with a hemp rope before sunrise on the morning of March 4, next, was the momentous question which came up today before the Connecticut State Board of Pardons. With the names of thousands of the most prominent men and women of the state attached, Mrs. Wakefield's attorneys today presented a plea for the woman's life. She was sentenced to be hanged for complicity in the murder of her husband, William O. Wakefield. So far, the state has claimed, and will take, a life for the life of William Wakefield. James Plew, who actually committed the murder, will pay the penalty of the court—"to be hanged by the neck until dead"—on March 4. To secure commutation to life imprisonment, suffragettes and those bitterly opposed to giving women the franchise, have for the moment forgotten their differences. They are fighting side by side in the effort to prevent the tightening of the rough rope about the neck of a woman, who has given two lives to the state through motherhood. Many arguments were given today why extreme penalty should not be meted out to Bessie Wakefield. "She had no voice in the making of the laws by which she is to be killed," "she is a woman and a mother," "she was cruelly maltreated by the man for whom she bore children," "Connecticut has not hanged a woman for 127 years; why revert to such penalty in this advanced age?" but however weighty were these arguments, the one which seemed to appeal most to the six members of the board of pardons, was that because of

the woman's miserable surroundings, she could not be judged by the higher standards of people who have had the advantages of education, breeding and civilization. The argument was raised that Mrs. Wakefield, surrounded throughout her life by misery, poverty and the class of persons brought to her house by her husband, "never had a chance" and should no more be judged of usual standards than should the most benighted African savage.

Macaroni Pie.

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FOR THE GIRL WHO GOES AWAY TO SCHOOL.

A smart school frock on the order of the time honored sailor suit, which has never been equalled in serviceability, suitability and popularity by any other design for a young girl, is developed in plain tobacco brown serge with collar of self-tone silk. The stereotyped blouse of this style has been varied by the introduction of a broad bib effect in front and back and the effect of a buttoned shoulder cap to the sleeves. There is also a hip yoke to the skirt, upon which the straight lower portion is gathered. This yoke appears to button down the front and on either side of the back. The lower portion of the skirt back is laid in six small, flat, closely-set pleats.

Two Build House and Furniture.
Shoring equally the hardest labor involved in excavating, in carrying and laying brick, in mixing and shaping concrete and in laying the heavy tiling on the roof, an enterprising teacher in a manual training school near Pittsburgh and his wife planned, built and decorated an eight-room brick house, which is a model of convenience and of artistic designing. No outside help was employed save that of a plumber and an electrician were called in to conform to the building laws of the state.

Every piece of furniture, from kitchen table to library chairs, was designed and made by the competent hands of this resourceful couple. The heavy chandeliers and candelabra, ornamented with massive brass borders, with large chains and with quaint border designs the inlaid pieces of great artistic value and labor saving devices in kitchen and laundry are their handiwork. A picture of this unusual house is a feature of the December Popular Mechanics magazine.

Art of Making a Smooth Bed.
If one has difficulty in making a bed so that the bedding is absolutely smooth and taut, an old-fashioned method might be followed to advantage, says the New York Press. Tuck the clothes in at the sides, but do not touch those at the foot. Complete making the bed, even to placing the pillows in position. Now give attention to the foot of the bed. Draw the clothes down, one at a time, as taut as possible and fold them under the mattress or tuck them in, according to their length. When this task is completed, you will be delighted to see how absolutely satisfactory your work is. If the bed is an iron or a brass one, which does not permit the tucking of the coverlet at the side, tuck all the other bedding in and then simply lay the coverlet over all, letting the sides hang down.

Girl Can Make a Porch Tray.
Girls who are on the lookout for pretty and inexpensive things to make for gifts should know about the lovely porch trays one sees in the shops at high prices. After all they consist only of a picture frame containing a pretty pattern of chintz or a bit of embroidery instead of a picture. When the picture sales are on one can get suitable frames for 25 cents or less, according to the Chicago Inter Ocean. The only requirements are that the frame be rather wide and strong, with flat sides to permit of screwing on the tilted brass handles. These are the only really expensive part of the tray, costing about 25 cents each at the shops. The back consists of a piece of light wood—the side of an orange box

does nicely—tacked on securely with "brads" to the edges of the frame and covered with dark felt or flannel to prevent scratching of the table. Any girl who can handle ordinary tools can make for a dollar a tray that will delight any woman who likes to have things daintily served.

Proper Washing Saves Stockings.
Not the least important in the matter of conserving the family stockings is the proper washing of them, says the Jersey Journal. Frequent changes will do away with the necessity for excessive rubbing and hard wear. A fresh pair of stockings for each person every day will result in keeping them intact for a long period, or, at most, developing but tiny holes that can quickly be caught up.

The time spent in giving the hosiery daily attention is not to be compared with that which would be required were they worn for days at a time. Stockings should never be boiled nor come in contact with the rest of the washing. If they do, an unsightly, shiny appearance will be the result. Several rinsing waters are necessary to free them from all soapy taint. Ironing is neither essential nor advisable. To shake and smooth out the stockings is quite enough.
