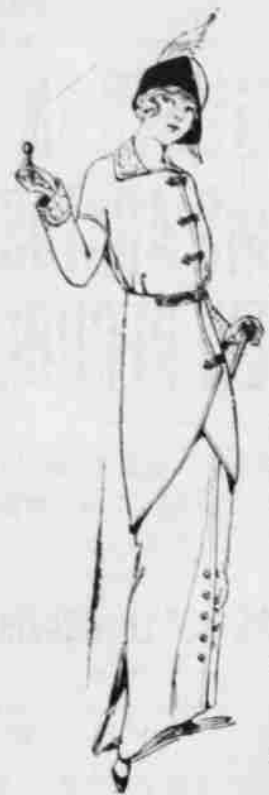

HOW PEGGOT GOT HIS IDEA OF RIDING UPSIDE DOWN

PARIS, Oct. 22.—It has just leaked out here how Aviator Peggot got his idea for flying upside down in a monoplane.

Peggot, flying a Blériot machine, had volunteered to test a parachute designed for aviators by M. Bonnet. He was to arise to a certain height then abandon his aeroplane and come to earth with the parachute. He accomplished the feat all right, but while en route to the ground he calmly observed the behavior of the parachute. It at first rose in a steep angle then plunged head-first toward the earth. Then it turned completely over, head on, and sailed along upside down quite serenely. Then it made another vertical curve, righting itself automatically and, but for a hazy stack against which it collided, it would have landed as gently as though obeying the commands of a skilled pilot.

"If an aeroplane can do that alone," Peggot said to himself, "it can certainly do it with me flying it." Three days later he "looped-the-loop" at Juvby and startled the world by flying upside down for half a mile. He now proposes to carry out a series

of experiments by capitalizing his craft at all sorts of angles then righting it.

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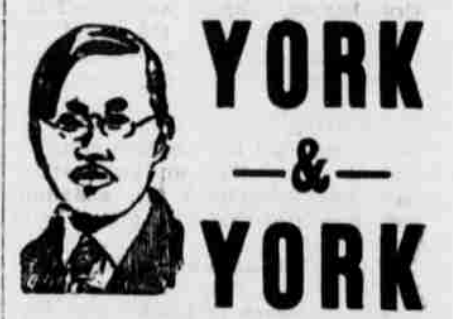
