

MAY WHEAT SHOWS SIGNS OF SAGGING

Chicago Option Closes at Wednesday's Mark After Showing an Advance at the Start.

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—May wheat was given serious attention by the shorts Thursday and after the opening advance of 1-4c the market began to sag under heavy selling pressure, and lost its first rise. December closed with an advance of 1-4c, the same as the opening, while the July was 1-2c up at the start and lost 3-8c of this at the end of the day.

The early advance in the wheat market was due to the receipt of further damage reports from abroad, and the better feeling generally resulting on the continent. Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that wheat was steady. The steady American and Winnipeg markets caused a firm opening. Later there was a further advance on the scarcity of first hand Manitoba offers, strength in spot here, and forecasts of light Russian shipments this week. The continued favorable weather in Argentine checked the advance.

UNITED STATES LAND SHOW IS OPENED IN CHICAGO

THOUSANDS OF FARMERS FROM MIDDLE WEST ATTENDING ANNUAL AFFAIR.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 20.—Thousands of farmers from all parts of the middle west flocked into Chicago today for the opening of the United States Land Show at the Coliseum. The exhibition, one of the most picturesque that is staged here annually, will continue until December 8.

The feature of the show this year that excited the most comment was the marked invasion of the west by the east. New York, West Virginia, Maryland and Ohio were represented with displays of the "fruits of the soil," rivaling those of any one of the western or southern states. The Maryland exhibit was made by Frederick county, while the three states were represented through their state boards of agriculture. It was West Virginia's first appearance at the land show. Canada was also represented by elaborate displays made by the Dominion government, the provincial governments of British Columbia and Alberta and the Chamber of Commerce of Edmonton. Mechanical models of irrigation systems and railway engineering feats in the Rockies were the features of Canada's exhibits.

The west was represented by the Great Northern railway with the largest individual display in the Coliseum, the state of Oregon, Tulare county, Cal., and the seven southern counties of California in a joint exhibit. Besides the agricultural displays, a Gla-

Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the Common Council of The City of Pendleton, held on October 29th, 1913, the following resolutions were adopted: Whereas, the surveyor of The City of Pendleton did on the 29th day of October, 1913, under direction and by requirement of the Common Council file plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement of Bush Street, in The City of Pendleton, from the South line of Jackson Street to the South line of Raley Street, with gravel bitulthitic pavement, together with the estimates of the cost of such improvement, and the percentage of the total cost of improvement which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement;

Whereas, the Council has examined such plans and specifications and found the same satisfactory and the estimates thereof to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work;

Whereas, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is, in the judgment of the Common Council, properly to be included within such improved district, and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein; and

Whereas, the improvement of the hereinafore described portion of said Bush Street, with gravel bitulthitic pavement is at this time necessary; therefore, be it

Resolved by the Common Council of The City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve, and it is hereby proposed to improve Bush Street from the South line of Jackson Street to the South line of Raley Street by paving the same with gravel bitulthitic pavement, such pavement to be made and laid down, and the street to have curbs, gutters and all other things, and to be improved, in accordance with, and as shown in, the plans and specifications for the improvement of said portion of Bush Street prepared by Geary Kimbrell, City Surveyor, and filed with the Recorder of the City on the 29th day of October, 1913, which plans and specifications are hereby particularly referred to; and be it further

Resolved, that the plans and specifications and estimates for such improvement, as prepared by the City Surveyor and filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton on the 29th day of October, 1913, be and they are hereby approved and adopted; and be it further

Bush Street east of the South line of Jackson Street to the South line of Raley Street. Commencing at the S.
