ing two. Huelst, Multnomah club, won from Pinkham, of Seattle in the 115 pound class; Andy Duvall, Seattle, won on a foul from Hardy, Sax boxing school, for the 145 pound honors; Mahoney, Butler, proved the best 155 pounder; and Bill Malone earned the honors in the 135 pound and 125 pound weights by winning a decision from Buster O'Neill of Seattle in the former and Gleason, also of Seattle, in the latter class.

Every bout was fast and classy, and much appreciated by a large crowd. Huelst and Pinkham at the bantam weight fought for blood but the Seattle boy was a shade the weaker, which however, did not become apparent until the fourth round.

Both of Malone's fights showed a cool, scientific boxer and a real fighter. He received very few blows because he is a master at defense and O'Neill is a promising young fighter and gave Malone the harder battle of the two, although Gleason fought gamely and took lots of punishment with good grace. In the latter fight, both boys had been slowed up somewhat by their previous fight.

Maloney had little trouble in disposing of Soldier Bonnie of Vancouver, winning in the second round when his superiority had been made completely obvious.

The bout of all, however, which was most enjoyed was that of Gleason of Seattle and Meagher of Vancouver, Wash. The latter is a deaf mute who has received his education at the Washington State school for the deaf and who is now breaking into the newspaper game. Handicapped by his lack of hearing he has learned most of his boxing by experience, but he made up in gameness what he lacked in skill and after being put groggy in the first, caused Gleason no small worry in the later rounds. While the decision was accepted without a word of protest, Meagher was evidently a popular favorite and the crowd wanted to see him lose.

Tonight at 8:30 the curtain will rise on a six round preliminary to the main bout of the evening, Larry Madden of the Portland police force vs. Roney Hagen of the Seattle police force, for the heavyweight championship of the Northwest. They fight at 130 and 125 respectively, a second six round bout will follow the main bout.

Gleason of Seattle Athletic club, decision over Meagher, St. James club, Vancouver, 175 pound preliminary. Three rounds.
Mahoney, Butler club, decision over Soldier Bonnie, 155 pound championship. Called in second round.
Malone, Butler club, decision over Gleason, Seattle club, 135 pound championship. Three rounds.

NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Pendleton, held on September 5th, 1913, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, the Surveyor of the City of Pendleton, did on the 5th day of September, 1913, under direction and by requirement of the Common Council, file plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement of Water street, Vincent street and Lewis street, in the City of Pendleton, as follows: Water street from the east line of Main street to the east line of Vincent street, Vincent street from the south line of Water street to the south line of Lewis street, and Lewis street from the east line of Vincent street to the west line of Lee street, together with the estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof, with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the percentage of the total cost of improvement which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement; and

Whereas, the Council has examined such plans and specifications and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefor to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work; and

Whereas, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is, in the judgment of the Common Council, properly to be included within such improvement district, and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein; and

Whereas, the improvement of the hereinabove described portions of said streets, with gravel bitulithic pavement is at this time necessary; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Common Council of the City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve and it is hereby proposed to improve Water street from the east line of Main street to the east line of Vincent street, Vincent street from the south line of Water street to the south line of Lewis street, and Lewis street from the east line of Vincent street to the west line of Lee street, by paving the same with gravel bitulithic pavement, such pavement to be made and laid down, and the street to have curbs and gutters and all other things, in accordance with, and as shown in the plans and specifications for the improvement of said portions of said streets, prepared by Geary Kimbrell, City Surveyor, filed with the City Recorder on the 5th day of September, 1913, which plans and specifications are hereby particularly referred to, and be it further

Resolved, that the plans and specifications and estimates for such improvement, as prepared by the City Surveyor and filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton on the 5th day of September, 1913, be and they are hereby approved and adopted; and be it further

Resolved, that the cost of making such improvements shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the owners of such lots, parts of lots, and parcels of land so specially benefited by such improvement shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof; and be it further

Resolved, that an assessment district is hereby created to be known as Assessment District No. 24, embracing the property to be assessed for the payment of such improvement, which assessment district shall include all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and described as follows, to-wit: Description of Improvement District No. 24, Water, Vincent and Lewis streets. Commencing at the S. W. corner of

Lot 12, Block 2, Original town (now city) of Pendleton, Oregon, thence north 23 degrees 34 minutes west along the east line of Main street 160 feet to a point on the west line of Block 18 in said original town of Pendleton, Oregon, 50 feet northerly from the S. W. corner of said Block 18, thence north 66 degrees 24 minutes east parallel of, and 50 feet northerly from, the north line of Water street 100 feet, thence north 23 degrees 34 minutes west parallel with the east line of Main street, 100 feet; thence north 66 degrees 24 minutes east parallel with and 150 feet northerly of, the north line of Water street 1200 feet to the east line of Vincent street, thence south 23 degrees 34 minutes east along the east line of Vincent street 114.5 feet; thence north 66 degrees 24 minutes east parallel with and 150 feet northerly from, the north line of Lewis street, about 425 feet to the west line of Mill street; thence easterly to a point on the east line of Mill street 175 feet north of the north line of Lewis street; thence east, parallel with, and 175 feet north of, the north line of Lewis street 260 feet to the east line of Lot 2, Block B, Jacob's Addition to Pendleton, Oregon; thence south, along the east line of said Lot 2, 125 feet to a point 50 feet north of, the north line of Lewis street; thence east parallel with, and 50 feet north of, the north line of Lewis street 100 feet to the east line of said Block B; thence south along the west line of Lee street 150 feet to the S. E. corner of Lot 14, Block 3, in said Jacob's addition; thence west 100 feet to the S. W. corner of said Lot 14; thence south 125 feet to the center of said Block 3; thence west along the center line of Block 3 and in said Jacob's addition 350 feet to the east line of Mill street; thence in a westerly direction to a point on the west line of Mill street 135.65 feet north of the north line of Court street; thence south 75 degrees 23 minutes west about 285 feet to a point on the east line of Vincent street 125.55 feet southerly from the S. E. corner of the intersection of Lewis and Vincent streets; thence in a northwesterly direction to the S. E. corner of Lot 3, Block 10 in said original town of Pendleton, Oregon; thence south 66 degrees 24 minutes west parallel with and 150 feet southerly from the south line of Water street along the center line of Blocks 10, 9, 8, 7 and 2 in said original town of Pendleton, Ore., 1140 feet to the S. W. corner of Lot 3, Block 2, in said original town of Pendleton, Ore., thence north 23 degrees 34 minutes west 100 feet to the S. E. corner of Lot 12 in said Block 2; thence south 66 degrees 24 minutes west 100 feet to the place of beginning; and be it further

Resolved, that a copy of this resolution, together with the notice that lot and parcel of land, is on file in the Surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of the office of the City Recorder, be published for a period of ten days in the East Oregonian, which newspaper is hereby designated, by the council for the publication thereof.

And notice is further given, that the Surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land within the assessment district in said resolution described, is on file in the office of the City Recorder.


