**HERMISTON PLANS TO IMPROVE THE ROADS**

COMMERCIAL CLUB APPOINTS COMMITTEE TO ATTEND TO THIS MATTER.

(Special Correspondence.)  
HERMISTON, Nov. 13.—Tuesday night the Hermiston Commercial Club held a special meeting in the office of the president, E. P. Dodd. A committee consisting of John Rice, B. J. Ghent and F. A. Phelps was appointed to take necessary steps toward a new bridge and road across the Umatilla river west of the Hermiston Butte to bring the west side settlers to the city without their going so far south to the old bridge. A committee consisting of Messrs. Fraser, Watson and Kittery was appointed to circulate a petition in the city for work on the Diagonal road, the farmers having already agreed by petition and organization to donate 198 days work on this road with teams. A committee consisting of S. R. Oldaker, J. W. Campbell, E. P. Dodd and Dr. C. O. Wainwright was appointed to forward memorial letters to Secretary Lane, congressmen, senators, Commercial clubs and others who helped obtain the west Umatilla project.

M. T. Fraser was appointed a committee of one to look after some repair work needed on the new gravel road leading north from town. Considerable discussion took place regarding the present government building here and a committee consisting of F. B. Swayze, H. M. Straw and Dr. B. C. Monkman was appointed to confer with the government engineer as to what terms and prices they would accept for the present buildings if moved away. Indications are that in the latter event new office of brick to cost approximately \$5000 will replace the present wood structures. The dairy show committee received a unanimous vote of thanks for their efficient work and for the success of the show. A permanent dairy show association is already under way, the following committee having nearly completed all necessary arrangements: F. B. Swayze, C. S. McNaught, M. J. Barther and J. D. Watson. A committee consisting of F. C. McKenzie, H. G. Newport and J. W. Campbell was appointed to take up the matter of the sixth unit of the Umatilla project with the reclamation service. This would be the land between the Feed Canal and "A" line. Some time ago the government by petition was asked to make homesteads of the 160 acres originally set aside for the townsite about four miles northeast of Hermiston. As nothing along this line has yet taken place Messrs. Reid and Sapper were appointed to take this matter up with the local engineer, as some of the best land on the project is within this 160 acres.

**MRS. BELMONT TELLS ABOUT THE "SPUGS"**

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—A country-wide appeal for the abolition of the useless Christmas gift and a plea for intelligent and thoughtful giving instead were voiced by Mrs. August Belmont, president of the Spugs, at the opening meeting of the 1913 campaign to be waged by that organization against the "spugs" and the waste in Christmas giving.  
At this meeting the membership rolls of the Spugs—the Society for the Prevention of Useless Giving—were thrown open to all residents of the United States who might want to enroll against the foolish Christmas gift.  
Mrs. J. Borden Harriman presided at the meeting. Mrs. Belmont was the orator. The original purpose of the society, she said, was to prevent compulsory giving by girls in stores and factories to their employers, the custom of collective giving, which the girls felt they could not afford, but which they could not avoid without embarrassment and positive loss of their positions.  
"Some persons think that we oppose giving. Far from it; we do not oppose giving, but we advocate intelligent giving; giving that is done with the Christmas spirit of good will, as distinguished from giving that is compulsory, from fear of obtaining reward."  
"We propose to decrease, to reduce, the gift and increase the good will; to make the heart of Father Christmas rejoice by little acts of kindness, unselfishness, by putting thought into the gift we send our dear ones. Give generously, but from your heart, with all your thought. Don't make a business of giving, make it an art. Don't waste what should be a season of good will freely given."

**TRIED TWICE AND AT LAST ENDS ALL**

**STRING ATTACHED TO GUN FAILS TO WORK IN ONE ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE.**

LA GRANDE, Ore., Nov. 13.—Fate played strange tricks with John Richards before he finally succeeded in suiciding at Kamela Monday. At least two attempts to manipulate the trigger of a shotgun with a string failed. This cropped out at the inquest held yesterday over the body of John Richards in which the jury arrived at a verdict of suicide. The deceased was about 48 years of age and was at the time of his violent death in the employ of W. R. Loughlin, for whom he was cutting wood. The cabin in which he lived was about three and a half miles south of Kamela. He was last seen alive on the morning of the 10th about 8 o'clock. W. E. Lewis is a neighbor next to the cabin to see his old friend and found him ill and despondent. Lewis then started for Kamela, where he notified Mr. Loughlin and both then started for the cabin, arriving there at 2:20 p. m. On opening the door they discovered to their surprise the body of the lonely wood-cutter with his head propped against the old stove. A bloody razor lay on the floor and a shotgun with the muzzle pointing towards the head was beside him. The evidence as brought out at the inquest seems to

have established the fact that he had first attempted to shoot himself. This was evident from the fact that the shell in the gun showed the mark of the firing pin. In his prostrate position he had tied a string to the trigger of the gun and pulled but the cartridge did not explode. He then repeated the same act but the string seems to have slipped from the trigger for the gun was cocked and the string lay at the side of the gun. Falling in his attempt to shoot himself he evidently became disgusted and had recourse to the razor cutting his throat about four inches sufficient to produce death. But a small quantity of blood issued from the wound. The room showed no signs of violence. He had apparently just crawled out of bed, for he lay there in his undergarments. Men who knew him state that he had many friends in Kamela, that he was honest to a fault and that he harmed no one. In the pockets of his overalls examiners found \$7.10, apparently all of the earthly goods that he possessed.

**DOLPHIN KILLER WANTED.**

Roman Fishermen Appeal for Warships to Aid Them.  
MILAN, Nov. 13.—"Who will rid us of the dolphins?" Such is the cry of the population of the Roman seaport of Anzio, which thrives almost exclusively on the sardine fisheries. Owing to the invasion of thousands of dolphins, the fishermen have been forced to cease work. No sooner are the nets laden with fish than the shoals of dolphins make furious attacks destroying both the nets and the haul.  
A big local factory for sardine preserving has closed. The fishermen have sent a delegation to the minister of marine suggesting the dispatch of a torpedo fleet to make war on the dolphins.

**75 CENTS A DOZEN FOR EGGS IN PHILADELPHIA**

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 13.—Eggs were sold as high as 75 cents a dozen in the local market. This is a new record price for the season and was obtained for extra large specimens guaranteed to be not more than 24

hours old. Ordinary fresh eggs brought from 55 to 60 cents a dozen. Dairy and Food Commissioner Foust declared that 90 per cent of the 10,000,000 dozen or more eggs in cold storage here are April eggs, and under the law, must be sold before December 1. He is of the belief that the sudden release of these eggs will force down the price.

**Iron Found in Africa.**

JOHANNESBURG, Nov. 13.—The Leader announces that a farm containing rich iron deposits has been purchased by Messrs. Lewis and Marks. So satisfied are the firm with the exploratory work that specifications for blast furnaces of varying types have been called for, and it is anticipated that a great new iron industry will be started forthwith. The analysis of a sample of the iron ore is encouraging. The nature of the deposit has been favorably reported on by the government inspector of iron.

Governor Fielder of New Jersey, whom President Wilson made his political heir in that state, won in the recent election by a large plurality. A republican and a progressive candidate fought him and the republican vote being split, the governor was elected. He first became the executive head of the state when President Wilson stepped out for the presidency.  
There were seven candidates in the field in Massachusetts, among them Governor Foss, who at the last moment sought re-election. A strong republican candidate in Representative Gardner and a substantial progressive candidate in Charles Sumner Bird made it possible for Mr. Walsh to win.
