tions closely. If he sees what looks
like a favorable opening he is likely
to declare himself.

In Portland at least three aspirants
are not denying their aspirations. W.
A. Carter, formerly a resident of
southern Oregon, and prominent in
several lodges, is far from loath to
discuss his chances in the rough and
tumult race that appears likely for
the republican nomination. His an-
nouncement may be expected later.

Gus C. Moser, member of the state
senate, has been on the verge of an
announcement for the last three
months. Long ago he declared him-
self a "receptive" candidate, and his
views have not changed.

Ex-Sheriff Stevens in Race.
The third confessed aspirant is R.
L. Stevens, former sheriff of Multno-
mah county, though no announcement
has been made by him. He has many
friends working in his behalf over the
state.

Silence and deep reflection have so
far marked the affairs of the pro-
gressive ranks. L. H. McMahon, of
Salem, however, is expected to break
the silence by entering the ring for
the progressive nomination shortly
after January 1. As far back as last
March, on the closing night of the
legislative session, M. M. Gill of Clack-
amas county, a member of the house,
announced his candidacy as a pro-
gressive.

It is worth remarking that of those
so far to the front none at present,
except Judge Bennett, are residents
of eastern Oregon, or of southern Ore-
gon. Whether these sections will pro-
duce candidates is a question yet to
be answered.

warning to all union printers to stay
away from Los Angeles. The warning
is contained in a resolution adopted
at a regular meeting of the union
which sets forth that 200 union
printers here are without work.

RAINFALL IN 1913 WAS IN EXCESS OF NORMAL QUANTITY

A total of 1.52 inches of rain fell
in Pendleton during the year 1913 and
it is an excess of 3.44 inches over the
normal precipitation of 14.03. Inci-
dentally it is one of the best years
from a moisture standpoint this coun-
try has ever enjoyed if not the very
best.

The above data is taken from the
records of E. F. Averill, local weather
observer. The record shows that for
the month of December the rainfall
was 1.06 inches whereas the normal
for that month is 1.51. A total of
seven and a half inches of snow fell.
The snow on the 22nd of the month
measured two and a half inches and
melted made .2 inches of rain.

The warmest day in Pendleton oc-
curred Dec. 17 when the record of 54
degrees was reached. The coldest time
was on Dec. 24 when the thermometer
went down to eight above zero. On
that same day the range of tempera-
ture was from 35 degrees maximum to
8 degrees minimum. There were 10
days of rain during December, one
clear day, 11 partly clear days and 19
cloudy days.

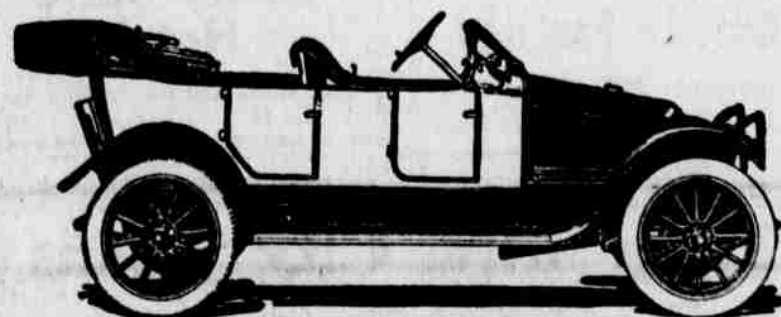
