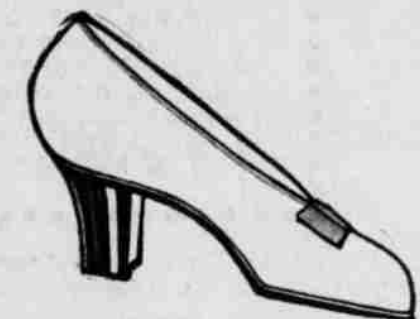

TRIED RECIPES.

Chiffonade Soup.

Boil together one quart of peas, one onion, one slice of ham and one pint of water. When tender remove the ham and put the peas through a vegetable press. Return the pulp to the saucepan and add 1 quart stock. Add to this two heads of lettuce which have been cut fine and cooked until tender with a little bouillon and one tablespoonful of butter. Add salt if necessary and a dash of pepper.

French Beefsteak.

Cut steak two-thirds inch thick from fillet of beef. Dip into melted butter, lay them on a hot gridiron and broil over fresh coals. When nearly done sprinkle with pepper and salt. Have parsley chopped fine and mixed with softened butter. Beat to a cream and pour in middle of dish. Dip steak in the butter, turning them over, and lay them around on platter. Serve with lemon juice.

Hot Potato Salad.

Wash and boil small potatoes in their skins. When done drain, peel and slice, or if very small leave whole. Have ready in the frying pan several slices of fried bacon, the amount depending upon the number of potatoes to be used. There should be enough hot bacon gravy to season the potatoes nicely. When the bacon is crisp remove it and add to the bacon gravy one third as much good elder vinegar as there is bacon gravy, salt and paprika to taste and onion juice if desired. Stir well and add the potatoes. Stir again and serve hot, with the strips of bacon and chopped parsley sprinkled over the top.

Graham Torte.

Separate five eggs; beat the yolks until thick and yellow, then add two level cupfuls of granulated sugar and cream together. Grind enough graham crackers in the food chopper to make one and one-half cupfuls. Stir into this one teaspoonful of baking powder and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Add to the sugar and egg mixture with one cupful of ground nutmegs. Finally, cut in the whites of the eggs, beaten stiff, and bake in two layer cake pans. Make the filling as follows: Heat one cupful of milk with one cupful of sugar in a double boiler, add one tablespoonful of corn starch wet in a very little cold milk. Stir while it thickens, then cook fifteen minutes; pour over a beaten egg, return to the double boiler for a moment's cooking. Then add one teaspoonful vanilla, and set away to cool. Serve the torte with this filling and with whipped cream on top.—Good Housekeeping.

HOME HELPS.

To prevent an iron sink getting rusty, wipe it dry and rub it with a cloth dampened with kerosene.

Wipe out the laundry tubs after each wash day with a cloth, using either kerosene or a good cleansing powder.

If summer squash is cooked immediately after being picked the flavor is decidedly better than if the cooking is delayed even a few hours.

If the rice used for riceing potatoes or other vegetables is heated first, the work is more expeditiously accomplished, and the vegetables are lighter.

A teacher of cooking says that for every quart of cooked vegetables, four even tablespoonfuls of butter, a teaspoonful of salt and an eighth of a teaspoonful of pepper should be used for seasoning.

If one's black gloves become a little rusty, touch up the spots with a few drops of ink mixed well with a few drops of olive oil.

If a square piece of board measuring a foot across is fitted with casters at each corner, it will be found of the greatest convenience when scrubbing the floor or the piazza. The scrubbing pail may be moved along instead of having to be lifted.—Newark News.

PACK IN SALT TO PRESERVE EGGS

To preserve eggs, an old way was to take nice, fresh eggs, some whitewash and a brush and paint the eggs all over, giving them a good thick coating of the wash. After they are dry, pack them in salt, with the small end down, covering with salt each layer, and putting in a layer after layer until the box is full. Cover with several inches of salt on top. When you wish to sell, or use, take them out of the box, wash off, wipe dry with a soft towel, and place on sale at once. The lime fills the pores of the shell and preserves the contents. Some advise that dipping the egg in the whitewash serves the same purpose as brushing it.—Commoner.

CALGARY HAS MUNICIPAL TRACTION LINE AND MAKES IT PAY WELL

CALGARY, Alta., Aug. 8.—In spite of the fact that a large number of outlying feeder lines have been built during the last year, tending to reduce the profits per passenger carried, the net earnings of the Calgary municipal railway system for the month of June show \$12,136.52 as the net earnings for the thirty days.

The gross earnings of the system for the month showed the large total of \$69,967.55 as compared with \$54,968.01 for June of last year which is considered a very satisfactory increase.

Wages of motormen and conductors for the month of June amounted to close to \$20,000 while the wages paid for the corresponding month of 1912 were only about \$13,000. The increase is due to two things, the growth of the system, calling for the employment of more men and the recent in-

crease in wages which makes the employees of the Calgary Municipal railway the highest paid of any city traction system, either public or private owned, in America.

NORTHWEST NOTES

CANYON CITY, Or., Aug. 8.—Canyon City has just completed a new water system. Steel pipe was laid. The cost of the improvements will amount to \$6500. Keeler Bros., of Denver, handled the bonds at par. The system is said to be as good as any of its size in the state. The water supply is taken from a series of springs on Canyon mountain and the pressure for fire protection is 36 pounds.

INDEPENDENCE, Ore., Aug. 8.—In the August term of court docket for Polk county the Valley & Siletz Railway Co. has filed a suit against Henry P. Whiteaker and Jean Whiteaker for condemnation of property in its right of way from Siletz valley. It is said that nearly all the right of way has now been secured and a temporary sawmill at Fort Hoskins has been cutting ties for the new road.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 8.—Now that the Interstate Commerce commission has handed down its decision in fixing interstate express rates, the state railroad commission announces that it will proceed with its hearings into express rates within this state. These hearings were begun, but had to be discontinued on account of the question of interstate rates being unsettled before the interstate commission.

PRAIRIE CITY, Ore., Aug. 8.—During a violent electrical storm here today a water spout struck the headwaters of Dixie creek a few miles north of town and in a few minutes the small stream was transformed into a mountain torrent, carrying everything before it.

Culverts and bridges were swept away. Several ranches and the public highway along the stream were damaged.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Aug. 8.—L. A. Woodward, a contractor of this city, has been awarded the contract for the erection here of the new \$15,000 Carnegie library building. The remainder of the sum of \$17,500 which was appropriated by the Carnegie commission, will be used in the furnishing of the two story brick structure, which will be erected in a grove of oaks on a portion of the home property of E. L. Smith, one of Hood River's pioneer citizens, whose daughters each appropriated \$200 for the library.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 8.—Work was begun today on the construction of the eugenics hall at the state fair grounds. Last year the eugenics or child welfare exhibit, which was held in a tent, proved so popular that proper accommodations are going to be provided for the exhibit this year. The contract was let yesterday for the new machinery building at the fair grounds. Four Salem firms put in bids. The lowest bidder, who was awarded the contract, was Erb & Van Patten. The bid was \$4600, exclusive of the rubber roofing.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 8.—All Aliens who buy a hunting license in this state must also pay \$25 for a gun license before they can be permitted to carry a gun, according to an opinion given today by Attorney General Crawford to State Game Warden William L. Finley. Non-residents of Oregon must pay \$10 for a hunting license in this state.

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 8.—Albert Wagner, son of Mrs. O. Wurttenberger of 881 Division street, Portland, accidentally shot himself in the left leg while hunting in the mountains 60 miles east of Eugene Tuesday evening and brought to this city yesterday afternoon, later being taken to Portland. He and two companions were in the woods and young Wagner accidentally discharged his pistol. The bullet entered his leg above the knee and lodged near the knee cap. He was carried all the way to McKenzie Bridge, about 16 miles distant, by his companions that night and was brought to Eugene in an automobile.

ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 8.—Two horses were instantly killed and a wagon was completely wrecked, but Ralph Bannen, 17-year-old driver, was uninjured save for a few bruises and cuts. When the shasta Limited struck the team one mile south of Shedd.

The accident happened at 4 o'clock yesterday. The Shasta Limited was northbound and was running to make up time. Young Bannen did not notice the train until the team was directly on the track and the cowcatcher struck one horse broadside. Both horses were torn from the wagon and hurled nearly 100 feet.

Upon realizing his peril young Bannen attempted to jump, but struck the broad side of a coach and his escape with only minor injuries is considered a miracle.
