AFTER 30 A MAN FAILS TO LOVE

HAMBURG, Germany, Nov. 6.—The "cure of love" has been traced by Dr. Johann Jaekel, after much study of the scientific principles governing the relations between the sexes. His diagram shows that the male capacity for affection towards the other sex is highest between the ages of 24 and 26 whereas the "female curve" rises highest between 30 and 34. The statistics are based on an examination of the sex lives of 400 famous men and women. Dr. Jaekel observes that man loves appreciably at twenty, but that there is a drop, owing to his getting over youth's first delusions. He begins to love strongly, says the doctor, at twenty-four. He seldom really loves at thirty, being then too busy with his advancement in life. At that age he will accept love and in many instances make some advances but after thirty, almost invariably, the man is wholly receptive and the woman makes practically all the advances.

Interest was shown, there being only seventy-nine votes cast in all. Of this number about one-third were women. The vote for all measures submitted were quite evenly divided here excepting the Workman's Compensation act, which carried almost two to one.

Thirty-one car loads of cattle were brought in here today by the Pacific Coast Livestock Co., formerly known as the Miller & Lux Co., to be fattened for the winter markets. Some two months ago the company's agent was here and bought about seven thousand tons of alfalfa hay. This train load of cattle is the first and only part of the number that will be fed here. MAKES 3,400 MILE DRIVE IN AUTOMOBILE

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 6.—Three blowouts and one puncture constituted the total mechanical troubles of Earl S. Houghton and Edward Pyle, Spokane university club members, on a 3,400 mile automobile drive from Spokane to New York. While the young men were equipped with block and tackle in anticipation of mud troubles, they found no use for the equipment and had to use a shovel only once. They were lucky both as to weather and roads, making the trip in 15 days actual running time. They arrived in New York 30 days after leaving Spokane. Their greatest difficulty was crossing the second summit of the Bitter Root mountains, in Montana, but the heavy grades were negotiated without mishap. In a letter to a friend Mr. Pyle declared it a wonderful trip, and said that in a year or two it will be a comparatively simple thing to motor across the continent.
