OREGON MARKSMEN BEAT ALL STATES

CAMP PERRY, O., Aug. 30.—In the front rank of marksmanship among the militia of the United States stand the 12 Oregon sharpshooters that General Finzer brought to the national match. They defeated every other state team yesterday, 46 of them and also the crack United States infantry, thrice winner of the national trophy. The Oregonians' 2605 was beaten by only two United States aggregations of professional shots, the cavalry, which took the trophy, its first, and a popular victory with 2675, and the navy, twice winner with 2655. By three points Oregon outshot the 1911 service winners, the marine corps. The United States infantry, which led up to the skirmish test this

morning, blew up and stopped eighth. On the skirmish Oregon beat it 100. Oregon skirmish scores follow: Sergeant Folford, 96; Sergeant H. F. Pearson, 95; Sergeant Mooney, 87; Sergeant Maples, 72; Lieutenant Stevens, 86; Sergeant White, 76; Sergeant H. T. Conner, 74; Sergeant H. B. Conner, 78; Sergeant J. W. Pearson, 85; Sergeant Taylor, 83; Sergeant Romaine, 95; Seaman Spooner, 91. Total 1009.

Washington ranked sixteenth, with 2538. General Finzer has been appointed captain of the militia team in the united service match today.

PROPOSAL IS INTERRUPTED.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—Robert G. Norton, a real estate dealer of Savannah, arrested on telegraphic request from the Savannah Chief of Police, who telegraphed that Norton was wanted on charge of manipulating

a check, was locked up in default of \$2000 bail until September 3, to await the arrival of detectives from Savannah. Norton was arrested at the home of Miss Edna Robinson in Brooklyn. She said he was proposing marriage to her when the detectives called him out and took him away.

EXPOSURE CAUSES DEATH OF PATIENT

WALLA WALLA Wash., Aug. 30.—Rev. John H. Caley, pastor of the Church of God, of Juniper street, died last night of typhoid fever. He suffered a serious relapse after his escape from the hospital and exposure Thursday night.

He was delirious from typhoid fever and while his nurse was absent from the room he leaped out of bed through a screened window and ran through the streets, yelling: "Help, murder, police." He wore only his nightclothes. Two shots were fired, supposedly at him, by some householder who did not understand his condition. He ran into some brush and tore most of his clothing off.

A dozen alarms were telephoned to the police station from different points and the sheriff's office was also notified, half a dozen officers seeking to locate the scene of the supposed murder and the slayer. Finally Mr. Caley was found almost exhausted. He was hurried to the hospital. He knew nothing of what had occurred.

Woman and Her Varied Interests

For a Cream Pie.

To make a satisfactory filling for a cream pie or cake, one has only to follow this simple recipe: Mix together half a cupful of flower and half a cupful of sugar, and add gradually to a beaten egg. Stir this mixture into half a pint of boiling milk, and cook until it is creamy and smooth.—Newark News.

Worth Knowing.

Unless one wishes for some special purpose to draw the juices from fresh meat, do not sprinkle the meat with salt.

A syrup made of lemon juice and sugar is delicious on sliced bananas for a luncheon dessert.

A simple dessert is plain boiled rice served with sugar generously mixed with ground cinnamon.

In making brown betty, no matter what fruit is used, pour on the milk, and then add a top layer of crumbs. These crumbs should be dotted with butter. Cook the pudding, covered, till the fruit is done, and then uncover to brown.

A simple syrup for sweetening any fruit drink is made by adding an equal quantity of sugar to boiling water and stirring until the sugar is dissolved. Then boil for 10 minutes without stirring. Keep in a cool place in bottles or jars to use as occasion requires. This is more economical than stirring the sugar into the beverages as they are made.—Newark News.

Fancy Towel of Linen Huck.

An unusually handsome towel can be made of heavy linen huck and coronation crochet insertion. Procure a huck towel of the size desired, the insertion is rather too heavy for the small guest towel with hemstitched ends. Cut one end off about an inch and a half above the hem. On the raw edge of the towel and on the raw edge of the piece cut off make the narrowest possible hem by hand. The coronation crochet to be used is that beautiful lace made by crocheting coronation braid into a design with heavy crochet cotton. It is quite as effective as cluny, according to a New York Press writer. Join the two pieces of the towel, after they are each hemmed, by whipping on to both small hems the strip of insertion. Only one end of the towel should be ornamented in this fashion, the hemstitching being sufficient for the other end.

Play Apron.

One of the new play aprons shows a front and sleeves, but no back. Stamped and tinted designs, showing quaint figures of children, may be bought for a quarter. This price includes fine black cotton for working. Such simple stitches as French knots, lazy daisy and outlining are employed. The material is tan linen. Children's bibs, of a good quality huck, show animal designs of darning in different colors. Borders of grass and trees are worked in green cross-stitch.—San Diego Union.

Luncheon Set.

A lovely luncheon set can be made with the clover leaf motif. Use one clover leaf for the tumbler dolly and a centerpiece with the clover motifs around the outer edge. The motifs should be buttonholed with long and short stitches in green mercerized cotton, outlining the veins in a dark green.—New Orleans Picayune.

Floss Rosette in Embroidery. Rosette embroidery is that embroidery where rosettes of floss are used to form the flowers of the design. This work is more of a hand craft and meets the demand for quick embroidery, says the New Orleans Picayune. The embroidery stitches used are outlining and couching. Any kind of a knot or braiding stitch can be substituted for the couching stitch.

After the embroidery is finished the rosettes are sewed over the stamped goods where the flower forms are indicated.

The ruche stitch, which is an old

and familiar crochet stitch, is usually employed to make the rosettes. The foundation is a chain, the length of the chain depending upon the size the rosette is to be. Insert the hook in the first stitch from the needle, wind the floss three times around a large pencil, draw through and fasten with a tight chain stitch. Repeat this process and length of the chain and then sew the strip around in a widening circle to form the rosette.

The double Irish crochet roses can be substituted with good effects for the ruche rosette. The floss used should be of rather heavy quality and lustrous.

ARRESTED FOR THROWING DYNAMITE INTO STREAM

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 30.—George Martin, foreman of a gang of railroad laborers on the Eugene-Coos Bay Railroad, near Mapleton, is here to answer the charge of dynamiting fish in the Sluslaw river. Deputy Game Warden E. C. Hills charges him with throwing in dynamite, after feeding the fish on salmon eggs, and arrested him as he and the men under him were taking the dead fish out of the water. Martin declared that he was the only one guilty, declaring that none of the others threw any of the dynamite. Deputy Warden Hills also arrested, while at Mapleton, two foreign laborers, one charged with shooting a quail out of season and the other with carrying a gun without the necessary \$25 license required of all foreigners not naturalized.

Woman Charges Feud.

BAKER, Ore., Aug. 30.—To be shot at, the shot missing her but frightening her horse so that she was thrown from the saddle and dragged by the stirrup until badly injured was the story told by aged Mrs. John Olbrich, who came to the city from Big Creek to report to the grand jury.

Mrs. Olbrich says the trouble is the outcome of a feud between the Olbrich and Clayton Harsen families. As she rode past the house Harsen fired at her, so she says. The bullet struck the ground near the horse, who shied, dismounting her. She caught in the stirrup and she was dragged for several yards. Her face, shoulder and hip were bruised and she was unconscious. When she recovered she crawled on her hands and knees to her home one and one-half miles away, the Harsens offering no assistance, she says.

Mrs. Olbrich thinks the alleged shooting is the result of her aged husband's shooting one of the Harsen's horses last spring when he said they broke into his pasture.

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
