Use Fireless Cooker for Early Breakfast.

Nobody appreciates better than the man or woman forced by circumstances to make an early start of mornings the convenience and comfort of a fireless cooker. It is disheartening to most people to go out into the chilly gloom of a midwinter morning—say at 7 or even at 8—and snatch breakfast en route. With the aid of a fireless cooker—a very small one will do—and a percolator, breakfast may be enjoyed luxuriously, no matter what the hour.

Oatmeal brought to a simmer the night before and tucked cozily to bed in the fireless cooker will emerge in the morning steaming and deliciously cooked. Coffee and water placed in the percolator before retiring need only the touch of match to alcohol wick during the morning process of dressing to be ready, hot and steaming. Rolls and a bottle of cream left by baker and milkman outside the door will complete a breakfast with, perhaps, an orange thrown in that will sustain the average worker comfortably until the luncheon hour comes around.

For Stained Hands.

Coffee grounds are useful in removing stains from the hands, though many do not know of this simple remedy. Apply the grounds to the hands, rubbing well in where the dirt or stains are persistent, and after washing in warm water the hands should be in good condition.

New in Girdle Belts.

Girdle belts of knitted silk in all of the fashionable shades strongly appeal to the girl who affects frocks in one dark tone. The girdle, which any one may knit in a comparatively short while, may be stretched up and down from the waist line or crushed together narrowly, whichever manner best becomes the figure.

At both ends it is finished with fringe six inches long and made of twisted silk cords, drawn in groups of stands through a row of rather large composition beads in a color strongly contrasting with the nitied meshing. The effect of a deep red or green, a bright yellow or purple waistband having a fringe headed with a row of orange or purple beads is a trifle bizarre, but worn with a dark toned house frock its effect is smart and quite as much to be desired, unusual.

ROAD BUILDING METHODS WILL BE TAUGHT FARMERS.

AMES, Iowa, Dec. 29. — A two weeks' "short course" to educate county officials, farmers and the public in general in the best methods of road building, opened here in charge of professors of the engineering department of the Iowa State college. It is the first annual good roads short course and its object is to present in condensed form fundamentals in highway engineering. It is part of the state wide movement to improve the highways of Iowa and its scope will be enlarged from year to year.

LOVERS FIGHT OVER FICKLE GIRL'S LOVE
PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 30.—Tiburco Garcia and Donquino Dominguez, young Mexicans, fought a duel for the

love of a girl. Both were fatally wounded, and the fickle maiden disappeared with a third man. Garcia and Dominguez met at the home of the girl and quarreled. They agreed to fight a duel. The girl's

only objection was that they should not fight in the house. They repaired to a vacant lot and fought with knives until Garcia went down. As he sank he violated the agreement by

drawing a revolver and firing a bullet into Dominguez's stomach.

THE BAD ROADS TAX.

Department of commerce statistics show, says William N. Taft in January Technical World Magazine, that it costs eight times as much to deliver a pound of coffee from a country grocery store to a home a mile away as it costs to bring that same pound of coffee from Rio de Janeiro to New York.

Also it costs the farmer who lives 10 miles from the railroad over which he ships his products, one and one-sixth cents more to haul a bushel of wheat to the freight station than it costs the buyer to ship that wheat from New York to Liverpool.

Again, the bill for carting our cotton crop from the fields to the railway stations is something like three hundred million dollars a year.

Is it any wonder that the price of cotton, wheat, and coffee remains at a high level, instead of falling proportionately to the increase in production?

Something must be wrong. Something is wrong. It is the roads.

Few persons realize the immense tax put on all of us by the bad roads and by the difficulties which they entail.

Compare the swiftly moving railroad train consisting of a powerful engine and a great number of fully loaded cars traveling at a fair rate of speed, with the slow going, half loaded cart or truck in which the product is taken from its point of production to the railway station. The difference is that between darkness and light—between efficiency and waste!

If our farmers could only be made to realize the tremendous tax which bad roads impose upon them, not to mention the tax upon the ultimate consumer, public opinion would demand the making and maintaining of good roads everywhere.

CARRANZA, MADERO'S INSPIRATION.

General Venustiano Carranza, leader of the constitutionalists, was the first governor to bid defiance to Huerta and start the armed revolt that spread quickly throughout northern Mexico against the Huerta regime. Carranza was born in the town of Cuatro Ciénegas, state of Coahuila, of one of the old families that boast pure Spanish descent. The Carranzas have been extensive landowners for generations, and Don Venustiano was given the education of a gentleman in the schools of northern Mexico. He raises cattle and wheat and, since the discovery that rubber could be extracted from the wild guayule shrub, he has been also a rubber producer. His personal fortune is estimated at a million pesos—\$500,000.

Carranza went to Mexico City as senator from Coahuila and remained there ten or fifteen years deep in his independence of the Diaz political machine. Instead of becoming subservient, Senator Carranza undertook to smash the Diaz "ring." He ran for the governorship himself.

It was this campaign of Carranza's which first enlisted Francisco I. Madero in active politics. Madero made speeches for Carranza and contributed to his expenses, only to see

Carranza meet the fate of all opposition candidates under the Diaz system—he was counted out. The young, idealistic Madero, seeing how the system operated, plucked then heart and head into the campaign for electoral reform, which led to the revolution. Francisco I. Madero said, just after the success of his revolution, that to the example of Carranza, and to his ideals in politics, he owed the inspiration that led him into taking up the sword against the dictator, Diaz—The World's Work.

PARIS, Dec. 29.—"Siamese" twin girls, a month old, who are joined face to face by a strip of flesh more than an inch thick between their stomachs, have been brought to Paris to be separated by a surgical operation.

CHICAGO.—A band of Glacier National Park Indians sent to Chicago by Louis W. Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern Railway to attend the land show, sprung a surprise on Mary Garden, the noted actress, by serenading her with their weird music and songs as she stepped from her private car. These Montana Indians from the Roof of the Rockies are great admirers of the distinguished stage star, who appears in the role of Natamah, an Indian maid, in the opera of that name. The real object of the Indians' reception to Mary Garden was the presentation by them of a pair of exquisitely beaded moccasins which the best beadworkers of the Glacier Park reservation made for her. More than 200,000 beads of twenty-five shades of color were used in decorating this buckskin footwear. It took ten squaws six months to complete their work. When the squaws had finished their labor the medicine men of the tribe went through the mystical rites of making "good medicine," so if the wearer of the artistically beaded moccasins does not find herself becoming more nimble as Natamah it is no fault of Chiefs Lazy Boy, Medicine Owl, Bird Rattle, Wolf Plume, Fish Wolf Robe and Eagle Call. The actress was delighted with the gift as well as the unique reception tendered her by her red friends, whom she promised to visit in Glacier National Park next summer.
