25,000 FARMERS TO BE REACHED

Spokane County Will Inaugurate Campaign to Get More Alfalfa Planted.

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 12.—(Special)—Twenty-five thousand Spokane country farmers will be reached in a campaign to be conducted late this month and all of October in an effort to secure the planting of 200,000 acres of alfalfa this season and next. The Spokane chamber of commerce will manage the campaign in connection with Professor Perry G. Holden, the Iowa corn and alfalfa expert.

Prof. Holden and his staff of lecturers, accompanied by a party of 50 or more Spokane business men, in addition to agricultural college instructors and farmers, will carry the message of alfalfa, stockraising and diversified farming to 140 towns of the surrounding country. The party will travel over 2000 miles of railroad on five different lines.

each station the experts will journey by automobiles to the farm homes, school houses and community centers to show the farmers the profitable results of alfalfa growing.

NAVY DAY BEING CELEBRATED Philadelphia Observes Occasion—Army and Navy Union Members Entertain.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 12.—Philadelphia today celebrated "Navy Day," and thousands availed themselves of the opportunity to see one of the nation's greatest naval bases "on dress parade." The program at League Island navy yard was planned for the two-fold purpose of bringing the people into closer touch with the workings of the navy and to raise funds for the Navy Relief society. An admission was charged and spectators treated to a program of naval, military, athletic and sport exercises. There were also flying boat trips and high diving by the sailors and marines.

PACKING COMPANY IS SCORED BY JUDGE

Assesses Fine and Regrets He Cannot Impose Jail Sentence.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 12.—(Special)—In sentencing the Seattle and Puget Sound Packing company and Menfro Lewis, its vice president \$500 for "selling filthy and decomposed animal matter unfit for human food," Justice of the Peace Fred C. Brown said, "I wish the law would permit me to give you a stiff jail sentence."

The packing company sold 29 cans of so-called Maryland crab meat to the owner of a stand in the public market. When three of the cans were examined by C. W. Johnson, state chemist he found the cans corroded and the meat putrid. "Not only is the meat unfit for food," he said, "but it is poisonous, anyone eating the contents of these cans would have little chance to live."
