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GOTHAM NEEDS \$48,000,000 TO RUN CITY NEXT YEAR

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—Estimates of their needs for 1914 have been handed to the board of estimate by the heads of the various departments connected with the running of the municipal government. The total appropriations asked for amount to \$48,000,000, being an increase of \$3,734,617 over the amount required during the past year. Big increases are asked for by both the fire department and the police department, two of Father Knickerbocker's biggest items of expense. The police commissioner estimates that it will cost \$18,355,395.58 to run his department, this being an increase of \$1,617,324.12 over the amount allotted to him during 1913. For fighting fires the fire commissioner asks for \$9,355,399.46, an increase of \$990,454.08. Another noted increase is asked by the department of health. The 1913 appropriation for this branch was \$3,358,219.50. The commissioner of health figures that it will require \$3,310,055.52 more than that or \$3,627,225.02, to do his work efficiently in 1914. The same approx-

imate rate of increase is maintained throughout the list with the exception of the Board of City Record, department of Parks in Brooklyn and the department of Bridges, these estimating that they can manage on a less appropriation than was required by them for 1913.

Civil Service Reform.

BOSTON, Dec. 13.—Reports of the executive council by Chairman Robert D. Jenks, from the women's auxiliary, and from civil service reform associations, consumed the opening sessions of the thirty-third meeting of the National Civil Service Reform League which convened here. Representatives from nearly every state in the union were present when the meeting was called to order. Following the morning session a luncheon was tendered to delegates by the Massachusetts Woman's Auxiliary, after which Miss Marion C. Nichols, secretary of the Bay State organization gave a lantern lecture. Governor Simeon E. Baldwin, of Connecticut will be the principal speaker at this evening's session, over which President Lowell of Harvard will preside.

Now In Line to Be Cadet.

Conductor Gus Bertholet of the N. P. train is happy today over the receipt of a telegram from his son, Frank, who is attending a military school at Staunton, Virginia, saying that he had been notified that he is now the principal in an appointment to the U. S. military academy at West Point. Before he had been named as alternate but the failure of the principal to pass the physical examination puts him in line for the appointment. He will take his examinations next March and his father believes he will have no difficulty in fulfilling the requirements.

PULMOTER LOSES BATTLE.

GIRL Kept Alive 20 Hours by Use of Machine, Finally Succumbs. MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 13.—Miss Hilma Engberg, of Minneapolis, died at Asbury Hospital after a pulmotor had been used for 20 hours in an effort to save her life. A physician, nurses and four operators of the General Electric company, united in their efforts to rally the young woman by the use of the machine.

Suffering from paralysis of the lungs, she was unable to breathe, and artificial respiration was used. The pulmotor was applied and what physicians declared to be one of the greatest fights for a life in Minneapolis history began. She sank rapidly, but rallied with the use of the machine, and it was believed that she could recover if the lungs were kept in motion until nature could again take up its work.
