BROWN SERGE WITH RED SILK

Such a pretty frock of wood brown serge appears today, designed for a girl of ten. This has the richness of an autumn leaf in its coloring. For the brown serge is piped with red silk. Both blouse and narrow skirt close diagonally, the closing following a continuous line from shoulder to hem. The edge being piped with the red silk and followed by a line of red buttons set wide apart. The belt is of the material, piped with the red and knotted at the left side with two ends or ears. The jaunty little hat is of brown velvet faced with red silk.

Economy Cake.

This cake is made without eggs, milk or butter and is very good. Mix one cup cold water, one tablespoon shortening, one half package seeded raisins and beat five minutes. When quite cold add one and one half cups flour, one and one half cups light brown sugar, one level teaspoon of soda, or two of baking powder, one half teaspoon of salt, one half teaspoon each ground cinnamon, allspice and nutmeg. Bake one hour in loaf in moderate oven.—Los Angeles Express.

Velvet and Fur.

Velvet is much used in combination with fur, and velvet muffs edged with fur bid fair to prove as popular as fur muffs edged with velvet. One effective velvet trimming takes the form of a velvet chain, made of loops of velvet cord, formed by rolling a 1-inch or 1 1/2-inch strip of velvet. The loops of the chain measure 2 or 2 1/2 inches across and the chains are fastened across the face of muffs or else used to finish collars.

Eyelids on Soap.

When punching eyelids, place the material over a cake of white soap, says the New York Sun. Make a firm edge which is easily worked over. It also prevents the material from raveling.

There are notable men who do little else than help the University of Oregon carry education to the people who cannot come to the University. Dr. George Rebeck, late of the faculty of the University of Michigan, is one. He has an office in the Oregon Journal building in Portland, at which he spends some time each week and at which he is available for consultation to the numerous Portland students in the extension department. Dr. Clifton Freeman Hodge, the eminent biologist, late of Clark University, Worcester, Mass., is another. Dr. Hodge's work consists principally of lecturing to Oregon communities on topics of practical scientific interest. He instructs cities how to clean up, how to rid themselves of flies, how to avoid typhoid, how to cultivate helpful bird and animal life. Dr.

Hodge is of international reputation. Dr. Don C. Sowers of the New York bureau of municipal research is head of the new bureau of municipal research at the state university and is available for lectures and instruction personally in any Oregon community.

It is not generally known that clubs of students can be organized in towns outside Eugene, receiving personal visits weekly from university professors and having the remainder of the work done through correspondence. Southern Oregon and Portland have several such classes. Sociology and English are favorite study subjects for groups.
