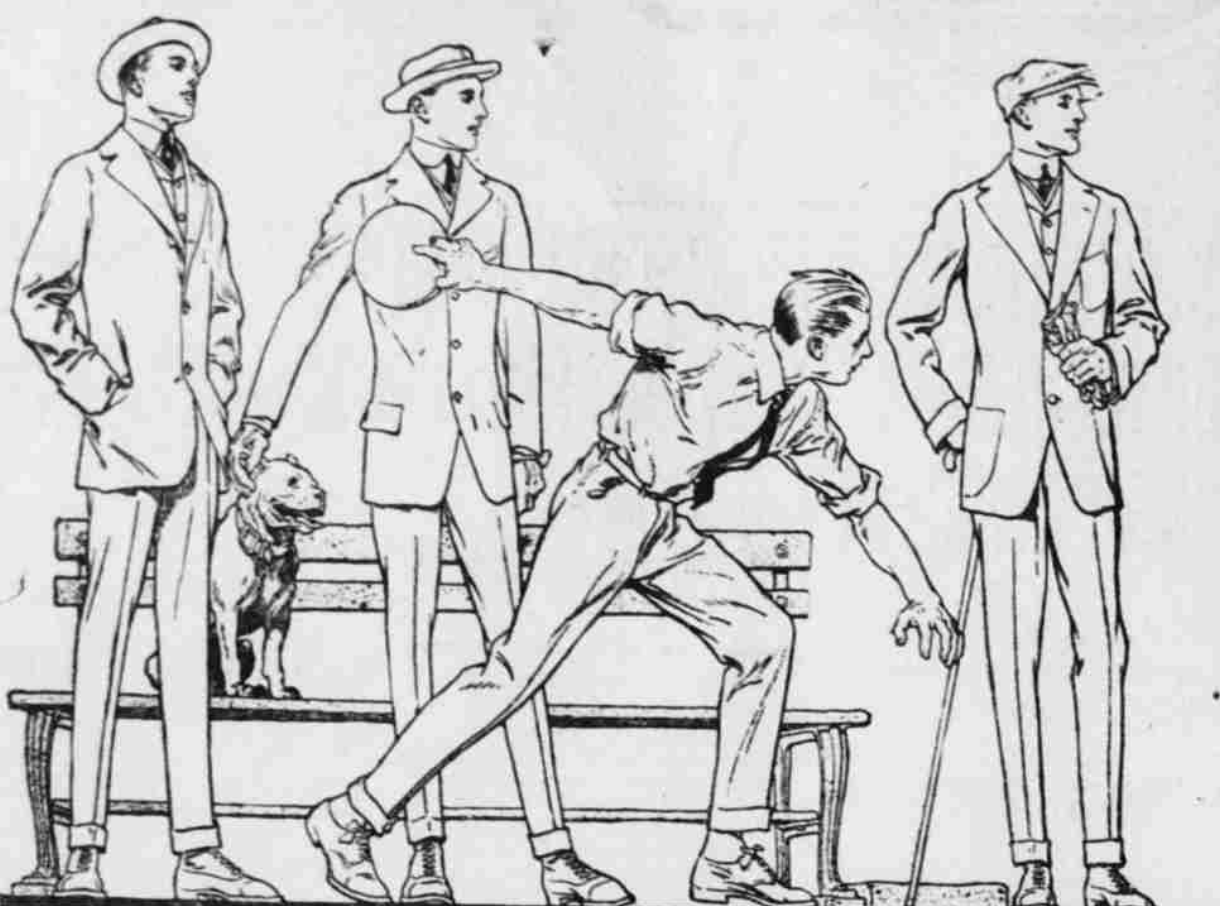

ADOPTION OF BILL FAVORING U. OF O. PLEASES STUDENTS

CELEBRATION IS HELD ON CAMPUS AND RESOLUTION PASSED, THANKING ALL.

Mass Meeting Is Held and Unanimous Approval Given Toward Extending Praise to People of State for Upholding Appropriation Measure for Buildings.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 7.—Spontaneously gathering to celebrate the result of the election in which the people of the state voted to provide \$1175,000 for university buildings, the students of the university paraded about the campus and city, finally uniting in a mass meeting in Viard Hall. The following resolutions were here passed unanimously, amid cheers and the university yell.

"We, the students of the University of Oregon, in mass meeting assembled, do hereby express our pride in being members of the body politic of Oregon. We call attention to the fact that an understanding of the value and need of higher education rests with no class or caste in Oregon, but is diffused among the entire population, and we believe that in no state is there a firmer foundation than this on which to build for the future.

"We express our admiration for the able and loyal service performed by the press of the state, which was all but a unit in clearly understanding and effectively and truthfully presenting the immensely important issue at stake.

"We regard as leaders whose noble example shall in our lives strive to follow, those disinterested, energetic, broadly public-spirited citizens, who, with no possible private interest to be served, and no possible personal reward to be gained, gave freely and liberally of their money, their time and their enthusiasm with thought only of the welfare of their state and of posterity.

"We regard as vastly significant for the future of education in Oregon the fact that one of the most energetic leaders of the campaign in behalf of the university is a regent of the Oregon Agricultural college, and as still more significant the fact that the city of Corvallis returned a handsome majority in favor of the university measures. We attribute this in no small degree to the broadmindedness and wise patriotism of our fellow students at the Oregon Agricultural College, and as students at the University we wish thus publicly to express our appreciation.

"We furthermore take this occasion of pledging to the state of Oregon our renewed loyalty, and of affirming again our determination that in us the people of the state shall find that the sacrifices they have made for higher education will redound manifold to the public advantage.

The resolutions then closed with a repetition of the well known "Oregon pledge" by which the student dedicates himself to the welfare of the state.

LEPERS' NURSE BID TO WED.

Oregon Man Is Willing to Marry Much-Feared Mary Collier.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—If Mary Collier, the nurse who is pursued by leprosy charges, despite a clean bill of health given by four Chicago physicians, cares to change her mind about going back to the New Brunswick leper colony, there is a man out west who is willing to marry her.

A newspaper relating her troubles found its way into the hands of Frank Habelt, a railroad man of Cecil, Ore. He wrote Captain John Halpin, chief of the Chicago detective bureau, and declared he is willing to marry Miss Collier.

PRIZE WINNING APPLES TO BE DISPLAYED IN EAST

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 6.—(Special.)—Negotiations to secure the use of display windows on some of the famous corner in New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and a score of more big eastern cities for the exhibition of the Pacific northwest's prize winning apples are being carried on by Manager Gordon C. Corbaley of the sixth National Apple Show and Fruit Products congress.

Such locations as State and Washington in Chicago and Herald Square in New York City are under consideration. The apple display in the big eastern cities following the show, which will be held November 17 to 22, is a feature never before attempted.

The prize winners in all contests will make the long trip, spending one week in each city. Each display will be accompanied by the name of the grower and the district that produced the apples.

\$5000 IN FINES AGAINST OWNERS OF VESSELS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Fines aggregating \$5000 against owners of 48 vessels have been imposed during the last few weeks by the department of commerce, because the ships were not carrying the required number of lifeboats.

Needle Notes.

Colored handkerchiefs are much in vogue. It is considered very good to fill in one corner with a fine cross stitch design.

New neckwear shows designs in the graceful English smoking. It looks very well with the new waists that are gathered full below a yoke. French knot embroidery is very popular just now. On Turkish towels, for instance, one sees initials of French knots combined with blossoms solidly filled with the same stitch.

Drawn work is receiving a good bit of attention at the present time. Buttons and dresser scarfs, whole bed sets and lingerie pillows are carved out in this embroidery. Very fetching little neck bows are composed of it with long ends, through which velvet ribbon is threaded.

Madeira embroidery is seen a good bit these days combined with cut work and inset squares of flit. Handkerchiefs and sets of table linens, particularly broad tray covers, are ornamented with this form of embroidery.—San Diego Union.

Fashion Fills.

Most of the tailored slashed skirts have the slash finished with button and buttonholes or with snap fasteners.

A dressy slipper has the single strap cut in one with the slipper upper. The black patent leather is edged with white.

Tulle aligrettes and butterflies and fancies are seen on many of the all-black hats.

Chiffon velvet is among the smartest of dress fabrics for handsome suits.

New silk petticoats are cut away in front to correspond with the opening in the gown, or the front is made with a plaited fan which is disclosed beneath the opening in the frocks.—Newark News.

No Burnt Bacon.

Try cooking your breakfast on a pie tin in the oven. This does away with all smoke and burnt grease smell in the kitchen, and the bacon is uniformly crisp. It may be cooked two layers deep if you will turn it once in a while. One layer needs no turning. The fat from this is white and can be used for all baking. With half the amount of butter it is good even for cakes.—Washington Herald.

Care of Blankets.

White woolen blankets are difficult to wash, and great care must always be given them, says the Woman's Home Companion. They can be kept fresh and clean if used inside a slip four and one-half yards of sheeting by two yards will cover the ordinary blanket. This is folded so as not to make a seam in the center and the sides are sewed up. The top is not sewed, but pieces of tape attached to the hem, when tied, keep the end closed. Tape is better than buttons, the latter coming off easily in the wash. A few stitches at the sides of the blanket hold it in place.

Worth Knowing.

To prevent made mustard from drying and caking in the mustard pot add a little salt when making. When making "thickening" for sauces, gravies, etc., use half flour and half cornstarch.

Instead of using a flatiron to steam velvet, try a soapstone and see how much better and smoother the velvet will be.

Stains on flannels may be removed by applying yolks of eggs and egg-cerine in equal quantities. Leave for half an hour and then wash out.

When burning vegetable refuse in stove or furnace put a handful of salt into the fire with it and there will be no unpleasant odor.—Kansas City Times.

About half of those invited live outside of Washington. Invitations were sent to the members of the cabinet, the diplomatic corps, the members of the supreme court, and to the wives of some of the senators and representatives in congress. It was reported that the daughters of the foreign ambassadors and ministers and of cabinet officers were not included in the invitations.

JEWISH OUTBREAK IN RUSSIA

KIEFF, Russia, Nov. 7.—A Jewish outbreak is seriously threatened as a result of the denunciation by Prosecutor Wippers Biller in a speech following the conclusion of testimony in the Belis trial.

The prosecutor did not confine himself to the charges that Belis murdered the Muschinsky boy, but declared that Jewish ritual murders were common and seemed to do his best to stir the Christian population at Kieff to violence against the Jews. Attorney Grouseberg, the attorney for the defense, addressed the jury today declaring that there was no evidence introduced connecting his client with the murder and ridiculing the stories of human sacrifice by the Jews.

ITALIAN POET PLANS SELF DESTRUCTION

Gabriel D'Annunzio Says That the World Will Marvel at His Suicide.

PARIS, Nov. 6.—Gabriel D'Annunzio, the well known Italian poet, recently told Charles Le Bars, the actor, and Edmond Rostand, the playwright, that because he could not endure any life that was not one of most violent and intense emotions, he had carefully prepared for suicide in two years' time.

The form of self-destruction chosen is unknown. He says the whole world will long talk of his death as the most remarkable suicide on record.

The poet speaks of his intentions constantly and with the utmost seriousness. All his friends believe he will do as he says. D'Annunzio says he will finish two more works and then reduce himself to dust and so startle the world with his last effort of originality.
