CANAL WILL AFFECT IMMIGRATION TO U. S.

SOUTHERN COMMERCIAL CONGRESS DISCUSSES QUESTION AT MEETING.

MOBILE, Ala., Oct. 29.—Delegates to the Southern Commercial Congress were divided as to the effect to be expected on immigration as a result of the operation of the Panama canal. Two addresses by S. Davies Warfield, president of the Southern Development Association and T. V. Powderly, chief of the Division of information of the Immigration bureau, developed the lengthy discussion among the delegates. Great enthusiasm was aroused by ringing speeches from Gen. Bennett H. Young, commander-in-chief of the Confederate Veterans and Representative Henry D. Clayton. Senator Brady of Idaho, discussed the Trans-mississippi territory and the benefits it expects to receive from the Panama canal.

The afternoon session was given over to a conference of commercial executives, presided over by M. B. Trezevant, president of the American Association of Commercial Executives. Harry A. Wheeler, president of the chamber of commerce of the United States, urged a get-together spirit among American business-men to increase foreign trade. Other speakers were Bruce Kennedy, president of the Southern Commercial Secretaries' association and Lucius E. Wilson, former president of the Association of Commercial executives. Tonight Secretary of the Navy Daniels is scheduled to speak on "The Panama Canal and the American Navy."

The newly appointed governor of the Panama canal zone, Richard L. Metcalf will give some first hand impressions of the canal work. Clarence J. Owens, director general of the Permanent American Commission on Agricultural Cooperation, planned also to report informally on the result of the commission's investigation abroad of agricultural co-operative plans. Other speakers scheduled were Representative Thomas Haffin, of Alabama, and Claude N. Bennett, manager of the congressional information bureau, Washington.

SURVEY TANNER CREEK LANDS TO BE MADE IS REPORT OF MISS HOBBS

Secretary to Governor West Secures Action in Matter at Washington.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 29.—Governor West was notified by his secretary, Miss Fern Hobbs, who is in Washington, D. C., that the commissioner-general of the land office has authorized the surveyor-general to make a survey of the Tanner Creek lands as soon as possible. A bill confirming title to certain unpatented swamp lands sold by the state has been introduced by Senator Chamberlain.

The Tanner Creek lands are a Tanner creek, which furnished the water supply for the state central fish hatchery at Bonneville. A large part of Tanner creek is within the boundaries of the federal forest, and it is desired to have the lands bordering on it surveyed and thrown out of the reserve so the state may obtain title to it and control, through riparian rights, the creek. It is the intention to use the creek as a feeding ground for young salmon.

TAUPE CHARMEUSE.

Fichus seem to hold almost as important a place these days as in the time of our grandmothers. One of fine ecru net is a prominent feature of this smart gown of taupe charmeuse. The blouse is untrimmed save for this dainty accessory. The long sleeves are finished with two ruffles of the lace which trims the fichu. The pleat which broadens the shoulder line is corded on its edge. The skirt has two medium length flounces scalloped widely and also corded. The circle is of the charmeuse and one spot of color is furnished this rather sombre gown by a silk apple and leaves of vivid green which is tucked into the girde below the filmy fichu.

Kitchen Wisdom.

Keep a sizable tin plate at hand on the kitchen table. It will be found useful to rest the kettle on, and the kettle so placed will not mar the top of the table. When baking, let the egg-beater, the soiled spoon, or other utensils, which are to be used again, rest on the tin; this saves labor.

If jam or marmalade has crystallized, place it in the oven till the sugar is dissolved or melted; then set it aside to cool. It will be perfectly smooth.

In making mint sauce, add the sugar and vinegar or lemon juice to the crushed mint, and let it stand in a warm place for an hour or so before using. Then heat it or let it get cold, as preferred. This will draw out the flavor of the mint well.

Keep a small can of glycerine at hand in the kitchen. Glycerine is a better lubricant than oil for kitchen utensils like food choppers or egg-beaters.

Some cooks brush over the top crust of pies with water and then sprinkle with granulated sugar. The pie crust will then be brown and crisp.—Newark News.

Modes in Brief.

Smart pile cloth and fur cloths are used for wraps and coats of various lengths.

Among the novelties in buttons are red or yellow ones, representing diminutive apples.

The tiered skirt, whether made with ruffles or platings, is seen in a variety of materials. The upper tier is fitted or full at the waistline as fancy dictates.

The large headed veil pins should match the veil or the hat in color.

Black velvet hats to set off the face are modish and as a rule, most becoming.

Printed velvets are used for collar, cuffs and patch pockets on some of the new coats.

Velour de laine is more popular than ever; it will be used for suitings as well as for separate wraps.—Newark News.

Arrowhead Is Outlined First. The arrowheads which are so often seen on tailored clothes are made with one thread. This method of working is not hard. The outline of the arrowhead should first be marked with a pencil or chalk and then outlined with a thread so that a clean outline can be preserved.

Bring the needle up at the top point, then put it in at the lower right-hand point and bring to the surface again at the lower left-hand side. The next stitch is taken at the top, directly below the starting point in a straight line from right to left. The stitches are then taken alternately at the top and base, using the outline as a guide.

You could draw the arrowhead any size you wish. First draw a perpendicular line. Use the top for the point of the arrowhead, then measure the same distance to the right and left of the perpendicular and draw a line from these points to the top. Toward the bottom of the perpendicular make a dot and draw a line from the right and left at the bottom of the arrowhead.

FOREST NOTES.

Canada cuts about 2 million cords of pulp wood annually, about half of which is exported for manufacture in the United States.

It is claimed that some of the eucalyptus of Australia are taller than the California redwoods, hitherto considered the highest trees in the world.

There are 55 oaks in the United States, about evenly divided between the east and the west. The eastern species and particularly white oaks are the most valuable.

The bureau of forestry of the Philippine Islands will send tropical timbers to the U. S. forest service so that their suitability for fine furniture veneers may be ascertained.

Wood block paving, tried and discarded in many cities of the United States thirty years ago, is now coming back into marked favor, due to improved methods of treating and handling the blocks.

German foresters are experimenting with Douglas fir from the United States trying to find a variety which will combine the fast-growing quality of the Pacific coast form and the hardness of the Rocky mountain form.

Hogs Have Hydrophobia.

BAKER, Ore., Oct. 29.—Hydrophobia among hogs has been causing serious trouble on the ranch of Alver Fisher at Fairview. Two of the affected animals were examined by Dr. Notz and he pronounced the malady hydrophobia. Several of the animals have died recently.

The disease spread when a neighbor's dog bit several of the hogs and it is supposed the dog was infected by having been bitten by a coyote. Much alarm is being expressed by the ranchers, who are keeping a careful watch for stray dogs or coyotes.
