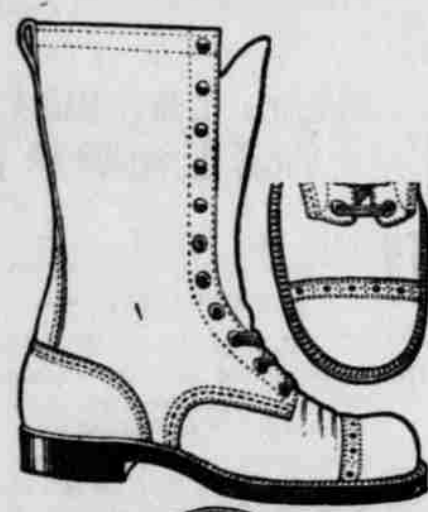

HOUSEWORK AS A CURE FOR NERVES.

There is nothing especially new in recommending housework as a cure for nerves. Women often take up the idea in a faddish fashion and speedily fall back into easy ways, lazy habits and too frequently indulge in rich foods and sweets that have been denied them.

Now in one of the sanitariums where fashionable women go to get back their poise, appetite and normal sleep a housework cure has been made a part of the recuperative cure. A splendidly equipped sanitary kitchen is the scene of the cure. Here are the newest conveniences in the way of antiseptic glass tables, tiled floors and walls. Electric heating and cooking devices, together with a brave array of kitchen china in blue and white ware, make an inviting picture for the aesthetic eye. It is certainly a more encouraging setting than a sun parlor full of nervous patients.

A staff of capable instructors in domestic science takes turns in giving lectures and practical demonstrations. In a short while the patients forget their woes and ailments in the novelty of their work, and they take up their dustpans and brooms with interest and a lot of amusement.

Of course there is plenty of rest between classes. Washing is one of the arts that form part of the cure system, and when the chemistry of the process is made clear it is remarkable how fascinating this usually eschewed task becomes. Laces and dainty handkerchiefs are the articles chosen, and the pupils are taught the art of bluing, starching, drying, sprinkling and ironing of these articles.

By degrees the mind of the irritable woman is taken off her own ills and ailments and the cure begins to work. There are lectures by authorities illustrated by moving pictures, showing the many different processes of culinary work and the right ways of doing certain things as opposed to the wrong ways.

"It is good," said the director of a sanitarium recently, "for women to take interest in domestic tasks. It all becomes a sort of play, and that is the secret of curing nerve trouble for men and women. Teach them to play. Take them out of themselves and if possible teach them to be useful to themselves and to their families."

Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Burlingame of Walla Walla spent last night in Pendleton en route to Portland for a visit.

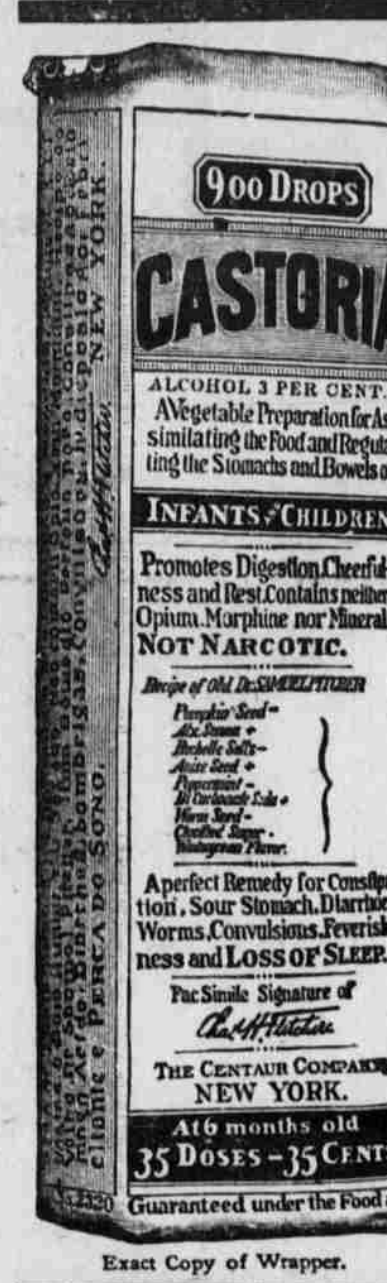

sum of \$13,000,000 was paid out in old age pensions and widow's pensions last year by the government insurance department, according to the reports for 1912. The income fees under the old age pension, together with what the government has thereunto, amounted to \$61,000,000. Interest is the item of \$2,500,000 paid out to "brides" for "bridal equipment" and "dowries" upon marriage. Maternity insurance also has been added. The government insurance system today possesses approximately one-one hundred and fiftieth part of the national wealth, or in round figures \$500,000,000.

Autos Catch Horse Thief.

DEBHAM, Mass., Oct. 30.—The Dedham Society for the Apprehension of Horse Thieves abandoned methods in vogue in the society for 150 years. When W. Cameron Forbes, ex-Governor-general of the Philippines, reported that a horse had been stolen from his stable the society, which has been renowned for its hard riding members, turned out in full force in automobiles, recovered the horse and captured a man supposed to have stolen it.

MICKY SHADE IS TAKEN BY MISSOULA MANAGER

Mickey Shade, the young pitcher who played with the Walla Walla Bears several weeks during the past two seasons has been pitching remarkable ball with Petaluma, in a minor California league since leaving the Western Tri-State league and has now been taken under the wing of Cliff Blankenship, the Missoula club leader, who found and developed Walter Johnson of Washington and Joe Bush of the Athletics. Shade has won ten out of 11 games since leaving here and Blankenship umpired behind him once and flashed a contract before the day was over, with the result that Shade goes to Missoula next season. "Dad" Gilmin, former Boise manager, out now with Ogden in the Union association, also forwarded Shade a received from one of his former managers. Blankenship beat him to the youngster.
