BIG ORCHARD AT FREEWATER SOLD

FREEWATER, Ore. Jan. 5.—One of the most important land sales in this section of the country was closed by the Free-water Land company of Free-water, which sold the J. H. "WAL" HENDERSON, ONCE FAMOUS "SPENDER" DIES

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—Moses Wallace Henderson died. Twenty-five years ago "Wal" Henderson was one of the best-known men in Portland. He was one of the "spenders" of the future metropolis. He was in the thick of whatever was doing and he was active in the Arlington club. When he died, from paralysis, few remembered him save the diminishing band of oldtimers. His fortune vanished long ago. Mr. Henderson was born in New Hampshire and came to Portland in the '60s. For more than 20 years he was the best-dressed man in town. With Vincent Cook and George Clark he had the leading dry goods store in Portland. It was located at First and Washington and occupied the old Dekum building, now known as the Gadsby building. Later, with Byron Holmes and James Lotan, he bought out Peter Taylor's foundry and this became the Willamette Iron Works, which is still a thriving institution. Henderson disposed of his interest years ago. After leaving the Willamette Iron Works, Henderson lived for two years on a farm near Castle Rock, Wash., and later moved back to Portland. In the days of his prosperity he lived in Europe a great deal of the time.

GLAZE WOULD GET JOB WITH PORTLAND

FORMER PENDLETON PITCHER WRITES TO M'CREIDIE FOR BERTH ON HIS TEAM.

Famous College Athlete Who "Slipped One Over" on Amateur Authorities Thinks he can Make Good Again.

Ralph Glaze, who performed in the big league several years, wants to come to Portland and has written Manager Walter McCredie a letter offering his services, says the Portland Journal. Glaze is not new in Oregon. Some 12 years ago he came out from Colorado college to Pendleton to play in the old Inland Empire league and had a tremendous season. In order to enter college later and partake in amateur athletics, Glaze put one over the Intercollegiate and Amateur Athletic union authorities by assuming the name of "Hays."

Glaze was noted for a particularly sharp drop ball in his pitching that took on many of the airs of the spitball. In those days salaries were not much to speak of in the bushes and the Portland Northwestern league club offered Hays what was considered the good salary of \$100 a month, but he turned it down.

Hays afterward went to Dartmouth college and became prominent as a baseball and football player. His work on the diamond won him a job with the Boston Americans and his gridiron performances caused him to be regarded with favor by Walter Camp in his All-American selections. Glaze was with Boston for several years, being released afterwards to Indianapolis, where he stuck a few years. He is now managing the Beaumont club of the Texas league. Glaze will probably not get a job with the Beavers or Colts. He has been pitching too long to suit Manager McCredie and as he was essentially a curve ball pitcher probably hasn't much on the ball now. Then, again, it is said that Ralph is fond of the white lights.
