are forced to haul water used in their engines. At Salina a privately owned lake that has not been without water for 20 years now is dry. The Cottonwood River is dry at Florence.

The government forecaster here said tonight that there was no immediate prospect of rain in Kansas. Temperatures in many parts of Oklahoma reached the 100 mark or higher today.

PORTLAND IS ANXIOUS TO BE RESERVE

Oregon Metropolis Making Efforts to Become Northwest Reserve City Under New Currency Plan.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 7.—The Portland chamber of commerce has called to the attention of Senators Chamberlain and Lane the desirability of securing for Portland the location of the reserve bank of the Pacific northwest in the event that the new currency bill becomes law. Senator Lane has already notified the chamber that he has found strong sentiment in favor of selecting Portland for this important center, and it is expected that Senator Chamberlain will be heard from very shortly.

A very important point in Portland's favor in the selection for a location for the big institution, it is pointed out, is the city's solid financial standing and its particularly favorable geographical claim for recognition. A conference will be held in Washington soon and Portland bankers will have a personal representative there.

The proposed currency bill provides for the establishment of regional reserve banks. As now constituted, it provides that within 90 days after the passage of the act, the secretary of agriculture and the comptroller of the currency, acting as a reserve bank organization committee, shall have charge of the selection of the locations of the federal reserve banks. The action of that organization committee is final.

The act also provides that each reserve bank must have a minimum paid up capital of \$5,000,000. The combined capital of the banks of Oregon, Washington and Idaho is about \$42,000,000 and, it is said, if every bank were to become a member of the federal reserve bank for the district, there would be insufficient capital to entitle the three states to a reserve city within the borders of the Pacific northwest. Each bank is required to subscribe for stock in the reserve bank equivalent to 20 per cent of its capital and of this amount 10 per cent is to be paid up immediately.

It is pointed out, therefore, that it appears that if the bill is passed in its present form, it will be necessary to include the Pacific northwest states with California, or with some other western states, in order to entitle this

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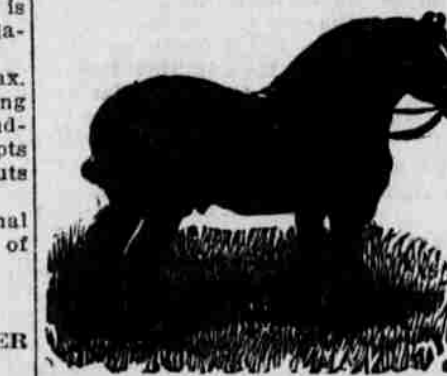
