DR. TAYLOR, The Famous Soil Expert Will Deliver FREE LECTURE AT Commercial Club Rooms IN PENDLETON Thursday, Sept. 18, 2 p. m.

The farmers of this county are to have a real treat in the shape of an interesting and instructive lecture on Soil Culture by Dr. W. E. Taylor, of Moline, Ill. Kupers & McCook have succeeded in getting Dr. Taylor to visit Pendleton and deliver a lecture to the farmers here on the subject of "Soil Fertility and the Science of Crop Production." Dr. Taylor is himself a practical farmer and a speaker of eloquence and power. He operates a number of experimental farms in different parts of the United States, and is conceded to be one of the best posted men on soil culture that there is in this country.



In his lectures, Dr. Taylor makes it plain what plant food elements are necessary in the soil for maximum crop production, how missing elements can be supplied, and how they are made available for the use of growing plants. He describes soil texture; the influence that cultivation has upon plant growth; how certain elements of plant food can be taken out of the air and fixed in the ground by the aid of certain leguminous plants; how humus can be restored to worn-out soils, and why this particular element is of unusual importance to the farmers.

His instructions concerning the proper application of barnyard manure and its effect upon the plant is of itself a liberal education in plant production.

There isn't a single word in Dr. Taylor's lecture that is commonplace, uninteresting or difficult to understand. He is eloquent, humorous, and has an amazing grasp of those vital agricultural subjects, which are now of such importance to the farmers of this country.

NEW RAILROAD TO BE BUILT

EDMONTON, Alta., Sept. 12.—(Special.)—Most important of the legislation to be taken up at the session of the Alberta legislature, called to meet at the parliament buildings here on September 16, probably will be the building by the provincial government of the Alberta and Great Waterways railroad from Edmonton to Fort McMurray, 230 miles, from which point the Athabasca, the Great Slave and the Mackenzie rivers are navigable to Fort McPherson, 2100 miles.

The primary purpose of the railway is to afford adequate transportation facilities to settlers, prospectors and trappers in the north country and provide an easy outlet for their products, including grain, minerals and furs. The estimated value of the raw fur trade of the north alone is a matter of between \$6,000,000 and \$8,500,000, of which about 50 per cent has come out by way of Edmonton this year, the rest going to the United States through traders from Seattle and San Francisco, who send ships into the Behring sea and to Herschel Island.

"There are many reasons why the railroad should be built to Fort McMurray at once," said a prominent supporter of the government today. "From what I can gather I should say that work may be started this fall and rushed to completion. The chief survey has been made and it is only a matter of assembling men and materials. Every man who has ever been in the north country must be in favor of the plan, as it will ultimately mean a railroad from Edmonton to Dawson, connecting the Yukon country with the outside world."

WOULD HAVE PROBE OF LEGISLATIVE METHODS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Attacking the "evils" of the caucus system, Anderson who yesterday resigned from the ways and means committee as a protest introduced in the house a resolution creating a commission to investigate the legislative methods and the practices of congress. He declared it is the first step to a simpler and more efficient and economical method in the house. The resolution demands a report on whether any system is in effect which unreasonably would deprive members of their rights and prerogatives as members of the house.
