

REPORT SHOWS LOCAL LIBRARY IS IN MOST HEALTHY FINANCIAL CONDITION

During the year 1913 just closed, there were 2496 people holding cards and making use of the Pendleton public library which is soon to become the Umatilla county library, and during the twelve months 17,922 books and periodicals were borrowed from the library by these patrons. A total of \$590 new books were added to the library bringing the total number of volumes up to 4773.

These figures are taken from the annual report of the librarian to the library board and of the library board to the city council, made last evening. The library commences the year with a balance on hand in the general fund of \$1299.25 and in the special expense fund of \$15.18. The tax levy voted by the city and the county, with this balance, will place the library in a healthy financial condition.

The following is the report of the librarian and a synopsis of the library board's report:

To the President and Board of Trustees:
Ladies and Gentlemen:

Herewith I beg to submit the fourth annual report, detailing the work of the public library for the year ending December, 1913.
At the beginning of the year the library owned 4282 books. During the year 168 books were added by purchase, 280 volumes were supplied from the Sturgis fund, and 142 by gift. Those added by gift consist of 110 from the Civic Club and 8 volumes from the Current Literature Club while the other 24 were donated by various people. The traveling library, loaned from the Oregon State Library has been placed on the shelves, reserved in the library for the special use of the Current Literature Club for their work this year.

Borrowers.
Four hundred and thirty four new borrowers were registered since January 1, 1913, of these 308 including 18 nonresidents, were adults, 132 children cards were issued. Five deposit borrowers were recorded during the year. 82 cards have been withdrawn because of death or removal from the city. There are now 2496 people holding cards in the library, 1756 adults and 740 children. Since January 1, 1913, 17,922 books and periodicals have gone into the various homes in Pendleton. A record is kept each day of the number of books taken from the library, of the class of books and whether the books were from the adult or juvenile department. 11,770 books were recorded in the adult department, 2,707 of these were non-fiction and the remainder or 9003 were fiction. In the juvenile department the total number of books issued was 6152, 2481 were non-fiction and 3671 were fiction. Showing a gain of 2655 books over last year.

The library subscribed to 24 magazines and has four bound volumes A. L. A. booklets. In addition to these Mrs. Sturgis has supplied us with the International Studio and Mr. G. Kimbrell with the American City.

The grade schools were visited early in the school year and the use of the library explained to the pupils. Grade lists of books for the use of the pupils were printed and distributed in all of the schools. Two receptions were held during the year in the rooms of the library. A Shakespearean evening in April and a reception for the teachers of the Pendleton schools, in October.

The story hour for children between the ages of 5 and 10 years has been conducted each week on Saturday morning, and we certainly appreciate the assistance we have had for this hour.

We wish to extend our sincere thanks to the members of the library board for their support and co-operation.

FATHER OF PARCELS POST FAVORS GOVERNMENT TELEGRAPH LINES NOW



David J. Lewis, member of the House of Representatives from Maryland, has introduced a bill for the government ownership of telegraph and telephone lines. He was the author of the bill for the parcels post, which now works successfully.

This action was taken by the Maryland congressman following the announcement by Attorney-General McReynolds that an arrangement had been made by him and officials of the American Telephone Company for it to give up its stock in the Western Union Company. The ownership of Western Union stock by the telephone company was believed to be in violation of the Sherman act, but the attorney general and President Wilson undertook a peaceful settlement in preference to a fight in the courts.

The bill of Mr. Lewis is in line with the report of Postmaster-General Purnell, who advocated government ownership of the wires. Despatches from Washington, however, indicate that the president will not endorse the recommendations of his cabinet officer.

BENSON TRACT WILL BE MADE INTO PLAYGROUND

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 1.—Coincident with his return from the East A. S. Benson announced that his father, S. Benson, the noted Oregon timberman, capitalist and good roads advocate, had bought about 220 acres of land embracing the famous Gordon Falls, and would make of it a scenic playground, where the people could go in the summer months and see the beauties with which nature has endowed Oregon.

The Gordon Falls, which are in close proximity to Multnomah Falls, are considered by many to be even finer than the latter, because the approach is more beautiful and the falls themselves, even though not so great in volume, are more picturesque. At a height of about 1200 feet there is an enormous punch bowl, where beavers have been seen at work while the last falls are about 650 feet in height.

Mr. Benson's intention is to beautify the place something along the lines of the famous Busch gardens at Pasadena and to allow the public absolutely free access at any and all times, though maintaining possession of the property. In this connection the ground in the front of the falls will admit of future development than that at Multnomah Falls, where the spray in the winter would permeate the walls of any structure that might be erected there.

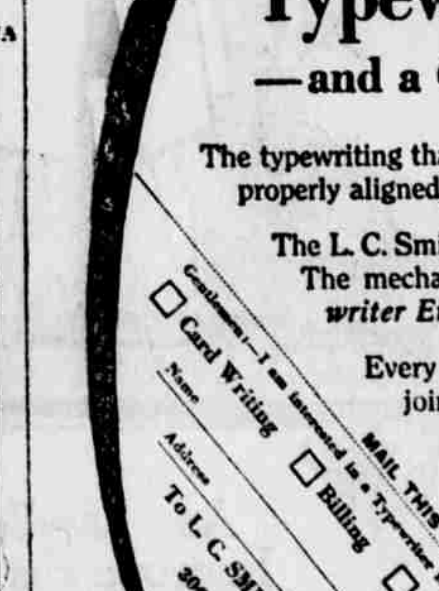

which resulted in the derailment of the entire train. The accident, which occurred within the automatic block district, derailing the engine, tender, the engine trailer and 10 cars on the first main, No. 10, is estimated to have done little damage, that to the equipment and engine being placed at \$400 and to the track \$300.

The board of inquiry consisted of W. Boltons, division superintendent of the O. W. R. & N. railway; George Ross, master mechanic; H. J. Lyon, division engineer; E. W. Anderson, stock raiser; H. W. Coles, stockman of Haines and E. P. Staples, merchant of Haines. The finding of the board follows:

"The derailment was the result of the rolling and swinging motion on the part of the locomotive sufficient to spread the rails, first on one side and then on the other, at intervals of 35 feet. No individual responsibility."
