### COLLEGE RAISED HEN HAS RECORD

BY LAYING 283 EGGS IN 266 DAYS OREGON BIDDY PASSES WORLD MARK.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., Oct. 9.—The College hen that attracted world wide notice by laying 99 eggs in 100 days has broken the world's record of 282 eggs in a year by having laid 283 eggs nine days before the year expired. Since September 16 she has laid an egg every day and the prospects are that she will continue to do so to the end of the year for which the record

is kept. And other hens in the same flock may equal her record before the end of the laying year.

The highest egg record in the United States previously recorded was made by a hen at the Missouri station that laid 281 eggs in one year. The previous world's record was made at Ontario Agricultural station. The world's record now held by the Oregon station was made by the Oregon station hen No. 0542 as she was kept in a flock with 50 others. This is not an isolated case of good laying as the record of the entire flock gives strong evidence that the capacity of the American hen can be greatly increased by proper breeding. One of these hens has laid 271 eggs and another full sister 264 and they have more than a month each in which to finish the year's record.

In discussing the excellent showing made by the College flock Professor

Dryden ascribes the good results to the breeding of the hen, to the constitutional vigor that undoubtedly came from crossing, and to good feeding and housing.

"What breed is she? The only answer to that question is that she is an egg breeder," said Professor Dryden. "She was bred from a strain of good layers and this is the encouraging feature of the record. We have her ancestry for several years. Her dam was the product of crossing a Barred Plymouth Rock and White Leghorn. Her sire was a son of her dam and a White Leghorn male that has produced a great number of good layers. She is, therefore, a product of inbred good layers of different breeds."

### A DECIDEDLY ORIGINAL DESIGN

Today's sketch pictures one of the newest Parisian novelties, which promises to find favor on this side of the water. "Mlady" has found long ago that anything diaphanous in the way of millinery perched upon her pretty head enhances that same prettiness a hundred fold. So she grasps early at millinery styles that exploit Maline lace, etc. The sketch shows a turban shape covered with black velvet, rolling slightly about the face and rising in a high square crown. Perched jauntily to the right near the top of this is a butterfly of black Chantilly lace stiffly wired and with body of jet.

### Colonial Cushion.

The most charming cushion you could make for your colonial dresser would be one of these with a glass pedestal, copied from the old-fashioned one of grandmother's day, according to the Minneapolis Journal. The cushion part is made of pompadour silk, stuffed and mounted over a glass candlestick which forms a pedestal, which should stand about four inches high. The cushion part is about three inches square and is finished with a beaded fringe about two inches long. A narrow gimp covers the joining of the fringe. The beads for the fringe can either be iridescent or they may match some shade of the silk used for the cushion.

### Velveteen Uses.

I always save odd pieces of velveteen, as I find they are very useful, if quite clean, for cleaning walls, says a writer for the New York Press. Tie the velveteen over the head of a broom, sweeping the walls from top to bottom, and you will find it impossible for dust to remain on walls that have been so treated. It is also very good to use after polishing a stove to rub over with a piece of velveteen, as it gives an extra shine.

### Fine in Salad.

Young beets make a luscious salad, says Mothers magazine. Cook carefully in boiling salt water, being careful not to prune and let the juice escape; when tender drop in cold water, skin and slice. Combine with an equal amount of sliced celery, spring onions and nutmeats. Moisten with mayonnaise and serve on crisp lettuce leaves. Beet fritters are a novel and toothsome dish; boil a large beet till tender; beat it fine in a mortar; add the yolks of four beaten eggs, two spoonfuls of flour, five spoonfuls of cream; sweeten to taste, grate in some nutmeg and the peel of half a lemon, then add two spoonfuls of lemon juice Mix well and fry the fritters in hot butter; they will be a pretty pink; serve with sprigs of mint.

## CHIEF HAS NO NEED OF CLUB

JOHN KEARNEY IN SEVEN YEARS MAKES WONDERFUL RECORD IN ARRESTS.

Dealing a death blow to the popular theory that frequent use of the "billy-club" is necessary part of the life of a police officer is the record of John Kearney, present chief of the Pendleton force. In nearly seven years of active police service, he has made approximately 3000 arrests and has used his club but four times. Neither has he used a revolver save twice as a warning to fugitives.

Another notable feature of Chief Kearney's record is the fact that he has never lost a case in a trial court in which he was the complaining witness. "I believe in handling prisoners humanely," stated the chief in speaking of his career yesterday. "and I know that it is not necessary to resort to the club very often. Occasionally, an officer encounters an offender who is exceptionally strong and mean and then the only way for an officer to handle him is to yield his stick. However, I have been very fortunate. Next March I will have been on the Pendleton police force seven years and I figure that I have made 3000 arrests in that time. I only recall four occasions when I found it necessary to use my club. Two of these occasions were caused by the same man, a frequent offender, and he has been clubbed by nearly every officer who ever arrested him. He gives battle the minute he is arrested and is a hard man to handle.

"Very frequently I arrest a man who is inclined to resist efforts to take him to jail, but I find that he can generally be talked into walking along peacefully. If he still resists, I generally try to get his arms in a hammerlock and that generally takes the fight out of him. Occasionally I have to handle a man pretty rough but, while I always have my club handy, I never use it except as a last resort. I have never been injured by a prisoner although twice I have been struck pretty heavy blows, once on the jaw and once on the nose.

"I have never fired a shot at a man yet while doing police duty. While I arrested the escaped convict Pickert, several months ago, I shot twice into a brick wall to stop him in his flight and on another occasion while arresting some hotel robbers, I fired into a boxcar.

"A police officer," the chief went on to say, "is not qualified for his position unless he can hold his temper. He should be able to take abuse and resist violence without getting angry for an officer who is inclined to lose his head is dangerous. The billy-club is a deadly weapon in the hands of a man who cannot handle it coolly and without intent to do anything save quell the prisoner's fighting spirit."
