Woman and Her Varied Interests

Bottle Sets.
Sets of bottles in leather cases should prove attractive to the traveler, says the St. Louis Republic. There are four in a case, and they can be used for scent and so forth. In order to tell at a glance what each bottle contains without taking it out of the case, the stoppers are made of different colored enamels--pink, blue, green and mauve. The case is round and divided into four by pieces of leather, so that the bottles may not knock together and be broken. The lid fits firmly over and fastens securely with a strap.

Easy Cheese Dish.
Here's a very easy cheese dish: Prepare neat little pieces of toast, and butter them. For four persons break three eggs into a saucepan, beat up quickly and set over a moderate fire. Add a little pepper and salt to the eggs, but no milk or butter. When they are just about scrambled scrape up well from the pan and stir in a dessert spoonful or so of Parmesan or any grated cheese; add a dash of cayenne pepper heap up lightly on the hot buttered toast and serve. --Chicago Journal.

Mantles Flare.
The newest mantles for both afternoon and evening wear have a decided flare at the bottom, others hang perfectly straight, but never, says Vogue, by any chance are they caught in at the knees. They are made to fasten with buttons and ornamental fastenings which are rarely used, but are worn wrapped about the hips and half slipping from the shoulders.

Iron Bedsteads.
For renovating an iron bedstead that has become shabby looking, the following method is very good, says a New York Press contributor. First rub all the iron parts over with a cloth dipped in paraffin. Then with a brush and a can of white enamel paint all over the bed; then let it dry, and your bedstead will look like new.

Worth Knowing.
Cake icing will not crack when cut if a little thick cream is added to it.

Allow one teaspoonful to each white of egg.
To mend the side of an iron utensil use putty. Place ashes and salt over the putty, which will be effectually hardened in a few days.
If clothes are soaked over night the labor of washing will be greatly lightened by adding one tablespoonful of pure ammonia to each tub of water.

LIFE RISKED FOR BABE.

Mother Badly Burned When She Rushes to Child's Aid.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 15.—Groping her way through flame and smoke, Mrs. C. L. Carlisle of 1114 Sixth avenue, risked her life to save her baby when the one and one-half-story cottage in which she lived caught fire in an unknown manner. The baby was in the dining room and Mrs. Carlisle was working in the kitchen when her attention was attracted by the smell of smoke. Rushing to the dining room door, she found the room in flames, through which she dashed to rescue her baby. She received a number of serious burns.

SOLVES PROBLEM OF BABIES AT THEATERS

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 15.—Harold Ballou, proprietor of a moving picture theater here, has been handed the palm by Seattle mothers. Ballou's theater is in the residence section and much patronized by mothers and nurse girls who bring small babies to the movie house with them. Every time a baby began to cry the mother or nurse was asked to leave. Ballou always refunded the money. Now Ballou has had built along one side of the wall a large glass enclosed room in which mothers and nurses can take the noisy babies and still see the pictures.

HUERTA'S AMBASSADOR TO PARIS VISITS U. S.



NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Acting on special instructions of President Wilson, the authorities extend the courtesies of the port to Senor Francisco de la Barra, ambassador from Mexico, to France, and his friends, who arrive here. De la Barra seemed touched by the courtesies and when he read of the attitude of Mexicans toward Americans he expressed regret. He said that he did not think it would be the best policy for the United States to intervene in the trouble in Mexico.

MORE FREEDOM WILL BE GIVEN TO H. S. PUPILS

New State Superintendent Makes Graduation in 3 Years Possible--Credits in Music.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 15.—In preparing the new course of study for the high schools of Oregon, State Superintendent J. A. Churchill has given pupils a greater freedom in selection even than was forecasted in the report of the committee of city school superintendents, appointed at the meeting of the department of superintendents at Portland last June to outline a tentative course of study.

"We have gotten away from the idea that the high school course must be fitted to the college," declared Mr. Churchill. "In fact we have emancipated ourselves from college dominance. But I am instructing the high school principals to advise each pupil entering high school what the college entrance requirements are, so that the pupil may prepare for entering college if he desires. As soon as I can get to it I intend to have statistics gathered showing the percentage of high school pupils in this state that go to college. I estimate it will be about 15 per cent."

"In the preparation of the high school courses, consideration has been given for the different aptitudes of pupils and for the different preparations which a high school must give to fit all of its pupils for larger spheres of usefulness."

Developing Natural Bents.
"Greater freedom in the choice of electives has been given with the hope that pupils will not be forced to take a subject for which they have no aptitude but rather that courses will be selected that will give a natural development of the faculties."

Two important innovations have been made by Superintendent Churchill. One is that a pupil who is both mentally and physically strong may complete a high school course in three years, instead of four, by taking five subjects, the maximum number each year. Another is that a pupil may study music outside of school and be given credit for it as a part of the course.

"My experience in high school work years ago led me to believe an injustice was being done pupils who had a talent for instrumental or vocal music, and were not permitted to develop it because of the rigid high school course which recognized no value in any subject taught outside the prescribed course studies of the course," said Mr. Churchill. "Many a voice that might have been a joy to the possessor and his friends by entertaining, or by assisting in worship, has been hushed by the inability of the pupil to find time to practice. The same may be said of those who might have become proficient on some stringed instrument, but who were denied that pleasure because the rigid curriculum of the high school demanded all their time. So we are instructing that pupils who so desire be given credit for music done outside of school, which will permit them to carry on a less study in school and have time for practice on their music. In doing this I feel that the best interests of many pupils as well as those of the community generally are being served."

But Must Practice 80 Minutes

Under the prescribed course, which was completed by Superintendent Churchill and put in the hands of the printer, a pupil may earn from one to three credits for graduation, in either vocal or instrumental music taken outside of school, provided that the pupil has spent at least 80 minutes in practice or instruction each day, and that the principal of the high school shall be satisfied as to the competency of the teacher. A total of 15 credits is required for graduation. The teachers' training course in the high schools has been strengthened in the new course by requiring pupils taking it to have definite teaching practice and submit written reports of each assignment.

REQUIREMENTS FOR FREE TIMBER GIVEN

Louis Sharp, chief of the field division of the general land office at Portland is sending out circulars governing the free use of timber on public mineral and non-mineral lands. The following are the requirements as set forth in these circulars, copies of which have been received in Pendleton:

1. That in all cases where the amount of timber to be cut does not exceed \$50 in stumpage value the person or persons for whose use the timber is to be cut must notify the Chief of Field Division before commencing to cut.

2. In all cases where the amount of timber desired will exceed \$50 in stumpage value, an application must be filed by the petitioner or petitioners, and if the cutting is to be done through an agent, a copy of the contract establishing the agency must be filed with the application, together with a bond in the sum equal to triple the amount of the stumpage value of the timber applied for.

3. The area from which the timber is to be cut must be limited in extent which will actually produce the amount of timber applied for.

4. Non-resident corporations are not entitled to cut timber under the regulations.

5. The cutting of timber for traffic or sale will not be permitted.

6. In all cases where more than \$50 stumpage value of timber is required, application must be made and permits granted by the Chief of Field Division or Department of the Interior before the applicants will be permitted to proceed with their cutting. Any cutting in advance of the actual granting of the permit will be trespass.

Blanks upon which to make application will be furnished upon request. All communications, applications, etc., from parties residing in the vicinity of your office should be addressed to Chief of Field Division, Portland, Oregon.
