IT WAS A NO HIT GAME. YES IT WAS

After reasoning thusly, it was easy to make his pencil mark an E for error instead of a cross for a hit and thereby did Smoky Joe pitch a no-hit game. Of course a no-hit no-run game would have listened better but then the scorer has no option when a runner spikes the home plate and the umpire calls him safe. He must register it a score else the smoky one might have won a double distinction.

Kennedy which Ed knocked down but which went through his hands with such force as to put him out of the game for a few minutes. "An error, of course. The official scoring rules read in part as follows: 'A base hit shall be scored when the ball be hit with such force to an infielder or pitcher that he can not handle it in time to put out the batsman or force out a base runner. In case of doubts over this class of hits, a base hit should be scored and the fielder exempted from the charge of an error.' Evidently there was no doubt in the scorer's mind for he was thinking of that story he was going to write. Maybe if the ball had torn a paw off Kennedy, a glimmer of suspicion that the swat was a base hit might have filtered through a crack in his roof but so long as it was only a hot one and put him out of the game for a few minutes, perish the thought. It was an error so rank that it savored of the sewer. Yes, indeed.

Then again in the third inning, Pendleton had the bases full with two down. "Varian sent one at Kennedy which the big fellow misjudged and which brought over the only count for the Pendletonians," reads the Boise story. Kennedy's error of judgment might have come under the bonhead column but we fail to see where Varian should be deprived of a hit when the blow was hit sufficiently hard to send home two runners. Probably Kennedy was playing too far to one side, too far back or too close in or maybe the ball took a bound and went over his head. He ought to have stopped it anyway. This much we gather from the fact that the game was a no-hit affair and that Kennedy drew two marks in the error column.

We doff our kelly to Smoky Joe for beating Pendleton and to the official scorer for making a no-hit game to chronicle. It may have been a little hard on the batters and fielders but they should have been glad of the occasion to assist in developing a no-hit pitcher.

PORTLAND BANKS ASK FOR MILLION OF M'ADOO MONEY

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 7.—Ernest A. Wyld, vice president of the Security Savings & Trust company, will go to Washington, D. C., next week to represent the bankers of Portland at the conference which Secretary McAdoo, of the treasury department, has called as a preliminary to his proposed distribution of \$50,000,000 among the banks of the west and the south in an endeavor to relieve the financial stringency usually incidental to the movement of crops.

Mr. Wyld was chosen at a meeting of the Portland Clearing House Association yesterday. He is a progressive banker of the "constructive" type and will be able to present with adequate emphasis the importance of Portland's commercial position.

It is probable that Mr. Wyld will leave Portland Saturday or Sunday. The conference of Pacific coast bankers with Secretary McAdoo will take place on Thursday, August 14.

Inasmuch as Portland has been selected by the secretary as one of the 53 cities of the United States among which the \$50,000,000 fund is to be distributed, Mr. Wyld will be prepared to make application for a share of the fund sufficient to enable the bankers of this city to assist in moving the northwestern crops.

Portland bankers hope that at least \$1,000,000 of the \$50,000,000 will be allotted to this city.

WANTS GOOD HIGHWAYS SO MOTOR TRUCKS MAY DO TRANSPORTATION WORK

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 7.—The construction of California's \$18,000,000 state highway system on the principle of two direct trunk lines north and south, one to serve the coast cities and one the interior, will be of immense economic value to the farmer and business man in transportation cost, says T. E. Darrington of Los Angeles, member of the California highway commission.

The development of the automobile as a means of quick, inexpensive and satisfactory interchange of farm products and merchandise between country and city assures keen competition for the future if the roads are laid out in the most direct practicable routes, Darrington believes.

"Of my own knowledge I know that several automobile trucking companies are planning to establish motor vehicle trains between Los Angeles and Frisco when the state highway is built," says Darrington.

"That the auto truck can successfully compete with steam and electric roads in hauling freight has been proved in European countries. The automobile is the coming economical freight transportation marvel of the next few years.

"If the two main trunk lines of California's highway system are routed as direct as possible from the end of the state to the other, and the counties spend their money as they should for laterals to tap these main arteries, the state will have in a short time the most perfect system of roads in the world. The saving to farmers in transporting their products to distribution centers by automobile over a system of direct highways, and the similar saving to merchants in delivering their products, cannot be appreciated now in the early development of this means of intercounty and even interstate transportation."

BURGLAR HAS CONSCIENCE.

Returns Treasure Box Stolen From Portland House.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 7.—The burglar who stole G. M. Hyland's treasure box three years ago has become conscience stricken. The box, one of the ordinary metal ones, used in offices for holding small cash, did not contain financial wealth as the burglar supposed and hoped, but in it were stored a number of trinkets and papers that Hyland valued highly for sentimental reasons. Among other things, and perhaps the most valuable to the burglar, was the first dollar Mr. Hyland received from his father.

Three years ago, when Mr. Hyland lived at Sixteenth and Halsey streets, the unknown burglar one night stole quietly into the house and got away with the box. Mr. Hyland had no thought of ever having the good fortune to again become possessor of the relics.

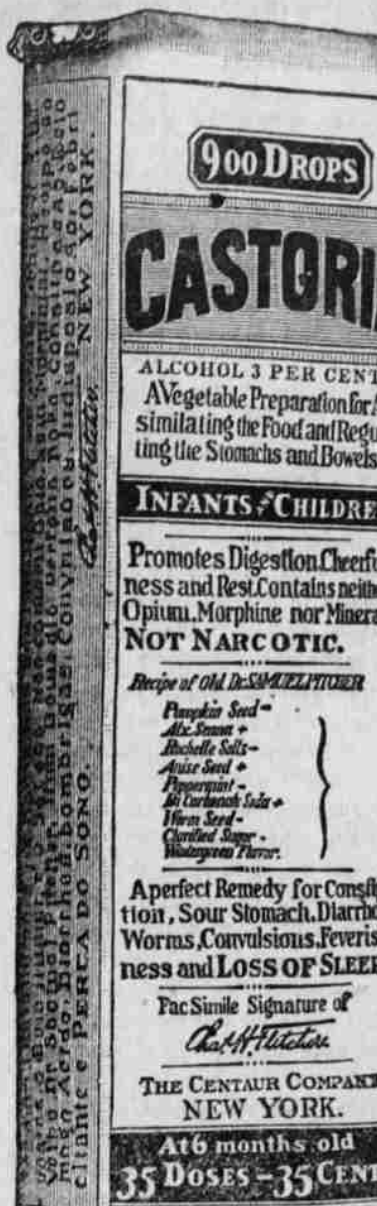

WESTERN PACIFIC MAY HAVE LINE TO TWIN FALLS

TWIN FALLS, Aug. 7.—President B. F. Bush, the new man at the head of the Western Pacific railway system, has wired M. J. Sweeley, president of the Twin Falls Commercial club, that he will visit this city and tract Monday. His party expects to arrive in Wells, Nev., Sunday morning. They will be met by a party of citizens from Contact and a committee from this city, including M. J. Sweeley, Robert M. McCollum, J. M. Maxwell, James McMillan, E. J. Osterlander, George D. Alken, L. E. Sallday and H. J. Falling.

The first stop after the party leaves Wells in automobiles will be made at Contact, where a tour of several of the rich copper mines will be made.

Leaving Contact for Twin Falls the party will stop to inspect Salmon



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dam, and coming on through the new and thriving Salmon river tract and upon arrival here will be tendered a rousing reception at the Commercial club. The greater part of Monday will be spent in viewing the Twin Falls tract.

The people of Twin Falls feel that President Bush will have put to rest the country and the great evidence of heavy tonnage to convince him of the need of the Western Pacific line south and of the tonnage of the tract. The present tonnage piles up the traffic to such an extent that one railroad is wholly inadequate to care for it and every year sees greater increase.

With the Western Pacific connection built, Twin Falls is within twenty-four hours of San Francisco and twenty-four hours will put livestock into the coast market with far less shrinkage than at present. Over this line would go both western and eastern shipments, and it is doubtful if a line could be built into the Twin Falls country that would prove a more practical outlet for all kinds of traffic than the proposed Western Pacific. The visit of President Bush is looked upon as an important event.

WANTED SISTER TO DIVIDE.

St. Louis Girl Wanted Share of Sister's Trousseau.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 7.—Miss Theresa Brazill, daughter of Matthew T. Brazill, superintendent of Calvary Cemetery, was married to Roland Van Hoefen of 4414 Hall's Ferry road Saturday morning, an hour after her sister, Miss Marguerite Brazill, had married John J. O'Connor Jr. The marriage of Marguerite Brazill was expected, that of Theresa was not.

Miss Theresa Brazill went to Union Station with her sister and brother-in-law, and after bidding them good-bye, she joined Van Hoefen. The two

went to the home of Gus Ruedi, marriage license clerk, and got a license, which they took, in an automobile to the Rev. Father Phelan of Our Lady of Mount Carmel church, who had just married the other couple.

He hesitated, on account of the fact that Van Hoefen is not a Catholic, but he finally consented to perform the ceremony.

Ruedi said that Miss Marguerite told him her marriage would be a great surprise to her family. She added that she had made little preparation.
