## Woman and Her Varied Interests

### Worth Knowing.

One of the chief reasons why so-called "clear" soup is often cloudy is because every trace of fat has not been removed from the stock. Allow the stock to become cold and solid, then remove all the grease.

Discolored ivory may be restored to its original whiteness by painting it with spirits of turpentine and putting it out in the sunshine for two or three days.

In washing dishcloths, instead of using soap or borax put a quantity of soda in the water and boil the dishcloths. The grease and soda make a soap that does its own work.

If you wish flower cuttings to bloom while the plants are small, put them in small crocks. As soon as the crocks are filled with roots they begin blooming, especially geraniums.—Minneapolis Journal.

### Chicken Royal.

For chicken royal one five or six pound chicken, four sweetbreads, one can mushrooms will be needed, says the Montreal Star. Boil chicken day before it is to be used and allow it to stand in the liquor over night. Then cut up as for salad. Boil sweetbreads in a saucepan put one quart of cream; into another put four table-spoonfuls of flour. Add heated cream stirring until mixture thickens. Flavor with a little onion, season with salt and paprika. Put chicken, mushrooms and sweetbreads together; stir into the cream mixture, put in a buttered baking dish and cover with buttered bread crumbs. Bake 20 minutes.

### WISE TO CONCENTRATE COOKING ON SUMMER DAYS

For the comfort of all concerned, especially if the home is a small one, choose your meals in summer with a view to economizing in fuel, and thus avoid as far as possible the overheating of the house.

Plan to concentrate the cooking, where this can be done; that is to say, if it is necessary to use the oven for any baking, plan ahead, and prepare other baked things at the same time, with the same expenditure of fuel.

If a pudding is to be baked, the same fire, whether it be of gas or coal, will bake potatoes for dinner. And while you are baking these potatoes for today, do a few extra ones and set them aside. They will be ready for creaming tomorrow and be far better for the purpose than boiled ones. Again, when cooking string beans, boil a double portion, serve half of them today and reserve the remainder for use at another meal. They can be reheated in a cream sauce or dressed with oil and vinegar or lemon juice, and served on crisp lettuce leaves as a salad. A little onion juice may be added and if used sparingly it will add piquancy to the salad. Spinach can be served in the same way, and no one needs be told of the gastronomic delight of asparagus served with a vinaigrette sauce or a hollandaise sauce.

It is better to eliminate pies and rich puddings from the summer menu. The making of such heavy desserts means the use of too large a quantity of lard, butter and such heavy and cloying ingredients, as well as the heating of the kitchen unnecessarily while they are cooking, says the Woman's Magazine.

Serve seasonable fresh fruits, well cooled and carefully picked over so as to have them appear at their best; or, if preferred, serve them in the form of ice creams or refreshing water ices. It takes neither more time nor material to prepare ice cream than a pie, and the results will be more appreciated if the former is served instead of the latter.

Where a gas range is used, it will be found a decided economy to purchase a steam cooker and a small portable oven, either of which will fit under a burner of the gas range and which afford ample space to cook for a family of three or four. With the steam cooker an entire meal, with the possible exception of a sauce or gravy, can be cooked over one burner.

### France Agrees on Mothers' Pensions.

PARIS, Aug. 25.—Final details of the mothers' pension law were agreed upon today by the cabinet after a report submitted by the minister of the interior and the minister of labor. During the period of repose made compulsory by the new law, the government will allow a pension to all mothers who work, from 10 cents to 30 cents per day until the child is born. In case the mother nurses the baby her pension will be increased 10 cents per day. The sum of \$2,000,000 has been provided to meet the extra expense, departments and communes sharing the burden of the state.
