FALL COAT SUIT.

There seems to be no falling off in favor for the Russian style of coat. Some of the newest and prettiest fall models displayed in smart shops are made on this style. It is especially suitable for the mid-season coat suits requiring the lighter or medium-weight materials for its most perfect development. The model shown above was severe in cut, the blouse closing



on the left with a row of buttons and having long closely fitting sleeves. The irregular peplum is drawn into a tassel point on the right side. The skirt is button trimmed. The one touch of frivolity is the ruffled collar and a jabot of lace and the lace ruffles at the wrists. The material used was a light weight plush in the popular Parisian shade of "tete de negre"—dark brown.

Bow Former Is Handy Device.

A clever little device is the wire bow former, says the Newark News. This resembles one of the office paper clips; it measures but an inch or so across, and a little more than two inches in length. By means of it almost any one ought to be able to make an artistic bow, and this too, without the use of a needle. One end of the ribbon is fastened into a cushion so that both hands are free to make the loops. In a very few moments the outer loops are shaped and fastened beneath the wires. Next the bow is adjusted to the hat, and the wire points of the former are fastened through the straw of the hat, pressed down, and the bow is in position. Those who have used one of the formers, find it helpful, too, in making jabots or other neck accessories.

Tomato Relish.

This tomato relish is good until late into spring, says the New Haven Journal Courier. Three quarts of green tomatoes, three large heads of cabbage, one quart of onions, three green peppers. Chop fine and soak in weak brine over night; drain and add three quarts of vinegar, four cupfuls of sugar, one large tablespoonful of brown mustard seed, one ounce of celery seed and one-half ounce of tumeric powder. Bring to a boil, then add one cupful of flour moistened with a little cold water. Can at once. If not cooked too long, this has a crisp, fresh flavor that is very pleasing.

High-Cost-of-Living and the city has helped her do it. Use of the municipal cold storage plant was the hold by which the old bogey's shoulders were pinned to the mat.

The city's cold storage plant is open to the humblest citizen as well as the biggest commission merchant. Small quantities of eggs, butter, cheese, fruit and the like can be stored in it by individuals at a nominal price. Mrs. Housewife of Cleveland can buy a barrel of fine apples today for about \$2 and put them in the city's cold storage plant until May and the storage cost will be only 40 cents. In the spring when dealers want \$6 a barrel for them she and her family can eat their fill at one-third that price. She could store away a hundred pounds of good butter alone in June at 20 cents a pound and take it out in February when everyone else is paying 40 cents a pound. Only half of the city's West Side ice plant is in operation and it will earn \$4600 this year above all expenses.

Just now there is in cold storage, much of it placed there by the individuals: Six thousand bushels of cherries; nearly forty thousand pounds of butter; forty-four thousand seven hundred pounds of cheese;

three thousand seven hundred bushels of various fruits; forty-two thousand two hundred dozens of eggs.
