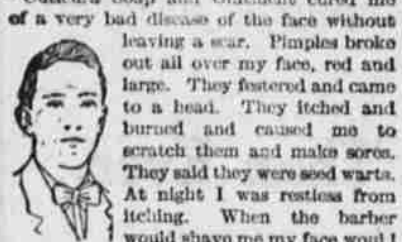

WILSON IS ASK TO SUPPORT SUFFRAGE

NEW JERSEY WOMEN CALL AT WHITE HOUSE TO PRESENT THEIR PLANS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Hoping that President Wilson will incorporate in his December message to congress something favorable to the woman suffrage amendment, more than 100 New Jersey women who came here today personally to present their pleas to him and to the New Jersey congressional delegation. Mrs. E. F. Felcker, president of the New Jersey State Suffrage Association, was generalissimo of the "on-to-Washington" delegation, and she had the support of such leaders as Mrs. Abraham Van Winkle, of South Orange; Mrs. G. L. Rhee, of Plainfield; and Mrs. C. P. Titus of East Orange. They planned today to appeal to the president's "sense of fair play" to bring about at least a mention of the suffrage question in his next congressional message.

LOSSES FOR WHEAT REMARKABLY SMALL

Chicago Options Lose 1-8 to 1-4 Cent Per Bushel; Rainfall Abroad Is a Big Factor.

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Considering the news that came from Argentina and Australia telling of general rainfall in the wheat belts, the fractional losses sustained by wheat options here were a surprise. At the closing December and May each showed a net loss of 1-8 cent similar to the opening, while the July was down 1-4 cent. At the opening it was unchanged.

A bullish factor of note was the cable from London saying that the wheat crop of England and Wales was but 53,125,000 bushels, compared with 53,680,000 bushels a year ago, while the oats production was 33,750,000 bushels, compared with 31,792,000 bushels.

CATTLE TRADE DULL AND BUYERS SLOW

(Courtesy of The Journal.) PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 15.—Extreme dullness is shown in the cattle market at North Portland for the day. Since the report of yesterday there were arrivals of 662 head reported in the local yards, but there is little inclination among killers to take hold during the early part of the day. While there was practically no change in the ideas of buyers most of them seem to have their immediate requirements, therefore were not inclined to go after offering this morning.

Whereas, the Surveyor of the City of Pendleton did on the 5th day of November, 1913, under direction and by requirement of the Common Council file plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement of Blaine Street, in the City of Pendleton from the South line of Raley Street to the North end of the approach to the bridge now being constructed across the Umatilla River, commonly known as the Star Street bridge, by macadamizing the same, together with the estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof, with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the percentage of the total cost of improvement which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement; and

Whereas, the Council has examined such plans and specifications and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefor to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work; and

Whereas, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is, in the judgment of the Common Council properly to be included within such improvement district, and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein; and

Whereas, the improvement of the hereinabove described portion of said Blaine Street with Macadam, and by Macadamizing the same, is at this time necessary; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Common Council of the City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve, and it is hereby proposed to improve Blaine Street from the South line of Raley Street to the North end of the approach to the bridge now being constructed

across the Umatilla River, commonly called the Star Street bridge, by paving the same with Macadam pavement, such pavement to be made and laid down, and the street to have curbs, gutters and all other things, and to be improved, in accordance with, and in accordance with the plans and specifications for the improvement of said portion of Blaine Street prepared by Geary Kimbrell, City Surveyor, and filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton, Oregon, 1913, which plans and specifications are hereby particularly referred to; and be it further

Bush Street from the South line of Jackson Street to the South line of Raley Street.

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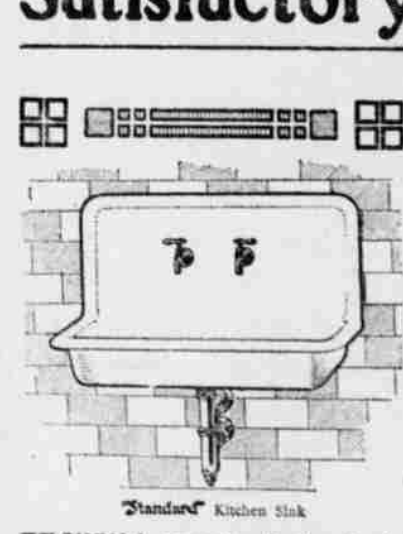
