WOODEN LEG TALE UNIQUE.

Son Reads Story About Father and Couple Reunited After 12 Years.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 1.—Sam Wallace, village poet of Marissa, Ill., firmly believes advertising pays, even if it is only a wooden leg, of whose virtues the public reads. Sam has been reunited with his son, Harry Wallace. It all came about by the publication of a story of how Sam's wooden leg got in the way of other people's real ones when Sam discussed politics in front of the village grocery store here.

As is characteristic of poets, Sam likes to court his muse undisturbed. He preferred that the courtship be done sitting down. Where he sat down was where the wooden leg entered into the plot. It projected straight out. Others constantly were interfering with Sam's line of thought by falling over the artificial pedal extremity.

If You Need a Dressing Jacket.

A pretty and practical dressing jacket can be easily made at home by the amateur seamstress if the following directions are exactly followed: A yard and a half of material twenty-eight inches wide are required. Fold this strip of material through the middle and cut a slit five inches long down the center fold. Turn back the two sections to form a collar. If the material is the same on both sides of these flaps hem them neatly or crochet an edge round them, using wool or silk of a corresponding shade. If the material has a right and a wrong side the collar flaps have to be faced with plain silk or with the same material.

The cuffs are formed by turning back the material of the corners on a diagonal line with the collar. Two large, flat buttons are fastened to each sleeve, and these are slipped into loops of braid. The remainder of the fabric is bound with silk ribbon or finished with a crochet edge. Two buttons with the corresponding loops of braid join the front.

Crepe de chine or Japanese silk or a cheap cotton crepe in an attractive shade is suitable for making this practical little negligee, which only covers the shoulders and reaches well down the back. The open sleeves are placed over the arms and buttoned easily underneath.

To Dissolve Chewing Gum.

If you were ever unfortunate enough to find a piece of chewing gum sticking tenaciously to your shoe or your chair or your rug or any of your other belongings you probably came to the righteous conclusion that chewing gum was the most tenacious and stickiest substance in the world. There is one thing that will dissolve it completely and quickly, and that is gasoline. So if ever again you are troubled by its unskipped presence dissolve it with gasoline.

Needle Case for Schoolgirl.

Teach the little maid to carry a needle case of the pocket sized sort in her school kit. If she has always at hand the means of repairing a rip or a rent in her clothes, she will gradually acquire the art of neat mending, and it will become ingrained with her never to wear a ragged garment, says the Washington Herald. The "pocket" needle case that is most easily carried is the cartridge-shaped affair in steel, which unscrews to reveal a silver-plated thimble surmounting a reel wound with white, blue, and brown threads, and a hollow receptacle for needles. But all the necessities for clothes repairing may be contained in a tiny leather or covered book having flannel leaves for holding needles and pockets for holding shortened tooth-picks wound with threads.
