

LAWSON PREPARED TO MEET FORCE

GOVERNOR WEST SENDS WARNING TO BAKER ABOUT ARMED RESISTANCE.

Any attempt to interfere with National Guard in Copperfield will be promptly dealt with, declares State's Executive—10 Additional Men Are Sent to Scene.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 5.—Governor West, in telegram to Sheriff Rand and District Attorney Godwin of Baker county, made it plain that Colonel Lawson and his men would be prepared to meet armed force that might be organized for the purpose of recovering for the saloon men and their allies possession of the civil government of Copperfield. The governor said he had been informed such a force was being organized, and warned the sheriff and district attorney that any interference with Colonel Lawson would be met promptly and handled effectively.

Announcement was also made by the executive that he had sent ten ad-

ditional men to eastern Oregon to be called by Colonel Lawson in case they are needed. He refused to divulge the immediate destination of the men, but, it is believed, they were sent to Baker. Governor West said more would be dispatched any time Colonel Lawson thought they might be needed.

Governor West said unless the saloonkeepers obeyed orders their stock of goods would not be restored to them, and that in that event, the goods would be turned over to the circuit court.

"The action taken in the Copperfield case will be the policy of this office in the future," continued the governor. "When we cannot get the co-operation of the local authorities to close saloons operating illegally we will close them until assured there will be a decent respect for the law."

Governor Outlines Policy. "Our position in Copperfield is simply this: Either the council has got to get out of the saloon business or the saloon men have got to get out of the council. When new men, men having nothing to do with the saloon business except the enforcing of laws relating to saloons, are put in charge of the town, and we are assured the laws will be enforced, and the lives and property of the people protected, we shall withdraw from Copperfield."

"So long as the saloons are conducted lawfully there, this office will not interfere. That will be a local matter."

The governor's telegram to Messrs. Godwin and Rand read the same and was as follows: "Being advised through the columns of the press that an armed force may be raised to assist the sheriff and the saloon men of Copperfield in recovering possession of the town, I wish to advise you that Colonel Lawson and his men are in Copperfield under orders from this office as provided by law and for the purpose of enforcing laws which have been ignored owing to neglect of official duty on your part."

Motive Declared Peaceable. "We hope to adjust the matter in a peaceable manner and as soon as assurance is given that a decent respect for the laws of this state will be maintained we will withdraw from the city and county. In the meantime any attempt to harm Lawson or any of his men or any interference with the performance of his official duties will be promptly met and handled effectively."

Governor West declared that Colonel Lawson and five of the men with him are the best shots in Oregon. All fought in the Philippine Islands and have scored the highest marks in shooting contests in the National Guard of the state.

"As an illustration of Colonel Lawson's ability to shoot, I might mention an incident that happened at the tentenary recently," said the governor. "The colonel, who is as you know, superintendent of the institution, was walking through one of the yards when he saw a rat running about 60 yards from him. Drawing his six shooter he fired once and the rat was dead."

Accused Imprisoned. Convict. "A convict who the colonel had not

seen until after he fired, who was doing some chores in the yard," said: "Well, colonel, I guess I won't try to run away while you're on the job."

"I am still determined to close other saloons in Baker county," declared the governor. "If I find the authorities are not enforcing the laws."

COPPERFIELD, Jan. 5.—Attempting to flee from this place, Councilmen Wiegand and Warner, who were deposed and placed under arrest last week by Colonel B. K. Lawson when he put Copperfield under martial law in order to close the saloons, were captured by members of the Oregon National Guard Sunday, just as the unseated officials started to speed out of town on a gasoline railroad speeder.

Both men had been pleading since their arrest, Thursday, to get to Baker, but their appeals fell on an adamant heart. They pleaded illness on the part of relatives in Baker, offered to give bond, did everything, but Colonel Lawson acted as though he heard not at all and his only reply was "You stay in Copperfield."

GOYARD'S POPULATION

HIGH ABOVE LONDON'S

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—New York City leads London in population by 1,000,000, according to figures made public by Dr. W. H. Guilfoyle, statistician of the board of health. He fixes New York's population at 5,376,966, a total based on the city's presumptive growth since the last count. This comparison does not include as part of London that city's large suburban area. While New York is rapidly gaining in population, the city and county of London is retrograding.

DIVORCE ON THE INCREASE HERE

COUNTY RECORDS SHOW 81 COUPLES APPLY FOR SEPARATION DURING 1913.

Marriage Shows Slight Increase Despite Eugene Law—June Leads all of Sister Months.

Divorce is on the increase in Umatilla county. The records at the county clerk's office prove that fact conclusively. During the twelvemonth just past 81 suits for the severance of the marital tie were instituted in the local circuit court whereas during the year 1912 there were but 65 and in the year 1911 but 60.

Marriages, too, showed a slight increase during the past year here in Umatilla county although in many communities it showed a falling off. This increase resulted in spite of the eugenic law which requires a certificate of health from the prospective bridegroom.

During the past year, 295 licenses were issued which is more than in 1912 and by a singular coincidence exactly the same number as in 1911. None of the records of the past three years approach that of 1910 when 258 couples applied for and received passports through the gates of conjugal felicity.

The first license in 1913 was granted to Albert P. Ellensberger and Anna V. Fiedler, both of this city, who were married by Judge Phelps on January 5. The last license was issued to Elmer W. Moore and Lorena Bentley who were married at the M. E. parsonage on New Year's day.

June, the month famed for brides, upheld its reputation last year for the first time in four years by registering the greatest number of wedding licenses of any one month. A total of 33 or more than one a day, shown in the records for this month. October is second with 25 and December, which led in 1910 and 1911 with 23 and 29 respectively and was second in 1912 with 25, dropped to third place in 1913 with only 23 to its credit.

The remainder of the 295 were divided among the months as follows: January, 13; February, 11; March, 12; April, 16; May, 17; July, 8; August, 8; September, 17; November, 21.

NEW HIGHEST BUILDING

IN WORLD IS PLANNED

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—Plans for a new highest building in the world were filed with the bureau of buildings. The structure will be 894.4 feet high, will have 51 stories and will cost over \$12,000,000. The Pan-American States association filed the plans. It is proposed to erect the building on the block bounded by Broadway, Eighth avenue, Fifty-seventh and Fifty-eighth streets.

Gross, until recently the government attorney in charge of the harvester trust prosecution.

Minneapolis Colleges and Charities Receive Gifts of \$230,000.

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 3.—Twelve colleges, hospitals and charitable institutions of Minnesota, are the recipients of New Year's gifts aggregating \$230,000 from David D. Stewart, of St. Albans, Me., who inherited the estate of the late Levi M. Stewart of Minneapolis, a pioneer who died here two years ago. No restrictions are attached to the gifts. Mr. Stewart's charities in the past year have reached \$620,000 nearly half of the estate that was left him. He had given about \$40,000 to the churches, colleges and charitable institutions in Maine.

MRS. EARL ROGERS SUES.

Los Angeles Attorney's Wife Follows Example of Sister.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 3.—Following on the suit of Mrs. Madge Rogers Thompson, sister of Attorney Rogers, for divorce, Mrs. Belle Green Rogers, wife of the attorney, filed the divorce suit which she has contemplated for months. Mrs. Rogers, it is said, charges extreme cruelty and asks for the custody of the Rogers children.

Professor Gets Pension. BOULDER, Colo., Jan. 3.—After having served as president of the University of Colorado for twenty-two years, Dr. James Baker retired as head of the institution to accept a pension under the Carnegie fund for educators. Livingston Farrand, professor of anthropology at Columbia University, succeeds him. Dr. Baker taught for forty years and is now 65. He has served for years as a member of the National Council of Education, once as its president.

FIVE SALOONS CLOSE

DOORS AT HILLSBORO

HILLSBORO, Ore., Jan. 5.—The last day of the old year passed very quietly here, with but little celebrating of any kind. The five saloons appeared to have a good trade. The prohibition law went into effect with the new year, and the saloons will be required to close permanently unless the supreme court reverses the holding of the circuit court and permits them to open.
