"You just slip into that closet. I have some work to do," commanded the unwelcome visitor.

## 6 MONTHS REMARRIAGE LAW OF OREGON NOT A BAR IN OTHER STATES

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 22.—The attorney general has advised W. B. Marsh, pastor of St. Paul's M. E. church at Tacoma, that a divorced person may remarry in some other state permitting it in less than six months from the date of the divorce and then come to Oregon and have the marriage considered legal in this state. In this state a divorced person cannot remarry within six months after obtaining a divorce. The attorney general also held that a physician cannot charge more than \$2.50 for issuing the marriage medical certificate which is required to be obtained by prospective bridegrooms. These certificates must be made under oath.

## Woman and Her Varied Interests

### TRIED RECIPES.

**Sheep Tongue With Spinach.**  
Braise a number of sheep tongues with salt pork, parsley, onion, some whole peppers, one teaspoon sugar, and enough stock to cover them. Let them simmer one and a half hours. Served with spinach in the center of the dish and seasoned with lemon juice, a little of the tongue stock, some cayenne pepper salt and butter. Serve the tongue around it with Jiamonds or fancy cuts of fried bread around the outside circle.

**Sheep Tongues a la Mayonnaise.**  
Boil half a dozen sheep tongues with one or two slices of bacon, one carrot, one onion, two cloves, two or three sprigs of parsley, salt and pepper, enough boiling water or stock to cover them. Let them simmer about one and a half hours, replenishing the boiling water or stock when necessary. When thoroughly done skim and trim them neatly and lay between two plates to flatten them. Arrange them in a circle around a dish with a mayonnaise sauce poured in the center.

**Sheep Tongue With Sauce Tartare.**  
Boil the tongue in salted water into which has been squeezed the juice of half a lemon (for six tongues). Serve with sauce tartare. Sauce—To a scant half pint mayonnaise sauce, made with mustard added, mix in two tablespoons capers, one small shallot, small onion, two gherkins or two ounces cucumber pickle and two tablespoons parsley—all chopped very fine. This sauce will keep a long time and is delicious for fried fish, fried oysters, boiled fish, boiled tongue or as dressing for a salad.

**Priscilla's Cake.**  
Chop very fine two cups dried apples and let stand over night covered with cold water. In the morning drain off the water and cook the apples in one cup maple syrup, simmering gently an hour. Cream together one cup granulated sugar with half a cup butter. Dissolve a third of a teaspoon of soda in one cup buttermilk or sour milk and stir it into the apple mixture; add three well beaten eggs, and mix in two cups flour sifted twice, and one teaspoon cinnamon. The last ingredient is one cup chopped nuts. They probably used chinquapins or hickorynuts in Priscilla's time, but any other kind will do as well. The frosting of the cake should be tinted a golden color with a little egg yolk mixed in. Flour with orange, and ornament with green berries.—San Francisco Call.

### Net Device to Protect Waist.

Waist protectors of fine net, to be worn under the coat collar for the protection of the waist beneath it, are made of net and lace, says the Philadelphia Times.

One attractive style is made of the white net, a strip about half a yard wide laid in soft plaits and finished at the ends with white silk tassels. Another style is made of two strips of shadow lace edge fastened together along the straight edges with a piece of narrow lace beading. This protector is finished with gilt tassels.

Some of the protectors are allowed to crumple and fold naturally under the coat, some are held straight and flat with wire collar stiffener four or five inches high.

### Bathtub Cleaner.

A simple device for keeping the bathtub clean consists of a flat nickel handle into which is fastened a piece of heavy Turkish toweling, says the Newark News. The cleaner is so made that it is easily manipulated by means of the handle. Another point in its favor is that the cleaner is not an objectionable addition to the bathroom fittings.

### To Polish Brass.

When a house has been closed for some time, brass taps and door handles are apt to become tarnished, says the Louisville Herald. One of the best methods of removing the tarnish is that of dipping the end of a cloth in oil and then finely powdered rotten stone, rubbing this over the brass work until a polish is gained.

### Dinner Wagon.

"A dinner wagon" solves the waitress problem, says the New Haven Journal-Courier. Have it two or three decks in a wood to match the other furniture of the dining room. Upon the dinner wagon have the cook arrange the dinner, hot plates, cold plates, finger bowls and all, and let her roll it in beside the head of the family. The distribution will be easy and much time and energy saved.

### Peach Trifle.

This is the season for peach trifle, says the Chicago Journal. Make a soft custard, using two egg yolks, two cups of milk, two tablespoonsfuls of sugar and a little vanilla. Moisten sponge cakes or lady fingers with cream and arrange them in a dish. Put slices of fresh peach in the middle and over the cake, pour the custard over all, whip half a pint of cream sweeten and flavor with vanilla, and float on top.

### Use Cornstarch.

When laundering shirt waists and delicate fabrics, use cornstarch, as it gives a soft finish, says Los Angeles Express.

Take one tablespoonful of cornstarch mix with a little cold water, stir into one quart boiling water; boil two minutes. A piece of French glass the size of a bean adds to smoothness. Dilute with cold water to desired consistency.

### Worth Knowing.

A little baking powder added to a bread pudding makes the dessert lighter, says the Newark News. If windows or screens are raised every day or two and the sills wiped off with a damp cloth, the amount of dusting indoors will be considerably lessened.

Unless the water in vases of flowers is changed daily an unpleasant odor may develop. A tiny piece of charcoal in the water helps to keep it sweet.

Wheat bran will be found more satisfactory than soap in washing hats

and other similar prints. Tie a quart of bran in a sizable piece of cheese cloth, and use this for rubbing on the print material, as one would soap. Do not use too hot water, lest the starch from the bran be cooked. Rinse the clothes in blue as one would if washed in the usual way.

### Tea Cozy.

White linen embroidered in a French and eyelet design would make a very attractive tea cozy, says the Cleveland Plain Dealer. Two sizes of the white embroidered cozy should be just alike and joined together with Cluny lace insertion.

The linen cover is made over a padded lining, the color of which should be in harmony with the other tea table decorations. Several layers of wadding should be used, enough to make the cozy serviceable without its being bulky. A large crocheted button fastened to the top serves as a handle.

### How Appenzel Stitch is Made.

The Appenzel stitch is really just laying sation stitch in the opposite direction from that usually employed when doing this work. The stitches are laid from the base of the petal or leaf to the tip.

The padding is laid from side to side in the way that finished satin stitch is worked, then the outer covering is laid from stem to tip. A different appearance from the original satin stitch is thus produced, which is quite effective for some flower forms.

This method of working is often seen in the French embroideries, but is now used to carry out the larger patterns. The name is taken from a little town in Switzerland, where this method of embroidering large flower forms was first used.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

### New Stationery.

Some of the new stationery comes in white and soft grays and blues, says the New York Press. It is edged with a hair line of netrose and the initials in fine script are stamped on the flap of the envelopes as well as on the paper itself.

## LANE RIDES 300 FEET IN MIDAIR

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 22.—Swinging over the great gap in the canyon of Holse river, 300 feet above the construction work on the Arrow Rock dam, Secretary Franklin K. Lane of the interior department, yesterday braved all the dangers of this perilous trip in a skiff dangling from the cables to inspect the wonderful engineering feat the reclamation service is executing in the erection of the highest impounding concrete irrigation dam in the world.

The act of the secretary when he volunteered to make the ride in the skiff with Chief Engineer A. P. Davis is taken by reclamation officials here to be conclusive of his desire to get at the inside facts of work executed under his department.

"I count the experience at Arrow Rock one of the most novel in my life," enthusiastically declared Secretary Lane last night, following his return from the site of the big dam. "The trip on the skiff was not overly dangerous, although we were in mid-air 300 feet above the dam works, and rode across the canyon and then back again."

### Engineering Feat Big.

"Arrow Rock presents one of the great engineering problems that the reclamation service has solved for the conservation of water in the flood season for use during the late irrigation months. I enjoyed the day thoroughly and am now glad that our party was slightly delayed, for it afforded me the opportunity of viewing this gigantic dam, as well as permitted me to see for myself the manner in which the competent men in charge are carrying on the work."

### CORPORATIONS TO BE SUED.

Commissioner Watson Will Enforce Blue Sky Law Requirements. SALEM, Ore., Aug. 22.—Corporation Commissioner Watson sent to all delinquent investment companies letters informing them of their duty not to comply with the blue sky law by making a statement of their business by September 5 they would be proceeded against by the district attorney. The letter, in part, says:

"This department has been lenient in its enforcement of the law in order that all companies affected might have adequate opportunity and ample time to comply with the provisions, and adjust themselves to the requirements of the act."

### A. R. BURFORD DIES OF CANCER TUESDAY

Former Cashier of First National Bank Dead at Home in Hollywood.

WALLA WALLA, Aug. 22.—A. R. Burford, formerly cashier of the First National bank in this city, died Tuesday morning from cancer of the liver, at his home in Hollywood, California, a suburb of Los Angeles, according to word received here yesterday from his son, Harry Burford. Burial will probably be in California.

Mr. Burford was one of the pioneer business men of this city, coming here many years ago. He was cashier of the First National bank here for a number of years, but resigned about five years ago to reside in California for his health. He is survived by two sons, Richard and Harry, his wife and three daughters.
