"Butler," the Exposition Mascot.
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 13.—The Panama-Pacific International Exposition has its mascot; he has had him for many months. He is a dog, a bright, affectionate, lively little fellow with white and black hair, rather long, suggesting a parting between shepherd and setter. He has all the interest of a bird dog in birds, but is not a trained thoroughbred, for he does not confine his attentions to game birds. He goes after sparrows, too.
The mascot's name is "Butler." He first appeared on the grounds a few days after the commencement of construction in 1912 and proceeded to make himself at home. It was some time before he had a permanent abiding place, and that he did find, near the Marina, opposite the Palace of Transportation, was uncomfortable

owing to progress of work. Now he has cosy resting places in many spots and is at home everywhere. But he will not leave the Exposition grounds. He cannot be driven or coaxed away. If he is carried out, he comes back. He is friendly with all the regular habitues of the grounds and has fallen into a bed of roses as far as his rations go, for every one feeds him. The little fellow answered to no name in particular for a long time. Then, one day, while he was lying down peacefully, a man hailed a passer-by by name, crying: "Oh, Butler!" Instantly the dog jumped up cocked his ears, and ran toward the caller with tail wagging. He has answered to the name of "Butler" ever since.
\$500,000 FIRE SWEEPS TOWN; FIREMAN HURT
COHOS, N. Y., Dec. 13.—Fire which broke out in the heart of the city's

business section, was subdued only after a dozen buildings and manufacturing plants had been destroyed with a loss of half a million dollars. One fireman was badly hurt by a falling wall.
Seventeen New Precincts.
ALBANY, Ore., Dec. 13.—The Linn county court has completed the re-arranging of the county into precincts which became necessary since the granting of woman suffrage. Under the new arrangement there will be 51 instead of 34 precincts, making an addition of 17 precincts.
\$125,000 IS PAID FOR PROTECTION OF GAME
SALEM, Ore., Dec. 12.—Figures prepared by Governor West show that when the year closes a total of \$125,000 will have been expended from the game protection fund for the game department of the State Fish and

Game commission. The expenditures for December are not available, but are estimated at \$440, and should they not exceed this, the month will be the lowest in a year, the expenditures for other months ranging from \$7300 to \$18,592.
"This, in my opinion, is entirely too much," declared the governor, commenting on the figures. "It is too much under the present conditions, and I am going to cut it in two next year by reorganizing the commission and putting it on a sound basis."
Girl to Swim Big Canal.
NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Elsaine Golding, of Bath Beach, has called for Panama on the steamship Anson. Miss Golding expects to swim the Panama canal. She plans to take 60 hours, but says if she has to she will swim it in 30 hours.
Miss Golding expects to swim Gatun Lake, 23 miles, in one swim without leaving the water.
