Ranchers Welcome Alfalfa Special, Which Holds Next at Mesa.

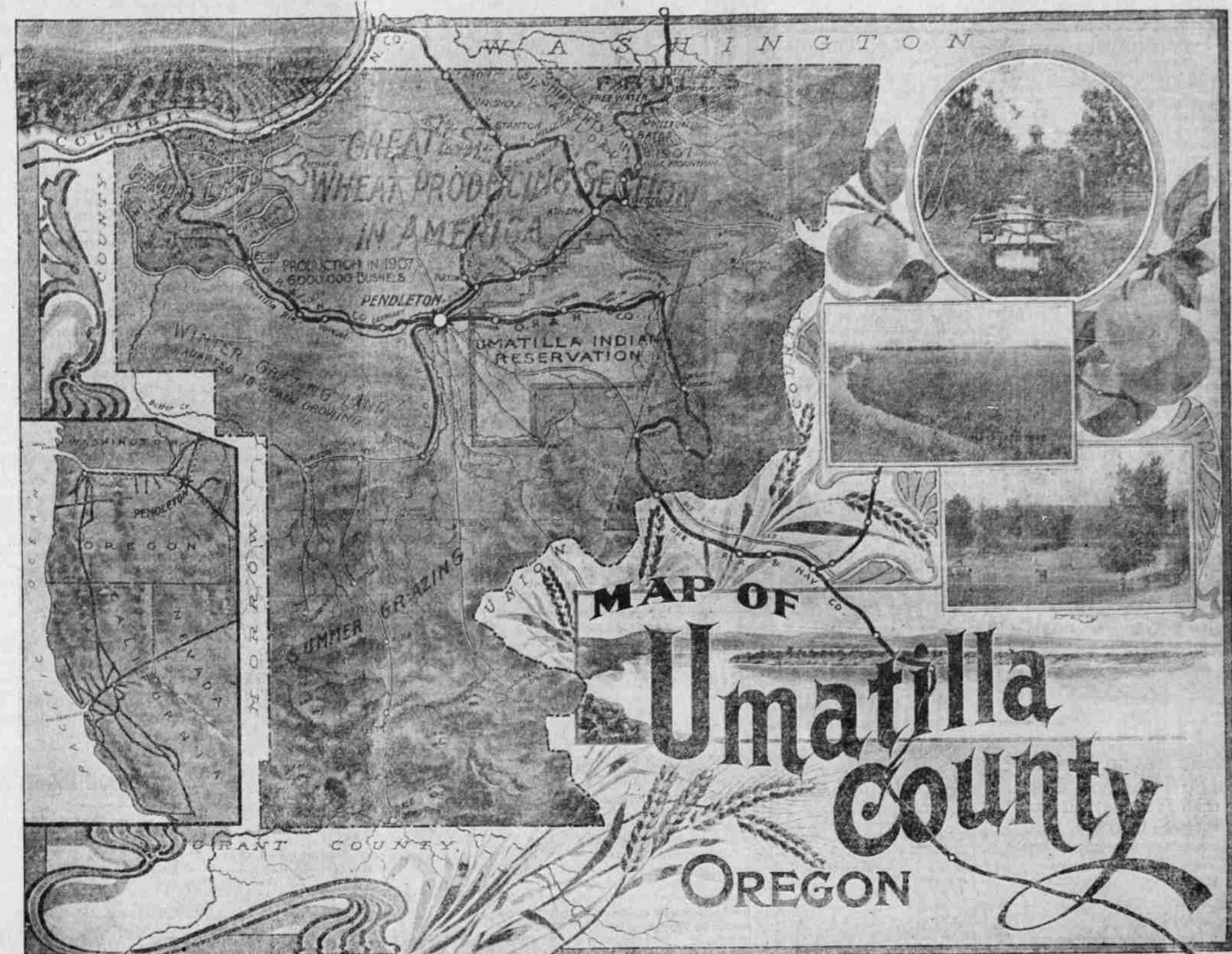

According to Mr. Holden's theory the three important features in connection with the corn raising are: The preparation of the seed bed, thorough cultivation and the securing of seed that has been acclimated.
