AUTO OWNERS AND DRIVERS MUST GET THE 1914 LICENSE

Registrations of motor vehicles and chauffeurs will expire tomorrow and Secretary of State Olcott is calling upon all officers in the state to assist him in enforcing the law requiring new registrations. The color of number plates for autos has been changed to dark blue with white letters and the shape of chauffeur badges has been changed from a shield to a maltese cross. The following are some of the points of the law to which the secretary is calling the attention of officers:

Section 7, providing that all registrations of motor vehicles expire on December 31st of each year, and shall be renewed annually in the same manner and upon the payment of the same fee as provided for original registrations, such renewal to take effect on January 1st of each year.

Section 8, providing that no person shall operate or drive a motor vehicle on the public highways of this state unless such vehicle shall have the number plates assigned to it by the secretary of state conspicuously displayed on the rear and front of such vehicle in plain view, so as to be easily read by the public.

Section 10, requiring that the number plates shall be of a distinctly different color or shade for each year, to be designated and selected by the secretary of state.

Pursuant to the duty imposed upon the secretary of state by the provisions of said section 10, number plates have been designated and selected for the year 1914, with a dark blue background and white letters and figures. Chauffeur registrations also expire on December 31st of each year and must be renewed annually, to take effect January 1st, following, as required in Section 14. The badges for the year 1914 are in the form of a maltese cross with the figures 1914 cut through the center. The badges for the year 1913 were in the form of a shield with appropriate lettering in black.

A chauffeur is defined as a person who drives a motor vehicle for hire, that is, the motor vehicle being for hire, so that any person who drives a motor vehicle which motor vehicle is for hire, must apply to the secretary of the state for registration as a chauffeur and hold a chauffeur's license and badge as issued to him by that official.

Since the enactment of the law providing for the registration of motor vehicles, many of the motor vehicle owners have not registered their cars promptly by the first day of each year and secured from the secretary of state the required plates for the current year. For the convenience of the motor vehicle owners in the state and in order to allow them a reasonable time within which they might register their cars for the year 1914, this department received applications therefor from December 1, 1913, so that no one can lay the blame for failure to carry the proper license plates for the year 1914 to the secretary of state.

LONDON, Dec. 31.—Part of the equipment to be used by Sir Ernest H. Shackleton on his proposed expedition next year across the Antarctic continent will be sledges driven by aeroplane engines and an aeroplane with clipped wings to aid in propelling the sledges over the ice.
Sir Ernest plans to land at latitude 75 degrees south, on Weddel Sea, at the beginning of November, 1914, and expects to arrive in Ross Sea, on the other side of the pole, in March, 1915.
