PARK SYSTEM TO BE EXTENDED IN CHICAGO IS PLAN

More Baseball Fields Will Be Added—Out of Door Movement Has Come to Stay.

CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—The "out of door" movement has gripped Chicago and is here to stay; it must be dealt with upon a broader scale than was dreamed of ten years ago, according to the new board of park commissioners, recently appointed by Governor Dunne. The commission today announced a comprehensive plan of extending the Chicago park system—heretofore already the best in the world—to care for the hundreds of thousands of fresh-air fans in 1913.

Nine baseball fields in Lincoln Park until this year were considered adequate to meet the demands of all the youthful Ty Cobbies and Walter Johnsons on the north side of the loop district. The park superintendent was swamped with demands for their use this year, however, so many times, that eighty additional acres—to be devoted exclusively to baseball diamonds—have been purchased and will be put into shape before early spring in 1914. Similar additions will be made at Jackson Park and in breathing centers in other congested districts.

Two years ago a dozen bathing beaches, strung along the lake shore, were thought sufficient to care for the great crowds which sought relief from the heat by a cooling plunge in the water. This year other beaches were added, including a one-half mile beach at Jackson park. But it wasn't enough. The play-goers of Chicago needed more. Crowds of young folks and old folks also, stood in line on various Sundays and afternoons for hours at a time awaiting their chances for a dip in the lake.

The locker space at Diversey and Jackson Park beaches, next year will be almost double. The beaches will be stretched several hundred feet. Dredges will increase the size of the beaches. On the south side of the city it is planned to care for thousands daily in new beaches to be in readiness early in June.

Golfers, also, will be afforded better facilities next year, according to the plan of the commission announced today. A new course is to be laid in Lincoln Park at the same time that the ball fields are mapped out. The commission announces that even the additions to Chicago's playgrounds already mentioned may not be sufficient, but that any overflows will be taken care of when additional ball fields, bathing beaches and golf courses are laid out for 1915—for they are considering several years.

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GALLOWAY HERD IS HIGHLY PRAISED

His foundation herd was composed entirely of blue ribbon winners at the International and his herds have been strongly in the money not only in the breed contests but in competition with other breeds at the biggest fairs in the northwest.

Mr. Wesley has received visits from prominent stockmen in the east and their praise has been high. Prof. Kennedy of Ames told Mr. Wesley that with the same fitting given eastern stock, that his herd would take its share of the prize money in the east. Prof. R. C. Ashby of Washington State College, is also intending to buy foundation stock from Mr. Wesley for a college herd.

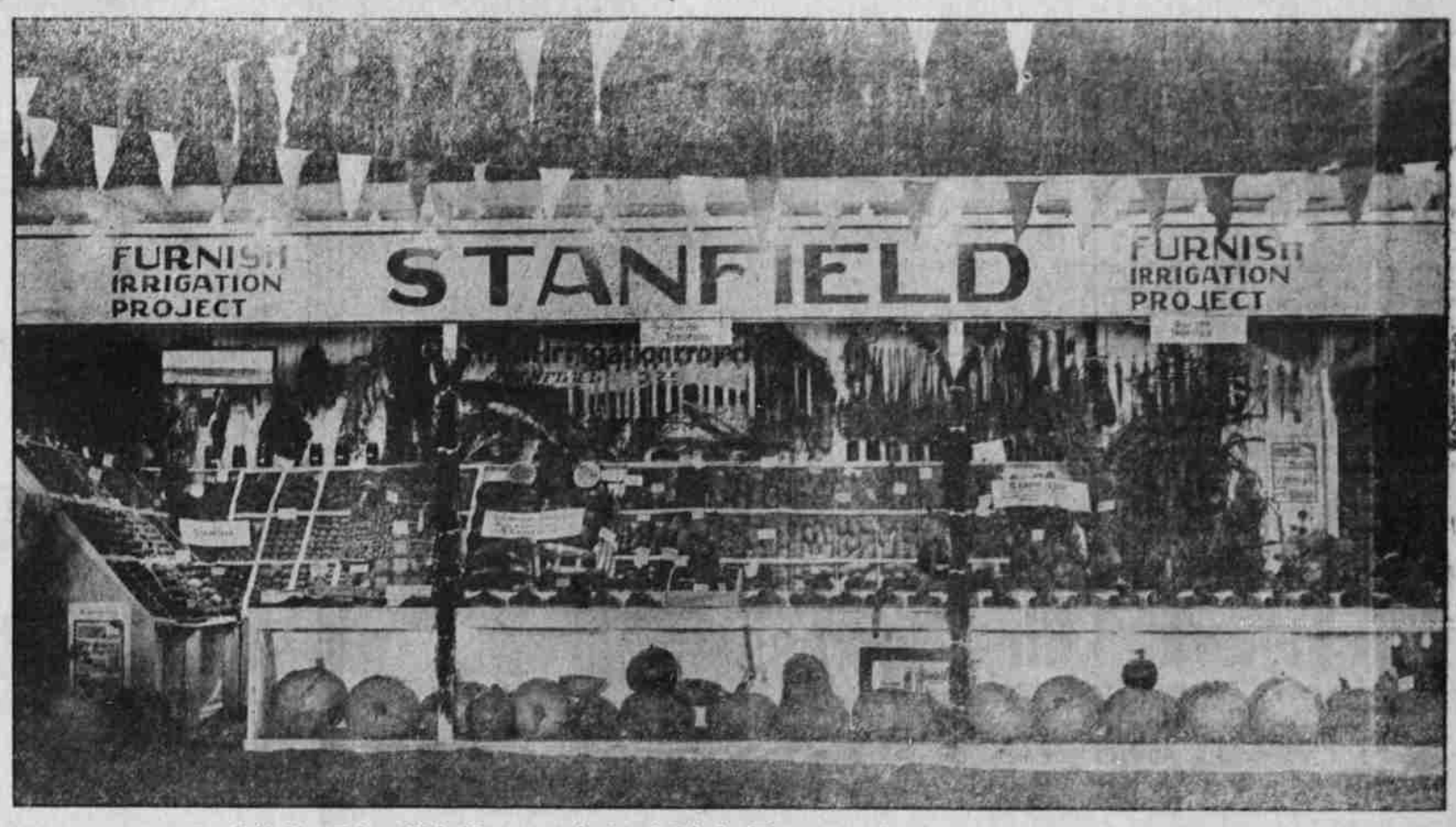

DENVER WOMEN HOLD RECORD

Beat Chicago Fair Ones in Size of Their Feet—and Are Proud of It, Too.

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 13.—Denver women have the biggest feet in the country. The distinction used to be enjoyed by the women of Chicago—at least, so the rest of the world said. But now Denver has wrested the distinction from Chicago women. It was right that this should be so. The Chicago women were ashamed of their big feet. Denver women are proud of theirs.

Miss Clara Houston's foot is typical of the Denver size and shape. Miss Houston says hers is a perfect foot. She is a chiropodist, and therefore she ought to know.

Miss Houston's foot is nine inches long; nine inches around the ball, and nine inches around the instep. Her own says a woman's foot should be one-seventh of her height, and Denver shoe dealers say their customers' feet usually conform to these dimensions.

"The only sizes of women's shoes we ever have left over," said one local dealer, "are those smaller than No. 4. Of this sort we have a big stock. We are trying to sell them off at bargain prices. They are good shoes, and we are willing to sell them for a mere song, but Denver women can't use 'em. They're too small for the Denver foot. We are hoping for an influx of visitors who need shoes and have small feet.

"Denver women's feet, though large, are slenderer than southern or eastern women's pedal extremities. Southern women generally wear EP's and think it a disgrace to call for a larger size than a No. 3. The woman you see sitting over there takes a No. 6; the one beside her wears a No. 5-1-2, and that sturdy-checked, healthy looking girl just entering the store wears a No. 7 and she is still growing. That's about how the sizes run here.

"It's the altitude that makes the women's feet here so large. After women from a lower altitude have been here for a while they have to get their shoes a size or so larger. It hurts 'em, not physically, but in their pride to have to do it, but they finally come to it. Denver women walk taller. That enlarges their feet. And take it from me—one who knows—the owners of Denver feet, as far as women are concerned, are sturdier, more athletic, healthier and more cheerful than the owners of feet in other localities."

The negro had been in town only three hours. He came from Jonesboro, Ark. The police tried vainly to suppress the news of the negro's arrest, fearing a repetition of the riots here in 1908, which followed an attack by a negro on a white woman.

SPARTA, Wis., Sept. 13.—"Do it now," is the slogan throughout Monroe county of young couples who are "just crazy" to marry but can't. Here's the reason:

The county clerk died two weeks ago. A deadlock in the selection of his successor followed, and until a new county clerk is elected there can be no marriage licenses issued. Meantime the Betties and Billies are impatient.

30,000 PEOPLE LINE STREETS TO SEE GREAT PAGEANT PASS

The approach of the pageant was announced by blasts from a trumpet brigade, and came into view led by President T. D. Taylor and Vice President Roy W. Rittner. The American flag, born by Art Acord, floated at the front of the procession and behind it came the bearers of the Round-up standards. The mounted cowboy band followed by the directors of the frontier association came next, and then came the first float, "The Coming of the White Man," with Glen Bushie (Tall Pine) shown grazing from a mountain peak out over the prairie. A real old Red Bluff freighter, drawn by 12 head of horses, was one of the new features this year, as was a draille schooner drawn by a horse and cow yoked together, showing to what the early pioneers were reduced in their journey across the plains.

The 15 worst bucking horses of the Round-up, tagged with their names, drew cheers from the crowd, as did Henry Vogt, the bucking bull, and Buck the bull buffalo. Driving the leading stage coach was Dave Horn, one of the few survivors of those hardy men who handled the reins and held the lash from the top of the early-day carriers. The Salem Cheriens made their presence known not only by their splendid band but letting themselves as passengers in the old coaches.

The long line of cowboys, attired in their picturesque garb, and cowgirls just as picturesque, showed that the range riders by no means belong entirely to the past. Appearing at intervals along the parade were other little groups of riders, the judges, the fancy ropers, and the riders of the "buckaroettes." The pack train of mules and the immigrant train, showing whole families and all of their belongings moving to a new world were phases of frontier life faithfully depicted.

A float that attracted unusual attention was the cowboy dance. On a big platform fitted on trucks four bechapped cowpunchers swung their partners to the old-time music of fiddle and jawharp, played by George Brisbane and Perry Smith. Jimmie Carden was in the position of caller. Another float showed a calf hogged and lying on its side while cowboys heated the branding iron in the fire which was to burn the everlasting mark of ownership into its hide. (The following tests were made under the direction of the two local newspapers):

FRANKLIN 5-passenger, 25 horse power, 28.1-4 miles on one gallon of gasoline.

APPERSON 5-passenger, 45 horse power, 22.9 miles on one gallon of gasoline.

The FRANKLIN was a model "G" touring car, carrying four passengers, with a total weight of 877 pounds. Diamond Silvertown Cord Tires were used in the test.

The APPERSON touring car carried five passengers weighing 871 pounds, and the run was made on common fabric tires.

Both of these cars were stock models belonging to residents of Pendleton, and both had been run more than 4000 miles.
