MRS. HENRY W. COE SUES FOR DIVORCE

MANY CHARGES MADE AGAINST PHYSICIAN DEFENDANT—FEARS BODILY HARM.

PORTLAND, Nov. 13.—Charging that her husband, Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, has attempted to discredit her socially, financially and professionally, threatened to do her bodily harm, treated her cruelly and in a manner to humiliate her and attempted to estrange her from her children, Mrs. Viola M. Coe yesterday filed suit against Dr. Coe for divorce and for the custody of their two minor children, Earl A. Coe, aged 17, and Wayne W. Coe, aged 19.

Mrs. Coe filed an affidavit in which she asserted that because of the filing of the suit she believed her husband would be greatly outraged and, unless restrained by the court, would come to her home at Lovejoy and Twenty-fifth streets, and do her bodily harm. Acting on this affidavit, Judge Kavanaugh issued an order restraining Dr. Coe during the pendency of the suit from visiting his wife's home.

Mrs. Coe filed suit several weeks ago against her husband, asking for an accounting of funds and accounts of the Coe Sanitarium in which Dr. and Mrs. Coe both claim a large interest. Mrs. Coe in her first suit against her husband, charged that he had refused to account for large sums of money received as an officer of the Coe Sanitarium for the cure of insane patients from Alaska, the sanitarium having a contract to care for this class of patients.

Tariff Talks

High Cost of Dying Is Reduced Under Schedule — Undertakers May Face a Cut Rate War.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Americans can die and be buried cheaper today than ever before. The new tariff law offers this cheering prospect. It is teeming with possibilities for reducing the high cost of dying. Undertakers may face a cut-rate war.

Lower taxes in the new law on almost everything from coffins to tombstones are the features which tend toward lowering the expense of "shuffling off." Foes of the new democratic law insist, however, that the "ultimate consumer" will get little real economical joy or benefit from the reduced import taxes; that the undertaker may get some supplies cheaper, but his bill will not show any reduction. Here are some of the possibilities tending to make one's demise a greater financial success:

Sassafras, rosewood and satinwood for coffins are all cut 5 per cent in the new law. Silvered and gold-plated coffin handles are given an increase of 5 per cent, however. Outer packing boxes are reduced 15 per cent. Slight tax reductions are made on undertaker's chemical supplies for embalming, which helps some financially. The duty on attar of roses alone is cut 5 per cent. Cut flowers for funerals are still taxed one-fourth of their value, but then the general run of funerals have few imported flowers.

Mourning stationery is reduced in the new law, but hardly enough to save any money for "Mrs. Weeds" at her stationer. Tombstones ought to go on the bargain counter, if the retail purchaser is given the benefit of the tariff reduction of 25 cents a cubic foot in the new act.

taxes from 2 cents to 1 cent a pound, a significant tariff revision. Oh, yes. Another illuminating feature indicative of "passing in one's chips" cheaper, is that asbestos, brimstone, firewood and bone dust are also on the free list in the new law. But life-saving apparatus is on the free list, also.

4000 GOOD ROADS MEN BOOST FOR HIGHWAYS

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 12.—Determined to bring before congress the necessity of building cross country highways and to impress upon the various state legislatures the necessity of lateral roads connecting with the general federal cross roads, four thousand delegates today attended the second day's session of the six day convention of the United States Good Roads association.

It is understood the Missouri governor intends to rig up his moving picture machine and show the delegates just how Missouri turned out hundreds of miles of good roads in the two "Good Roads Days" last fall. The United States Good Roads association was organized at Birmingham last summer and is a consolidation of more than 40 other road building organizations. There are eighty-two road

improvement organizations in the states and it is hoped that before the convention adjourns all will consolidate with the United States association. The association has been incorporated in Missouri and the fight for better roads will be waged from St. Louis the permanent headquarters. Thomas L. Cannon was elected managing director of the association at Birmingham and it is believed that he will continue to direct the affairs of the federation. John H. Bankhead, United States senator from Alabama is president, and J. A. Rountree of Birmingham, secretary.
