TIMOTHY WOODRUFF DIED LAST NIGHT

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Timothy L. Woodruff, former lieutenant-governor of New York state, died at 9:15 o'clock tonight. He had laid in a critical condition for nearly two weeks after having been stricken with paralysis while addressing a fusion party rally in this city. He was 65 years old.

The former lieutenant-governor was first stricken on the night of September 29 last on the platform in Cooper Union at a fusion ratification meeting while making a stirring speech. The announcement of the end was made by John E. Woodruff, his son, who sent a note reading: "Mr. Woodruff died at 9:15 tonight from apoplexy."

JUNCTION CITY HAS BLAZE.

Half Block of Buildings Destroyed and Incendiaries Suspected. JUNCTION CITY, Ore., Oct. 12.—Several buildings covering half a block

on Greenwood street, between Sixth and Seventh streets, were destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at \$7,500 with \$2700 insurance. Officers suspect incendiaries.

The buildings destroyed were occupied by a paint shop, harness shop and blacksmith shop. Part of a livery stable also was destroyed. The firemen succeeded in saving a part of the stable and several other buildings which were threatened.

WILSON NOT IN HASTE.

Currency Bill in January Will Be Reconsidered as Victory.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—While President Wilson wants early action on the Glass currency bill, close friends of the administration are making it clear now that they do not draw an arbitrary line at December 1 as the date for its passage.

Senator Hoke Smith, of Georgia, said the passage of the currency reform bill in January would be as much an administration victory as its enactment in November, and the same view is held by many other senate democrats who are counselling the administration against drawing party lines on the bill or attempting to prevent a reasonable debate.

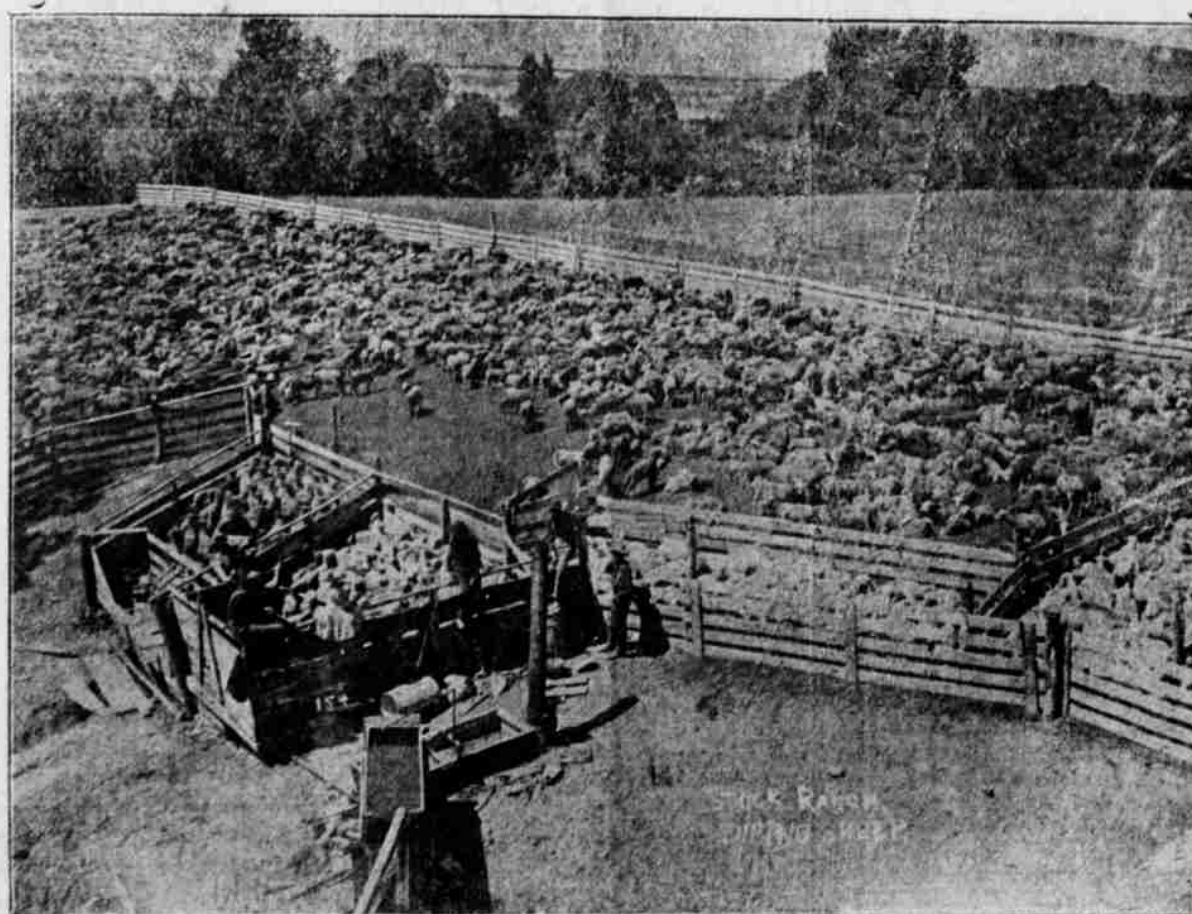
