The Care of the Hands in Winter. Care of the hands in winter is a matter too frequently neglected and always with disastrous results. A few practical hints will prevent all trouble if carefully followed out.

Soft water, not too hot, and a good soap are first essentials and are of the utmost importance. Lather the hands well, allowing the soap to get well absorbed in the skin. A good way of soaking the fingers well in soapy lather is to put the finger tips of each hand into the palm of the other, working the fingers together, as it were, and then gently rubbing a tiny piece of soap between them. In this way the fingers, nails, cuticle, are thoroughly cleansed, and if properly done no nailbrush at all is necessary. This, indeed, ought never to be used to cleanse the inside of the nail, into which no hard foreign substance should ever be introduced, as it simply forces the nail away from the flesh and leaves a cavity in which dirt and dust collect.

Modish Evening Slippers. Unstrapped insteps are out of fashion, and all slippers for wear with evening gowns have some sort of stray arrangement over the instep.

A gown whose simplicity is its chief charm, as pictured here, is made of cadet blue chiffon cloth over self-tone silk. The blouse, severely plain, has a low round neck finished with fur and elbow sleeves similarly trimmed, having an undersleeve of the chiffon, also fur-trimmed. The severity of the blouse is somewhat lightened by the addition of a little embroidered motif, done in Bulgarian colors, placed military fashion on the front. The underskirt of taffeta is draped on the right with the chiffon, while the left side shows a short fur edged tunic of the same.

Women who do not fear the asperities of thick ankles may indulge in the ribbon laced corset which has crossed straps over the instep and several strands of ribbon wound around the ankle and limb, but these faddish slippers unfortunately do give a rather clumsy look to foot and ankle unless both are of the daintiest proportions—not exceeding the No. 3 double A—and more becoming to the average foot. The neat buttoned strap slippers which have the pleasant strapped effect without breaking the line of instep and ankle. A new slipper in the buttoned strap style has crossed straps which suggest the laced corset in daintier guise.
