CANAL COMMISSION IS SEEKING GREENHEART

THIS KIND OF TIMBER WILL BE USED TO BUILD DOCKS AT PANAMA.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—(Special.)—Clayton D. Mell of the U. S. forest service sailed today from New York for British Guiana to inspect greenheart timber to be used in the construction of docks and other marine works for the Panama canal. He goes at the request of the isthmian canal commission, in order that the engineers may be sure that they are getting genuine greenheart timber, for which a number of inferior substitutes are offered.

Genuine greenheart has the reputation of being the most resistant wood to the attack of marine borers and to decay. Boreers are especially bad in tropical waters. The wood is, in addition, hard, heavy and durable, and not subject to damage from impact and wear. Indisputable records show that the best grades of this wood surpass iron and steel as to lasting qualities in contact with the salt water. It has been known and used since 1769. Logs have remained intact under water for 100 years. Lock gates in English canals have been made of it for years, and the only limit of their durability so far has been the length of service of their iron bolts and fastenings, which usually can be renewed without much trouble. Greenheart in Liverpool lock gates built in 1856, removed to allow a deepening and widening of the ship channel in 1894, was used over again when the gates were reconstructed. The sills and fenders of the lock gates at Panama will be made of green heart, and much of the docks will be constructed of the same material.

Nansen's ship, the Fram, and the antarctic vessels, Discovery, used by one of the Scott expeditions, and the Gauss, used by Drygalski, were all planked with greenheart.

The exceedingly great durability of the wood is said to be due, at least in part, to the presence of an alkaloid, which is used as a substitute for cinchona, the basis of quinine.

A number of other woods which grow with greenheart in the tropical forests of the Guianas resemble it so closely that they are likely to deceive even an expert. They have many of the qualities of the genuine timber, but in a lesser degree. Some are quite inferior, and it is essential that they should be avoided. In order that the canal commission may be sure of the right wood, it asked the forest service to assist it in an investigation of the greenheart situation in British Guiana, and Mr. Mell's present trip is a result of that request.

From the isthmus of Panama Mr. Mell will go directly to Demerara, British Guiana, the principal port of export for greenheart. He will be accompanied by a member of the commission, and will see all the operations of lumbering in order that the true greenheart may be selected and identified without possibility of error. He will ascertain where the genuine can be obtained in sufficient quantities and right sizes, find out what substitutes are to be avoided, and prepare specifications which, incorporated in purchase contracts, will eliminate everything but genuine greenheart.

MUNICIPAL BOATING COURSE TO BE MADE IN SPOKANE

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—Two miles of placid water in the Spokane river just east of the city limits will be opened next spring as a municipal boating course, free to the public, by the board of park commissioners, of which A. L. White is chairman. The park board will place boats there for public use, and boat houses will be installed there to care for the city's craft and for those of individuals who wish to provide their own boats. Canoes will not be purchased by the park board, as they are considered unsafe for unskilled hands, although they will be permitted on the course. An excellent stretch of

smooth water is provided in the otherwise turbulent and swift river by the back water from a large power dam. A bridge 600 feet long between the dam and the boating course will prevent boats from approaching close to the dam.

INDIANS HAD SYSTEM OF SIGNING WITH THUMBPRINTS

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—Indian Frazee, a full blood Spokane Indian, who frequents the county court house and occasionally makes a "touch" from county officials—which he never fails to pay back—says that police departments were late in discovering the use of the finger-prints, declaring that long before the pale-face came or Bertillon ever was heard of, Indians in and around Spokane always signed documents, agreements, etc., with their thumb print. When Frazee negotiates a little loan at the courthouse he has the lender write out a note, payable on a certain date, then he pours out a little ink on a blotter, smears his thumb in it and solemnly makes his thumb print on the document in lieu of his signature. "Always can tell who sign 'em," he says, "to make a mistake. White men and banks should do Indians long time sign thumb prints before white man came. Only one man same thumb print. No can change it."

300 TEACHERS ASSEMBLED. MOSCOW, Ida., Oct. 28.—Dr. D. T. Foster, president of Reed College of Portland, spoke to more than 500 persons at the high school building and was frequently applauded. His address was made at the closing of a four days' session of teachers' joint institute of Nez Perce and Latah counties, which 300 attended.

President Black of the Lewiston Normal school; Miss Grace M. Shephard, state superintendent public instruction, and E. J. Klemme, department of English, Washington State Normal school at Ellensburg, were the principal speakers today. The teachers were guests at the university today, where they visited buildings and heard classes.

Spoon Holder. A fine spoon holder is made with a brass curtain rod, says the Dallas News. Select one small enough to allow the spoons to slip over it easily. Place on the rod as many spoons as it will hold, fasten with small brackets which come with the rods and place in a convenient position on the sewing room wall.

To Save Basting. When about to roast a joint cover it with a rind saved from a piece of ham or bacon, and cook with it on, says the Indianapolis News. This will save the trouble of constant basting and will prevent the joint from burning or drying.

Charming Things in Linens. For the past year there has been a perfect craze for lovely but fragile embroidery on transparent materials for home decoration. This fall, however, the newest ideas in this direction for general use are either in white, gray or a somewhat dark brownish shade of heavy linen worked in designs wrought in coarse colored thread in many hues. Often these pieces have a foundation, or rather, background, done in light stitches in a single tint almost covering the pattern.

Here is one of the newest designs. Make a mental picture, if possible, of a round table center in white linen with a frame and band solidly covered with light scrolls in two or three dark shades in a haphazard, artistic way. Amid this severe foundation are inlaid singly large stars, wile roses, etc., about three inches apart, the outline being emphasized with a needle etching in pink or lemon, or any bright contrasting color, which charmingly sets off the white linen foundation and the deep blue of the frame device.

On the other hand, gay wreaths, sprays and tufts of field or garden flowers in natural tints done in cross stitch appear on tea cozies, sideboard cloths, etc., forming slight relief to a background of close cross stitches in a striking shade.

A number of attractive motifs for this kind of marquette style are sold ready stamped in blue with wet squares and tresswork.

A few of the more delicate chair backs in snowy white linen, composed of two or three squares, are also enlivened in the center with a solid wreath of blossoms in quaint, old fashioned tones, the remainder of the linen being left unadorned, with the exception of a quarter of an inch frame worked in red or yellow cotton. Cluny, torchon or crocheted lace unites the large squares and surrounds the edges. Occasionally a fringe falls at the sides, while a lace edging flutters at the top and bottom.

And when may I expect to feel the effect of the new rates? Every citizen is asking these questions today. And the answer which the democratic tariff experts give is:

Don't figure on any great amount of tariff saving this winter. tual, tangible, dollar-and-cents-relief may result from the tariff revision downward within a few months—not before. They admit the legislation is a simon-pure "experiment."

Republicans generally predict and profess to believe that little, if any, noticeable decrease in retail prices will result.

Not until wholesale and retail dealers dispose of stocks on their shelves today and manufacturers make up (and purchasers consume) their stocks of raw materials, all bought when tariff duties were higher, will it be possible for Mr. Ultimate Consumer to secure any tariff-cut prices. Until they voluntarily sell lower, or do so because of foreign competition, the American consumer through the new tariff law, is not going to hit a body blow to Mr. Cost O'Living. Within a year, democrats declare, prices will be generally lower. Spring tops and Easter bonnets for 1914 may be cheaper. Downward trends in clothing are already reported.

Estimated tariff taxes on imports next year are \$270,000,000, \$11,000,000 less than last year. This is the indirect tax or "tariff tribute" paid by consumers. The saving for each of 95,000,000 people would afford on its face only 42 cents annually. But greater gross national savings are expected. Also, democrats believe foreign competition as well as home competition, will force down, by millions of dollars, retail prices of American products for goods worth millions, formerly dutiable, now come into America free. Reduction of manufacturing costs through free-listing machinery, democrats contend will permit manufacturers to sell cheaper.
