STREET NAMES TO REMAIN UNCHANGED

NEGLECT IN CIRCULATING PETITIONS KEEP MEASURE OFF BALLOT.

Pendleton's street nomenclature will remain unchanged yet awhile and there will be no renumbering either. Though a special committee from the Commercial association recommended that the streets running north and south be renamed, and though the council received this recommendation favorably, there the matter ended until too late. It was intended to have a measure to that effect placed upon the ballot at the December election but no initiative petition was circulated for that purpose and the time limit expired Monday.

Someone blundered and someone forgot. C. S. Wheeler, who was the chairman of the Commercial club committee, stated this morning that he was under the impression that the council had ordered the measure placed on the ballot. The council records show that that body had decided to leave it to the voters but they had no authority to place it on the ballot without an initiative petition first being filed. They were waiting for such a petition and none came.

The law specifies that initiative petitions for the placing of a measure before the people must be filed 35 days before an election and Monday was therefore the last day. Therefore Pendleton must endure her present complexity of names for some time longer.

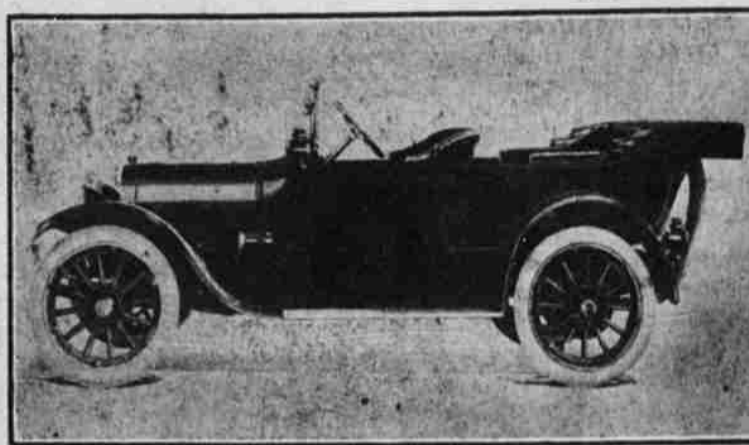
