Tramping Skirts.

To Peel Eggs.

Hot boiled eggs are easy to peel. Drop from boiling water into basin with sufficient force to crack shell. Pour on cold water, let stand one minute drain off and peel without difficulty. Good for both soft and hard-boiled eggs.—Los Angeles Express.

Baked Eggs.

For baked eggs make a rich cream sauce as for creamed chicken and turn into a buttered baking dish, slip eggs on top of this and cover all with buttered crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven until eggs are set and crumbs

Canned Corn.

Cut corn from cob, salt as for cooking, pack in can (either glass or tin), lay lid over can, put in boiler in cold water and let boil for three hours, take out, wipe off cans and seal. As good as fresh corn.—Los Angeles Express.

COOPERATIVE FOREST FIRE PROTECTION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—(Special)—During the last quarter of the fiscal year, the federal government entered into co-operative fire protection agreements with the following states: Maine, New York, Minnesota, Montana, Washington and Oregon. These six agreements contemplate the protection from fire of approximately \$7,000,000 acres of land on the forested watersheds of navigable streams, for which purpose \$51,500 of federal funds have been made available. There are at the present time 14 states which are engaged in active co-operation of this kind, and it is possible that three new states, Kentucky, South Dakota and West Virginia will be added by early fall.

The federal government, though it has allotted a total of \$85,000 for the work of the present season, is a minor contributor in the aggregate. Under the impetus given to fire protection of navigable watersheds through this arrangement the co-operating states will expend an aggregate of \$6 for every dollar which the federal government spends, to which may be added about \$2 more from private sources.

These amounts, of course, do not represent the sum total of expenditures for fire protection even in these states. For in some of them the state itself is spending considerably more money in the protection of forested lands lying outside the watersheds of navigable streams. On the national forests, too, the government is spending several times the amount of its contribution to co-operative fire protection in the states which contain no forest land.

Aside from these governmental agencies the railroads, lumber companies (both individually and through their co-operative protective associations) municipalities and private land owners throughout the country are growing more and more alive to the needs of better forest fire protection and are devoting each year an increased sum to this work.

ROADS GET EXTRA CARS FOR ROUND-UP

From as far east as Montana, passenger reservations from points along the line of the Northern Pacific Railroad for the Pendleton Round-up on September 11, 12 and 13 are in such demand that it has become a question of supplying enough sleeping cars, diners and coaches to handle the crowds who want to attend the wild west show. A. D. Charlton, assistant general passenger agent, said yesterday that all previous travel records to the Round-up will be far eclipsed, says the Portland Oregonian.

"With the Round-up still more than two weeks away, we have had to make arrangements for parking 80 cars at Pendleton to care for those who come over our lines," said Mr. Charlton. "The fame of the big frontier show has gone out until people are determined to see it. We will have to draw on extra diners and sleepers from Eastern divisions."

The same heavy demand for accommodations is in evidence on the lines of the O. W. R. & N. company.

"I am not exaggerating when I say that 25,000 visitors will be in Pendleton for the Round-up," said William McMurray, general passenger agent of the O. W. R. & N. "I am expecting the largest assemblage of people from the outside that ever gathered on the Pacific coast for a single event. We are now assembling extra sleepers, diners and coaches."

"Pendleton will be able to take care of all who come. The Round-up people have built an addition to the grand stand that will seat from 4000 to 5000 additional people."

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

PARIS, Aug. 26.—Thieves and incendiaries have the longest feet of all classes of French criminals, says Dr. Charles Perrier, police surgeon at Nimes, basing his conclusions on ten years' investigation. Counterfeiters come next and these are followed by tramps, swindlers and poisoners.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 26.—George Jahnnus is looking for the kind friend who leaves "cats" on his front porch each night. For four successive mornings he has found a plump dressed chicken on the doorstep. The last time a bottle of claret lay beside the fowl.

LONDON, Aug. 26.—Jack Johnson's habit of talking too much has cost him money again. The big black pugilist was to have appeared here in a vaudeville sketch but he gave out an interview to the effect that any one whose brain was properly developed should know he is not the man the newspapers reported him to be, and Manager Tozer of the vaudeville circuit promptly cancelled his engagement.

Ellis, 42 years old, has signed an agreement before Municipal Judge Stevenson that he will cling to the "water wagon" for one year, no matter how perilous the passage. The pledge he signed reads: "I, E. K. Ellis, solemnly promise and swear that I will not touch any liquor of any kind for one year from date."
