

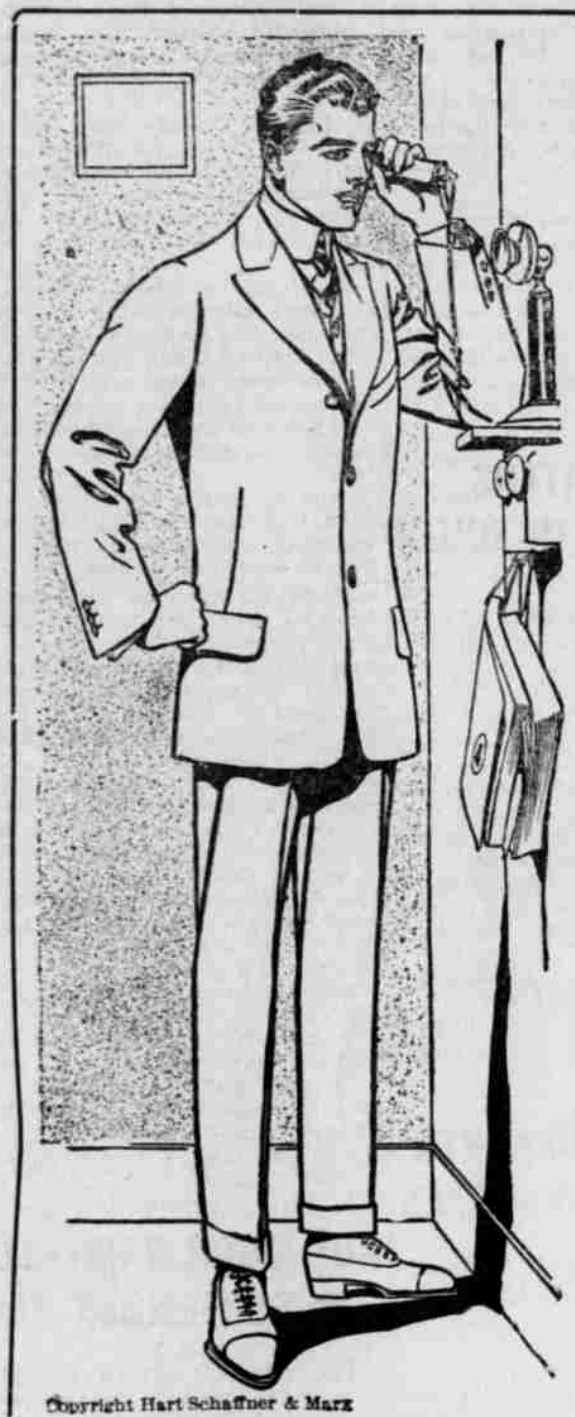

CREAM CHARMUSE.

An exquisitely dainty frock of cream charmuse, girlishly simple in its effect is the one above. The quaint short-waisted blouse is gathered into a puffing below which is scant full of lace. The sleeves are gathered into a puffing just below the elbow and are also finished with the lace. The skirt is similarly treated just below the knee and terminates in three shaped ruffles of the material edged with lace. The neck is finished by a flat collar of lace. Little bows of satin ribbon assist in trimming.

FOR THE COOK.

When next making a loaf cake, sprinkle granulated sugar generously over the top and bake it. An excellent sweetened top is the result.

It is well to strain a stock soup as soon as it comes from the stove; then set it away to cool in an open bowl. The fat will form a cake on top. Keep this fat for frying or braising; first clarify it by putting it in a kettle with some water. Cook for a few minutes, then set away to cool. The impurities will sink to the bottom, and the clear fat will form in a cake on top.

If one likes a soft, tender crust on bread rub the surface over before baking with melted butter.

Cottage cheese makes a tasty filling for sandwiches, especially those of brown bread. Mix the cheese with minced nuts, olives and salad dressing.

A double roaster will be found convenient when canning fruit. Put the fruit in the small cans, and put them in the roasting pan with the water, to boil.

The peelings from peaches or pears may be used to make a syrup for waffles or cake. Cover the peelings with water and cook until soft; then squeeze through a bag. Measure the juice and add three quarters of a cupful of sugar for each cupful of juice. Cook until thick like a syrup.

Pie Crimper. A large common screw serves excellently as a pie crimper. It is pressed along the edge of a pie before it is baked.—Country Gentleman.

Rust on Stoves. Iron rust on stoves which have not been in use this summer can easily be removed by going over the parts with coarse sandpaper, afterward covering the places with hot tallow or any warm grease, says the New Haven Journal-Courier. The next day wash with hot soapsuds in which there is a liberal supply of kerosene. Penders, grates and stoves can be cleaned in this manner.

DEADLOCK IN CHINA IS BELIEVED TO BE BROKEN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—The American legation at Peking cabled the state department that the government and opposition parties of the new Chinese republic which have been deadlocked for a long time over the question of the presidential succession virtually have agreed to the immediate election of a president without waiting the adoption of a new constitution. A method of procedure is now being arranged and the election of Yuan Shi Kai as permanent president is expected in time for the inauguration October 10.
