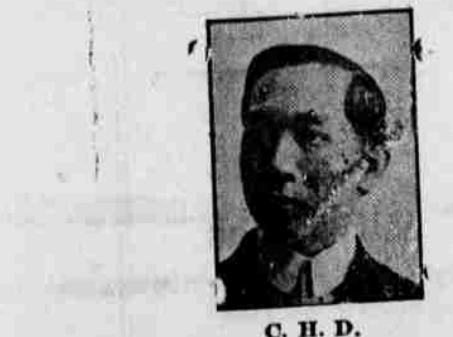

PORTLAND, Aug. 8.—Conditions in the local grain trade are extremely quiet. Views of buyers and sellers are unusually far apart and little business is possible until they come to some understanding regarding values. As a rule sellers are asking 3c a bushel more for wheat than buyers are willing to pay. The stagnation in the foreign cargo trade is causing some concern here and the fact that little business in export flour is expected from the orient immediately, adds to the congestion.
The entire trade in grain is nominal at this time. A small amount of barley business is reported passing at \$2 a ton for feed but not enough sales have been made to establish quotations.
The same is indicated in the oats trade where a very limited amount of grain has been purchased at \$25 a ton for feed.
Market for hay continues to show a rather fair degree of strength but no further change is announced in quotations.
There is practically no movement reported at the moment in the grain bag market, wants of northwest farmers being seemingly supplied for the time being.

Chicago Wheat Market.
CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—Wheat options were weak and somewhat neglected today. Lack of foreign appreciation caused a start 1-4c to 5-8c a bushel below yesterday's closing, while today final figures showed a loss of 1-8c to 3-4c a bushel.
Weakness in the May was most plainly shown both at the opening and the closing and the greatest losses in price were shown in that option.
Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that the wheat opened higher on steadier American cables. Later some selling pressure developed as a result of more favorable weather in Europe for harvesting and the lower opening at Paris. Just before midday the market again reacted and the decline was recovered, being stimulated by unfavorable reports from Russia where harvesting is being delayed by rains.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—There was further weakness in the price of hogs at North Portland yesterday and prices were a nickel to a dime lower than Wednesday. Extreme tops sold at \$9.60, but the bulk of the good offerings would not bring this figure.
The local market continues to show its erratic tone, changing from strength to weakness whenever the eastern markets begin to advance and flopping back to strength whenever the east is quoting lower figures.
Just at present the eastern markets are showing strength for hogs and higher prices are the rule. This seems to be the signal for bearishness at North Portland, although quotations here continue 30c above any other stockyard market in the country.
At Chicago there was a firmer tone in the hog market today with an advance of 5c to 10c. Tops sold there at \$9.25 this morning compared with \$9.60 at North Portland.
Kansas City hog market ruled very firm with an advance of 10c for the day.
