WHEAT MARKET IS BULLISH

Chicago Market Gains Rapidly in Price With Short Covering During Morning.

CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—Wheat market trade was extremely bullish at the start and an advance of 3-8@5-8c a bushel was forced. There was considerable short covering at the start and this gave the market an extremely bullish position. Closing figures were fractionally lower than the opening, but still showed a net gain of 1-4@3-3c over yesterday.

NO FIREWORKS AT NEW YORK CAPITAL
 ALBANY, Aug. 21.—Expectation that the re-convening of the legislature would be productive of spectacular developments in the muddled gubernatorial situation failed of realization. Rumor that Acting Governor Glynn would submit a message bearing in some way on his official status drew large crowds to the capitol, but few members appeared.

Sarecky, Governor Sulzer's private secretary throughout the gubernatorial campaign and Frederick L. Colwell who is alleged to have been Mr. Sulzer's dummy in certain stock transactions.

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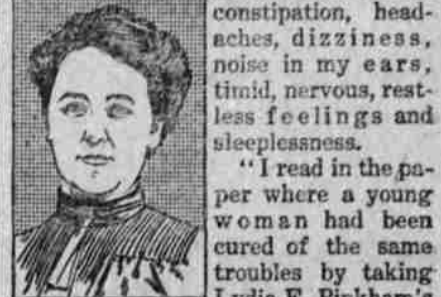
