**IDAHIO OFFICIALS RESIGN.**  
 Two Quit Federal Attorney's Office and Postmaster Has Enough.

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 21.—At least three federal officials have already forwarded their resignations to Washington and more are to follow. The split in the democratic party has prevented the filling of the offices by democrats and republicans are still drawing their salaries. P. E. Cavanaugh resigned recently as assistant district attorney and the next day the chief clerk in that office resigned. The third resignation comes from Rupert, where the postmaster, W. N. Billing, asserts there are others more justly entitled to his job and he wants to quit. He says also that, being past 70 and having been postmaster nearly 20 years the work has become irksome to him.

**SALOONS ARE DELINQUENT.**  
 Washington State Tax Commission Demands Back Licenses.

PASCO, Wash., Oct. 21.—An inspection of the records at Olympia has revealed the fact that many saloons over the state have not paid

their annual state license and that quite a few of the delinquents are in Franklin county. A member of the state tax commission, J. W. Bralson, was in Pasco and took the matter up with the prosecuting attorney. The result of the matter will be that each saloon will be called upon to pay up to date or the prosecuting attorney will commence an action against the proprietors for selling liquor without a license from the state. Some of the saloons owe as much as \$100 each. The annual license is \$25 a year.

**ATTENDANT AT SALEM ASYLUM LURES DEPUTY WARDEN FROM POST, MARRIES.**

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 21.—That love laughs at locksmiths was again exemplified when Dan Cupid broke into the state penitentiary, made John Beugen, deputy warden, his captive and escaped under the direct gaze of the armed men in the towers. Less than an hour later Miss Pearl Baker, who until a week ago was an attendant at the state insane asylum, had become the bride of Mr. Beugen.

According to rumor this is not the end of Cupid's plans, for it is said he intends making at least three more runs on the insane asylum and making as many more captives of attendants of the penitentiary. Dr. Robert E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the asylum, is in a quandary on his account and is wondering where he is going to find young women to take the places of those he has lost and the prospective brides.

**Plans Are Frustrated.**  
 The marriage was solemnized at the home of the bride's mother, on Oak street, Rev. P. S. Knight, who holds the record for the number of marriages being performed by a minister in Oregon officiating. It was a quiet wedding. Relatives and friends of the bride and bridegroom tried to keep it strictly quiet, but Superintendent Lawson of the penitentiary, in a spirit of levity, let it out.

"Any news out there today?" queried a correspondent over the telephone. "Oh nothing!" was the prompt reply, and then a pause. "Well, one of my wardens broke his parole today, but I can't say anything about it."

"Do you mean to say you have wardens on parole?"

Colonel Lawson laughed and said he could say nothing more. It was soon learned that Deputy Warden Beugen was the "parole breaker" and co-conspirator with Miss Baker, who had lured him from the prison walls. The bridegroom had been employed at the penitentiary for about eight years and is one of the most efficient men there.

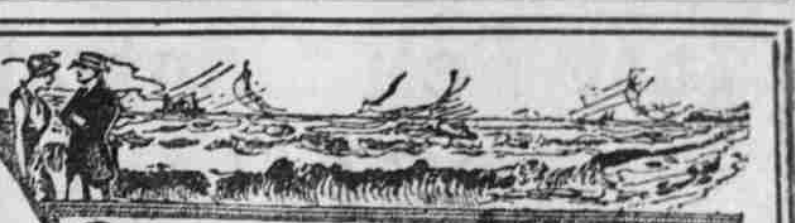
