Mrs. W. P. Craig of Enterprise, Dies of Peritonitis.

ENTERPRISE, Ore., Nov. 1.—Mrs. W. P. Craig died at the family home just south of Enterprise, after a brief illness. Acute peritonitis was given as the cause of death. This was induced the physicians said, by eating raw wheat which did not digest and led to inflammation of the peritoneum.

MAPLE WOOD WIDELY IN USE HERE TODAY

ENORMOUS NUMBER OF ARTICLES ARE MANUFACTURED FROM MATERIAL.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(Special) Though at one time in the early history of the country an average of 6,000 maple trees were destroyed in clearing the ordinary New York or Pennsylvania farm, maple is today, according to the department of agriculture, one of the most widely used and valuable native hardwoods.

A bulletin on the uses of maple, just issued by the department, states that the wood finds place in an enormous number of articles in daily use, from rolling pins to pianos and organs. It is one of the best woods for flooring, and is always a favorite material for the floors of roller skating rinks and bowling alleys. It leads all other woods as a material for shoelasts, the demand for which in Massachusetts alone exceeds 13 million board feet annually.

Sugar maple stands near the top of the list of furniture woods in this country. The "so-called" "birds-eye" effect, the department explains, is probably due to buds which for some reason can not force their way through the bark, but which remain just beneath it year after year. The young wood is disturbed each succeeding season by the presence of the bud and grows around it in fantastic forms which are exposed when the saw cuts through the abnormal growth.

Maple, the department goes on to say, is one of the chief woods used for agricultural implements and farm machinery, being so employed because of its strength and hardness. All kinds of wooden ware are made of maple, which holds important rank also in the manufacture of shuttles, spools and bobbins. It competes with black gum for first place in the manufacture of rollers of many kinds, from those employed in house moving to the less massive ones used on lawn mowers. Athletic goods, school supplies, brush backs, pulleys, type cases, and crutches are a few of the other articles for which maple is in demand.

Seven species of maple grow in the United States, of which sugar maple, sometimes called hard maple, is the most important. The total cut of maple in the United States—annually amounts to about 1,150,000,000 feet. Nearly one-half is produced in Michigan, with Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, New York and West Virginia following in the order named. Sugar maple, says the department, is in little danger of disappearing from the American forests, for it is a strong, vigorous, aggressive tree, and though not a fast grower is able to hold its own.

PENNLETON WINS FIRST GAME FROM LA GRANDE

Echo had charged through the line for ten full yards. On the next play, Hoskins fumbled, but McDonald recovered the ball for a two yard gain. Again the ball was shot into Hoskins' arms and this time he catapulted his way for twelve yards. Jordan added ten by an end run and Kirkpatrick took the pizazz five yards nearer the goal on a cross buck. A quarterback fumble netted nothing and Pennleton was penalized five yards for offside playing. The locals had ten yards to make on the last down, and instead of calling for a place kick, Jordan signaled Hoskins through the line. The big fullback made eight of the yards but the ball went to La Grande on downs on her own yard line.

Conkey dodged through the field for 29 yards on a fake punt and a forward pass added 13 more. Then, for the first time, a hole was found in the local line and a plunge through it was made for five yards. A forward pass was started but Kirkpatrick intercepted it and the P. H. S. again started on the march to the goal. Jordan plunged for three yards and then shot a forward pass to Sturtevant for a gain of 15. Hoskins tore his way through for ten yards but fumbled the ball. Ruzg, however, recovered it and the gain stood. Kirkpatrick flipped off seven yards on a cross buck. The next down yielded nothing back.

Kirkpatrick came back with a sensational end run and was run down until he reached the ten yard line. Hoskins fought his way through to within two yards of the goal and a La Grande man was laid out on the play. When the ball was again put in play, there was less than a minute of time. However, on the first down, Jordan carried the ball over and immediately afterwards kicked goal. Score, Pennleton 7, La Grande 0.

There was time for just one more play before the half ended but that proved to be a thriller. La Grande kicked off to the five yard line and Kirkpatrick dodged his way back the entire distance before being downed. Time was called before the ball could be again put in play.

Second Half. Conkey made another good kickoff but Hoskins carried the ball back 39 yards before being thrown. Pennleton was penalized five yards for an offside play but Hoskins gained four of it back on a punt. He added a couple more on the next play and then Jordan punted 30 yards. P. H. S. was penalized again this time 13 yards. La Grande started a forward pass but did not complete it. Another was essayed but Sturtevant again intercepted it. Pennleton then broke into the forward pass game and Jordan shot the ball to Hoskins for a nine yard gain. Brock received another and made about the same distance. Hoskins varied the program by bucking nine yards. Jordan, on an end run, was thrown for a loss and Kirkpatrick on the next made two yards through the line. Jordan punted 25 yards and Russell got the safety in his tracks. La Grande's first buck was yardless but she gained five on a penalty to Pennleton. Rosenbaum, therefore, found a hole for another five and Hunter added four on a cross buck. The next play gained nothing but Oliver found a big opening in the line and annexed ten yards for his team. On the next play, Pennleton was again penalized 15 yards and a straight buck added six more. Captain Couch negotiated yardage and a fake place kick added another chalk mark. Two more bucks falling to yield any further advance. Conkey drew back for a place kick and booted the ball squarely between the posts. Score, Pennleton 7, La Grande 0.

Pennleton kicked off and Hunter returned the ball 29 yards. Three downs netting them nothing, Conkey punted forty yards and McDonald brought it back 15. Hoskins and Kirkpatrick then added seven yards on two plays, after which the former plowed his way through for 18 yards. Time was called with the ball on the La Grande 29 yard line.

Last Quarter. Kirkpatrick tore through the line for eight yards and Jordan added a half. Kirkpatrick fatted on his next attempt but Jordan made the required yardage. Jordan and McDonald made half of the ten yard distance in two bucks but Hoskins struck a stone wall on his attempt. McDonald also failed and Pennleton lost the ball on downs. La Grande punted out and nailed Kirkpatrick in his tracks. A forward pass falling, Hoskins hit the line for 9 yards, Jordan added a half and McDonald carried the ball four. Kirkpatrick and Hoskins made four on the next two plays and then Hoskins plunged through for nine yards and placed the ball within three inches of the goal line. It took him two downs to get it over, however. Jordan kicked goal. Score, Pennleton 14, La Grande 3.

Pennleton kicked off to the 27 yard line and Conkey kicked on the first down for 40 yards. McDonald brought the oval back 10 and a forward pass was tried but fatted. Hoskins was tired and was relieved by Straughn. A second forward pass failed but the third traveled for 15 yards and fell into Kirkpatrick's hands. McDonald sprinted around the short end for 15 yards and Jordan added a like distance. Then McDonald carried the ball across the line and Jordan again kicked goal. Score, Pennleton 21, La Grande 3.

During the remaining few minutes neither side came within scoring distance though some spectacular plays were made. Conkey got away for a fifteen yard run and just before the end of the game Straughn intercepted

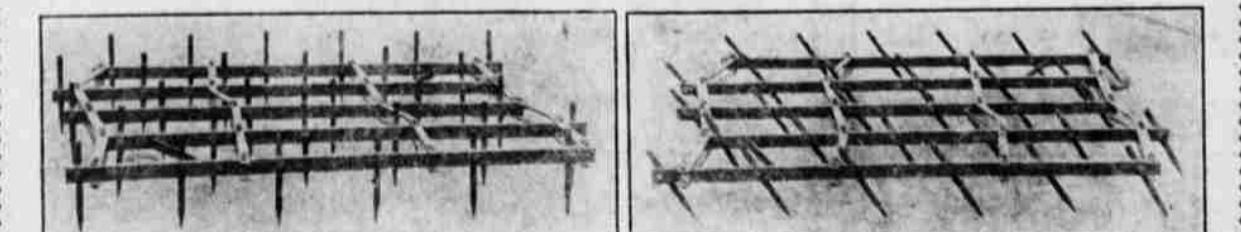
