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more men. Besides these, there are four steel steamers with crews of 20 men each which are 80 hours overdue in lake Huron and grave fears are entertained for them.

A score of corpses have been washed up on the shores of lake Huron and lake Superior today.

TORONTO, Nov. 13.—With the arrival today of reports of finding float-

ing wreckage evidently of the steamship Carruthers, all hope that the craft is still afloat was given up. With the cargo, the vessel was valued at \$900,000.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 13.—Another storm began today when a warm rain fell in torrents, melting the snow so fast that the streets became rivers in a short time.

There is danger that the sewers will fail to carry off the water in time to prevent serious floods. The drinking water is like thin mud. An epi-

demic of sickness is feared unless the residents boil the water. Many have refused to do so.

The food famine is over and the railroads and street cars are running on schedule. It is expected the schools will be reopened tomorrow.

COUNCIL SOUNDS DEATH KNEEL ON BILLBOARDS

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atrical performances or any article for sale, at any place within the city limits save in front of the place or places where such exhibitions and theatrical performances are to be held or where such articles are to be sold. Thus the theaters can place their posters only in front of their buildings, circuses can paste their paper only in front of the lot where the tents are to be pitched and merchants can put up their advertising signs and posters only in front of their buildings. The ordinance makes the person or persons maintaining such boards and those putting up the posters equally culpable. A fine not to exceed \$100 or imprisonment in the city jail not more than 60 days or both is the penalty for a violation.

The action of the council rings the death knell to the billboard business as conducted in the city by W. N. Matlock and F. E. Welch but it is said that such drastic action would not have been taken had not the request to remove the objectionable boards on the island met with such a curt refusal. Under the old ordinance, the placing of the boards on private property was not unlawful but residents of the north side residence district made a vigorous protest and they were backed by the Civic club. They asked the council to adopt a new ordinance if necessary and the council acceded.

The petition was presented by a committee from the Civic club a week ago and was referred to the street committee which committee last evening recommended unanimously the passage of the ordinance as prepared by the city attorney. Councilmen Cole, Montgomery, McCormack, Eli and Dyer voted in favor of it. Kirkpatrick and Siebert voted against it and Councilman Swearingen was absent. However as a member of the street committee he had recommended its passage.
