Showers of ashes fell on the ship on July 16 in latitude 56 north, longitude 156 west.

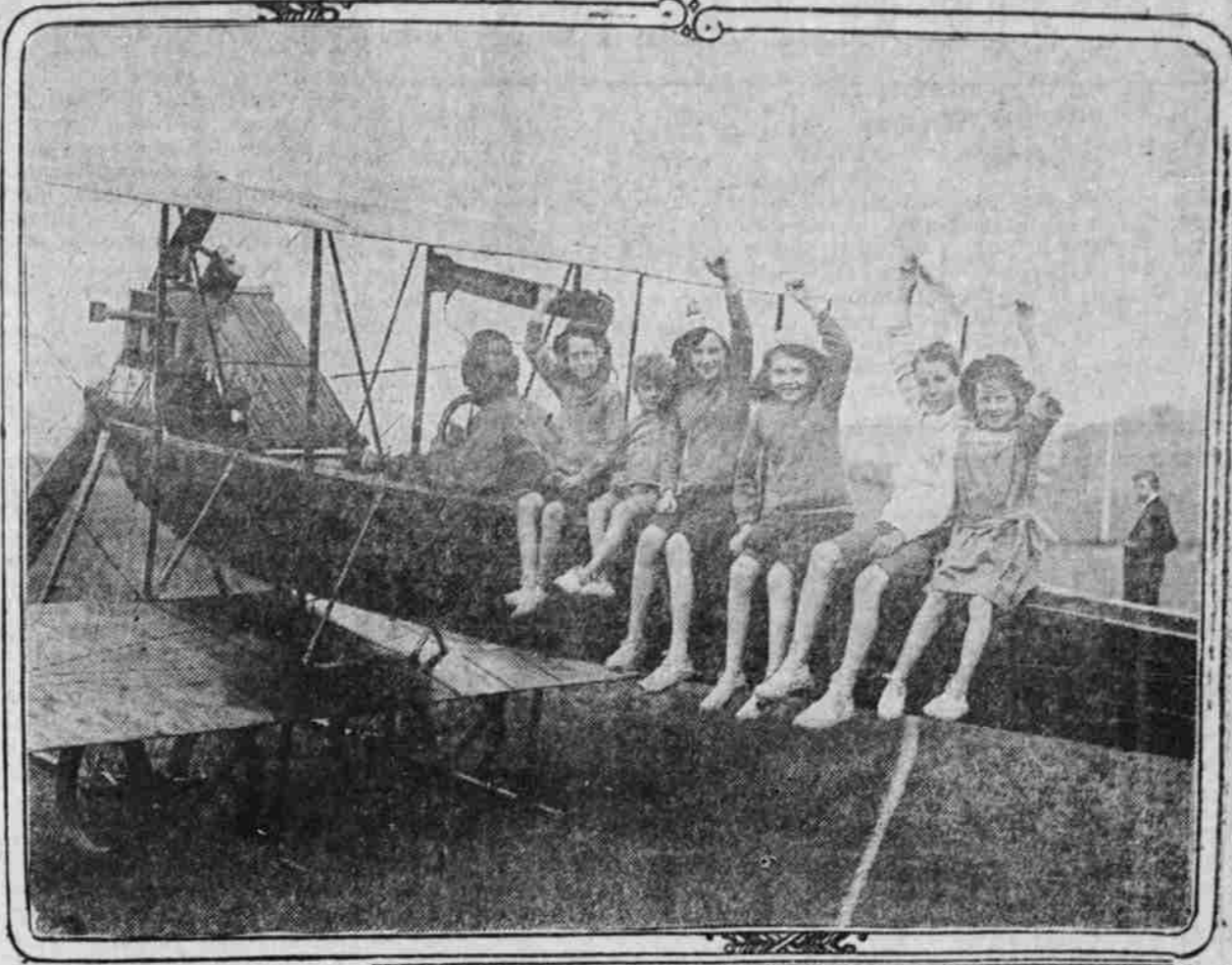

"Why we think we have reached the limit with our forty story skyscrapers, our mile-a-minute trains and our giant ocean steamers. DAIRYING CONTEST IS NEXT IN SCHOOLS

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 29.—With a view of arousing greater interest in dairying and in the work in rural schools, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill has concluded to inaugurate in cooperation with the State Agricultural college a dairying contest in the rural schools. The work will be under direction of W. A. Barr, who represents the United States dairy division and the extension department of the college. The plan will be to try out the contest thoroughly in one county and then extend the work. Polk county has been selected as first in which to begin operations. All boys and girls in the seventh and higher grades will be allowed to participate, and a list of attractive prizes will be prepared.

BIG FOUR LINES PASS DIVIDEND; FLOOD CAUSE

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Directors of the Cleveland, Cincinnati, Chicago & St. Louis (the Big Four) passed the regularly quarterly dividend of 1 1/4 per cent on the preferred stock. Loss of business and increased operating cost consequent upon the flood of last Spring are given as reasons.

ONE KIDNAPERS HELD IN \$500 BONDS EACH

HEPPER, Ore., Aug. 29.—Mr. and Mrs. M. Williams, alias C. K. Smaller, were given preliminary trial here before Judge C. C. Patterson, charged with kidnaping Mrs. Williams's two children from their grand parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Grabbill of Ione, and were bound over in the sum of \$500 each to appear at the November term of circuit court.

Mrs. Williams is widow of a son of the Grabbills, who was killed in a Southern Pacific wreck near Los Angeles some three months ago. She had left him two years ago and claims to have a divorce. Upon the death of his son Mr. Grabbill went to Los Angeles and was appointed custodian of the children, \$4000 life insurance being turned over and \$8000 more life insurance being due.

Mr. and Mrs. Williams are now in jail awaiting bonds, which they expect to secure through R. N. Simpson of the Crystal Laundry of Portland.
