BEARS SUCCEED IN TAKING GAME ONE TO NOTHING

Berger Allows Only Three Hits But
Poor Support Is Responsible
for Defeat.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 30.—Filling the bases in the second inning on two errors and one hit, the Bears won the game yesterday afternoon on Augustus' third error of Leonard's grounder, Sheely scoring. That was the only run which crossed the plate, although the Bucks came near tying up the game in the seventh, when Peterson attempted to score from first on Augustus' two-bagger down third base foul line.

Joe Berger was in excellent form yesterday and with better support would have had little difficulty in winning, but the Bucks' usual collection of bunched errors did the business, being the only flaw in a fact, snappy one to nothing game.

Leonard was almost equally as effective, keeping seven hits well scattered. From the second inning on both pitchers were working like machines and the game progressed rap-

idly and with many brilliant fielding plays. It was one of the fastest games of the season, requiring but one hour and 15 minutes.

In the second inning when it all happened, Sheely lead off with a hot grounder to Augustus who fielded perfectly but threw low to Lodell. Lundstrum followed with a sacrifice bunt. Lodell fielding and throwing to Naughton, who dropped the ball. With two on, Johnson hit, filling the bases. Brown then flew out to Augustus and Leonard grounded to Augustus who fumbled and let in a run. Leonard was then caught asleep off first base and Harmon struck out, ending an agonizing inning for a few Pendleton rooters who were visitors in the grandstand.

After that the game went at a ten-second clip, only one more error being made by Lodell when he dropped Children's fly ball in right field. The sides went out in one-two-three order, and in the sixth Berger struck out three in succession. In the eighth the

Bucks went out on three pitched balls which they raised into flies.

RAILROADS READY TO HANDLE CROWD TO THE ROUND-UP

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 30.—Expecting the attendance at the Round-up this year to be record breaking, transportation companies are making elaborate preparations to care for the travel to Pendleton from all places on September 10, 11, 12 and 13. The O.-W. R. & N. Co. has arranged for approximately 20 special trains from different sections of the Northwest to accommodate Round-up visitors, while every regular train will be run with additional equipment for carrying passengers.

On the Umatilla-Pendleton line from September 10 to 13, a steam train will be substituted for the motor service so that larger crowds can be transported. September 11 to 13 the train will leave Pendleton for Umatilla at 6:30 p. m., instead of 5:30 and a special will also be put on the run leaving Pendleton at 10:45 for Umatilla.

On the Pilot Rock branch, the special will leave Pilot Rock at 9:30 a. m. and returning will leave Pendleton at 10:15 p. m. The Baker-Pendleton special will leave Baker at 6 a. m. and La Grande at 7:45, reaching Pendleton at about 10:50 a. m. Returning the train will leave Pendleton at 7 p. m., La Grande at 9:50 p. m. and reach Baker at 11:45 p. m.

On Saturday, September 13 a special from Elgin will leave at 6:45 and returning will reach Elgin at 10:45 p. m., connecting with the Baker-Pendleton special both ways at La Grande.

A special leaving Portland at 10 a. m., September 10, will arrive in Pendleton at 4:55 p. m., going ahead of the regular eastbound train number 18 to relieve it of the pressure of the Round-up travel. September 10, 11, and 12 a 10:30 special will be run out of Portland to reach Pendleton at 7 p. m., September 11, 12 and 13 leaving Pendleton at 11 p. m., it will arrive in Portland at 7 a. m.

Dayton-Pendleton trains will leave Dayton at 7 a. m. and Walla Walla at 9 a. m., arriving at Pendleton at 11 a. m. Returning they will leave Pendleton at 9:30 p. m., on September 11 and 12 and 11 p. m. on September 13. A special Weston-Pendleton train will be run on September 13.

Besides these various trains there are two chartered specials to be run out of Portland, one out of Tacoma, one out of Salem and one out of Spokane, all of which will be parked in Pendleton throughout the Round-up. Special chartered sleepers are to be run to Pendleton from all parts also.

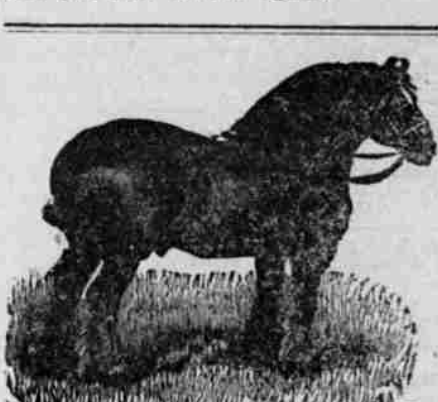

line for the transportation of visitors to the Pendleton Round-up, in spite of the heavy demands made upon rolling stock lately. Passenger officials of the O.-W. R. & N. declare, however, it has been a hard pull to get enough to take care of the big crowd looked for.

Whole trainloads of empty sleepers are to be "deadheaded" from remote regions of the east and far southeast. Regular trains will be made up so that as many Pullmans as possible may be released for the Round-up business and whenever possible cars ordinarily sent east on regular trains will be held over until the celebration is over.

The reason for all this is that many parties have chartered whole cars, which will be transformed into hotels. During the Round-up many visitors will sleep in their cars. At least 50 such charters have already been arranged for singly with as many more included in chartered trains.

One reason for this condition has been the Knight Templar convention at Denver which used up many special trains and special cars. All the cars thus tied up however will be released by September 1 and the equipment will be rushed back westward and put into service again.
