Glove Novelties. Among the novelties in gloves there is a good-looking pair which is effective without being conspicuous, says the New York Tribune. Made from the finest white glove kid, it is piped with black, and has long softs inset with puffs of black silk and edged with fine white Chantilly lace. The backs are richly embroidered, and the two smoked pearl clasps fasten the gloves at the wrist. Another of the fine glove kid gloves has deep, applied cuffs of contrasting colored kid in a pointed effect, the backs finely embroidered in raised silk dots.

Cooking Lore. When next making a French toast, sprinkle each slice with a little sugar and cinnamon after cooking; this gives the dish a delightful flavor. Slices or orange, topped with jelly, made an attractive garnish for poultry or game.

Flavor a rich cream sauce with some good meat sauce, and pour some eggs in the sauce. Serve on toast. This makes a tasty luncheon or breakfast dish.

For crisp rolls, bake the rolls one day and reheat them the next day. The double baking makes them crispy.

A little potato, barley, sago, tapioca, or soft bread crumbs may be used for thickening a puree, quite as effectively as a roux of flour and butter.

Stewed figs, served with either whipped cream or boiled custard make a simple dessert.—Newark News.

Simple Screens.

Screens are admirable in open spaces between rooms and quite serve the purpose ordinary portiers do. They

can be expensive or not, sometimes looking more costly than they really are, according to the Chicago Journal. One decorator recommends a simple frame covered with bright colored chintz having a black background, or Japanese wall paper of similar style, either of which can be shellacked. The effect is like real lacquer and is decorative. French doors are good also and are certainly an improvement upon sliding doors.
