Scalloping Made Simplified.

The matter of buttonholing scallops and embroidering letters is certainly simplified these days. There are people who begrudge the time necessary to pad the letters or scallop before placing the final stitches. For such the foundations of paper-mache are a great boon, says the Newark News. Scallops in a variety of patterns, many styles of letters and even combinations of letters, as well as such familiar designs as buckles, shields and other insignia for the small child's sailor suit, are to be had for the seeking. These are to be carefully basted into place, and then the satin stitch may be put in.

If one prefers to do her own stamping, the paper patterns, requiring only the pressure of a warm iron, are most satisfactory. The stencil, for one's monogram, is little if any more expensive than buying the transfer letters, and it has the advantage of course, of being somewhat more distinctive than the regulation stock letters.

Quick Cooking Little Utensil.

A little cooking apparatus that seems destined to render real service to persons out camping or traveling and even to the commissariat departments of armies has been devised by a Frenchman, says the Philadelphia North American. It consists of two hollow metal plates fitting into each other, and when one is reversed fitting almost airtight. Each has a removable handle. A small tripod completes the apparatus, which weighs a trifle more than 14 ounces.

It is intended for rapid cooking. In it, according to its inventor, a chop, a steak or vegetable may be cooked in from two to four minutes. The material is placed in one of the plates with a little butter, dripping or oil and covered with the other plate. It is placed upon the tripod. Three torches are made by tearing the pages of a newspaper lengthwise and twisting them. These are lighted one after

the other and placed successively under the pan in such a way that the flame licks the whole under surface. By the time the third torch has burned itself out the cooking is finished. It is due to the heat retained within the tightly closed vessel and to the steam generated in it that the cooking takes place so rapidly.

Cremationists in Session.

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 27.—The first annual session of the Cremation Society of America met here today to discuss a systematic plan for distributing propaganda to make cremation supplant burial of the dead. The cremationists were formally welcomed by the mayor and other city officials. The most important resolution submitted today was that urging "the Congregation of the Inquisition of the Roman Catholic church to rescind the decrees opposing incineration."

FAST BOATS IN RIVER CONTEST

HAMILTON, Ill., Aug. 27.—Some of the fastest boats in the world today are competing in the annual regatta of the Mississippi Power Boat Association. Hundreds of boats from all over the United States and Canada are entered in the events. Several boat clubs which are represented have chartered river steamers and will make their headquarters aboard them during the races. The course is on Cooper Lake, which was enlarged greatly by the huge Keokuk dam dedicated today. The course is 2 1-2 miles but later may be lengthened to five miles. A grand stand on the bluffs overlooking the lake makes it an ideal spot for water sports.

Commodore J. Stuart Blackton, whose "Baby Reliance" set new records at Davenport, has two new "Reliances," in which he hopes to make more than sixty miles an hour. The "Baby Reliance" made 53.9 miles an hour last year. Commodore James A. Pugh of Chicago is expected to win several events with his "Disturber III," a 700-horse power hydro-aeroplane, "Teaser IV," owned by Ed Moritz and Will Evers of Quincy, Ill., also is expected to figure in the win column.

Several cities are in the field for next year's events, including Muscatine, Burlington, Rock Island and St. Paul. The northern cities are likely to combine to take the event north, it was said today. Charles P. Hanley, present vice admiral, is candidate for the post of admiral, held by Joseph Nelson. Both are of Bellevue, Iowa.
